Soviet Premier Schedules Visit To Devastated City

BELGRADE (UPI) — Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev is coming to Yugoslavia Tuesday to inspect the ruins of a city shattered by an earthquake and to discuss the Communist world movement cracked by an ideological tremor.

Official sources said Khrushchev will spend a day touring the Macedonian capital of Skopje, smashed by a July 26 quake and now being rebuilt with American and Soviet aid.

TOP DRIVER WESTBURY, N.Y. (UPI) — John Chapman was the leading driver at Roosevelt Raceway last year with 71 victories. It was his first full season at the Long Island harness racing track.

But after four days of public appearances in Belgrade and the Skopje visit, sources said the Soviet leader will spend a week to 10 days huddling with President Josip Broz Tito on the Sino-Soviet ideological dispute and other major international issues.

Heads Group

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy announced Friday he will appoint Joseph H. McConnell, president of the Reynolds Metals Co. of Richmond, Va., as chairman of the U. S. delegation to the administrative radio conference at Geneva, Switzerland, Oct. 7 to Nov. 8.

The conference will allocate radio frequencies for space-radio communication.

In 1956, while visiting Romania, Khrushchev hopped over to Yugoslavia for several days on a surprise appearance to warm up the still cool relationship. Yugoslav sources say the coming third visit can only improve the now "normalized" Soviet-Yugoslav relationship. Khrushchev's call on Tito so soon after the collapse of the recent Sino-Soviet talks in Moscow seems bound to further irritate Peking.

Before the Moscow-Peking dispute came out in the open, Communist China frequently used Belgrade as a target for its criticism of the Soviet Union. Peking attacked Tito's national brand of communism, his non-aligned stand and the peaceful coexistence policy Belgrade and Moscow proclaim.

Yugoslav sources say they expect Khrushchev to welcome Tito's plans for calling a second Belgrade conference of non-aligned nations, probably in a year's time. The proposal already has the support of U.A.R. President Gamal Abdel Nasser and has roused interest in Asia, Africa and Latin America, Yugoslavs said.
