PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI) — It sounds almost unbelievable but there could be two Heisman trophy winners in two straight years from the same high school. In fact, down at the University of Oregon in Eugene you could get good odds on it. Last season a quarterback named Terry Baker of Oregon State set the college football world ablaze. Baker won the Heisman award and picked off more honors than were ever accorded a college football player. On the same United Press International All-American backfield was one of Baker's old teammates at Jefferson High School here, Mel Renfro. Renfro was a year behind Baker when they were tearing up high school opponents and chose Oregon instead of Oregon State. He missed half his sophomore season with an injury but still made all-coast. He was healthy in his junior season — and made All-America. "His potential as a senior is unlimited," says Len Casanova, the veteran Oregon head coach. "Complete football player." Lawyers Complete Arguments Today

ATLANTA (UPI) — Attorneys complete their arguments today in the \$10 million libel suit former Georgia athletic director Wallace Butts brought against the Saturday Evening Post. Following the closing arguments, Federal Judge Lewis R. Morgan will deliver his charge and the jury of 12 businessmen may get the case late today. Post attorney Welborn Cody and Butts' attorney Allen Lockerman painted contrasting pictures of Butts during the opening round of the arguments Friday. Morgan, who has presided over the bitterly fought courtroom case, already has said that he will instruct the jury that the controversial Saturday Evening Post article, "The Story of a College Football Fix," is libelous per se, or libelous on its face. It will then be up to the jurors, none of whom ever has played college football, to decide if the magazine, or Butts, told the truth. Butts sued the magazine after it reported in its March 23 issue that an Atlanta insurance man, George Burnett, had overheard a telephone conversation last fall in which Butts gave away Georgia football secrets to Paul (Bear) Bryant, coach at the University of Alabama, nine days before

Boxing Schedule Light

NEW YORK (UPI) — A "may-be" lightweight title fight at Saginaw, Mich., Monday night and a nationally televised middleweight bout at Madison Square Garden Saturday top this week's light boxing schedule.

At Saginaw, the promoter is advertising the fight between high contenders Paulie Armstrong of Los Angeles (No. 1) and Kenny Lane of Muskegon, (No. 2) as for the "vacant" lightweight crown.

The Michigan State Athletic Board of Control regards the 135-pound championship as vacant because on June 11 both the World Boxing Association's (WBA) Championships Regulations Committee and Executive Committee stripped Carlos Ortiz of his title because of his refusal to defend against the then top contender Lane.

Ortiz claimed no promoter would offer him enough of a guarantee for a defense against Lane to make it worth while. And the WBA's championships Ruling Committee apparently agreed with Ortiz of New York instead of with the WBA's other two committees because it continued to rate Ortiz as world champion.

At New York's Garden, Saturday night, middleweight contender Jose Gonzalez of Puerto Rico will fight Juan (Rocky) Rivero, Argentine knockout specialist, for home television (ABC).

Gonzalez, 23 and ranked 10th by the WBA, seeks his fifth straight victory. He is favored at 2-1. Rivero, 25, is not ranked among the top 10. But his 33 victories in 46 bouts include 35 knockouts.

Ralston Rallies U.S. Team

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Freckled Dennis Ralston put the United States back among the world's tennis powers today after he almost singlehandedly defeated the Mexican Davis Cup team in the North American zone eliminations.

There's still a long way ahead before the U. S. team can invade Australia to challenge for the cherished trophy emblematic of the world's championship. But Mexican captain Francisco Contreras said the United States has a good chance to go all the way and bring the Davis Cup back to North America.

Ralston clinched the playoff Sunday in the first match when he swept aside Mexico's brilliant Rafael Osuna, 6-1, 6-3, 7-5. That victory came after the 21-year-old youngster had teamed with Chuck McKinley Saturday to upset the favored Mexican doubles team of Osuna and Antonio Palafox.

"That was the best I've ever seen Ralston play in a big match," the articulate Mexican captain added. "If he keeps up the pace he had in the series, he could become the best player in the world."
