Two Lucky Youngsters Get White House Pups

HYANNIS PORT, Mass. (UPI) — President Kennedy had two top-priority passengers today for a flight to Washington from Cape Cod: two puppies on the way to a little girl and boy in the Midwest.

The President scheduled a 9 a.m. EDT departure from Otis Air Force Base, Mass., for Andrews Air Force Base, Md., and then a 10-minute helicopter flight which should put him on the White House lawn before 10:30 a.m. EDT.

High on the passenger list were the 9½-week-old puppies — Streaker, a male, and Butterly, a female. They are half of the litter of four pups born June 14 to Pushinka, the dog Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev gave Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy in 1961.

Sunday, the White House announced that Mrs. Kennedy had at random selected two letters from about 5,000 that had been sent to her and the President asking for Pushinka's offspring. The father of the puppies is Charlie, a Welsh terrier and senior member of the Kennedy kennel.

Lucky Youngsters

The lucky youngsters are Karen House, 10, of Westchester, Ill., a Chicago suburb, and Mark Bruce, 9, of Columbia, Mo.

Russian Secondary School Operates In New York — Free Of Politics

NEW YORK (UPI) — In an old gray mansion of New York's upper Park Avenue, a man in flowing black robes and long black beard picked up a copy of a textbook published in Russia.

"They (the Communists) mix politics in everything," he said. "In art, in history, in geography, everywhere it's possible — and sometimes where it's impossible. 'Here we are teaching with big impartiality!'"

Yugoslav-born Anthony Grabbe, an abbot in the Russian Orthodox Church outside of Russia, was referring to a unique institution — the only Russian-American secondary school this side of the Iron Curtain.

The institution, called St. Sergius High School, is turning out bilingual American citizens with

a fluent knowledge of the Russian language, history, geography and ancient Russian culture — all free of politics.

Doubles Study Requirements
The four-year-old, little-known church school, boasts almost double the amount of academic units required by most American

secondary schools. It meets the stiff requirements of the New York state board of regents, and even stiffer requirements of European schools.

But the way in is not easy. Since the school first opened its doors, 24 students have been dismissed "not brilliant enough," said Abbot Grabbe, and most who apply are disqualified because they lack pre-high school scholarship.

For those who do get in, the awards are many. The classes are small, the standards high. Between 8:20 a.m. and 4:10 p.m., the school's two-dozen teen-agers (most of Russian extraction) handle ponderous doses of religion, literature, history, geography, music and art. Some courses are conducted only in Russian, others in English.

Without Russian School
"There was no single Russian school for 300 years," he said. "The Russians are very egocentric. They have denied the past. The greatest contributions of Russian science and literature were pre-revolutionary."

"Here we want to back the humanities for the humanities. Science for science. We offer no special lessons about communism. Just logic. It is a question of belief. I believe there is a God."

FBI Reveals Bribery Try

DAYTON, Ohio (UPI) — A New York electronics executive was arrested here Saturday and charged with attempting to bribe Air Force personnel to obtain a \$9.5 million government contract.

The FBI said Morton Siegel, 57, vice president of Loral Electronics, Bronx, N. Y., was arrested as he was boarding a New York-bound plane at Dayton Municipal Airport.

The FBI charged the bribery attempt occurred at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base here.

An FBI spokesman said Siegel was placed under surveillance when he arrived by plane from New York and was met by an unidentified government employee at the field.

Court Seeks School Plans To Integrate

School officials in Alabama's two largest cities — Birmingham and Mobile — were under federal court orders to hand over plans today for the state's first school desegregation below the college level.

School officials in neither city have given any indication of what the plans will include.

Birmingham, which several months ago was the scene of some of the South's most massive racial demonstrations to date, presently is desegregating some downtown facilities under an agreement between businessman and Negro leaders. Mobile also has begun desegregating some downtown facilities.

At White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., Alabama Gov. George Wallace planned to introduce a package of anti-integration resolutions at the Southern Governors' Conference.

In Chicago, a civil rights leader charged his organization was "double-crossed" when Rep. William L. Dawson, D-Ill., failed to meet with his group as promised to discuss civil rights.

Elsewhere in the city racial incidents during the weekend were scattered, after two weeks of demonstrations in protest of mobile school buildings in predominantly Negro neighborhoods.

Chicago civil rights groups insist mobile school buildings are designed to keep Negroes in Negro neighborhoods.

Racial developments elsewhere: New York: Roy Wilkins, executive secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), said Sunday the civil rights organization is "continuing" to fight laws against miscegenation. Wilkins said the NAACP "moved into that arena some time ago."

Washington: A White House-sponsored women's committee Sunday night announced a six-point program designed to let Negro children attend classes "without fear" this fall at 113 newly desegregated schools in southern and border states. The committee reported that more schools are desegregating for the first time this year than in the past seven years.
