Roseburg Whips Idaho; Faces Billings In Final

ROSEBURG (UPI) — Roseburg makes its bid tonight for a place in the American Legion junior baseball world series.

The Oregon team will face Billings, Mont., in the finals of the six-day, double-elimination regional tournament here. The winner gets a trip to Keene, N.H., for the national playoffs.

Roseburg gained the right to meet Billings by scoring five runs in the second inning and going on to record a 6-4 win over Lewiston, Idaho, Tuesday night.

The local team defeated Billings 8-4 in the opening round of the tourney Thursday but lost to the same club 5-4 in 10 innings Sunday night.

Williams to Pitch
Dick Williams is scheduled to be Roseburg's starting pitcher in the finals.

Mike Blomberg's homer with Jerry Boucek and winning pitcher Ran Cool on base capped the scoring in the five-run inning. Dave Sevall singled in Lance

Casebeer and Cool batted in Sevall with a single for the first two runs in the frame.

The winners finished their scoring in the seventh inning when Cool, Blomberg and Artie McDonald collected consecutive singles to load the bases and Jim Beamer hit a sacrifice fly.

Cool registered his 16th victory in 17 decisions this season. He was relieved in the seventh by Williams. Losing pitcher was Bob Kidwell.

Steve Arnold hit a three-run triple in the seventh for Lewiston's last runs.

WBA Facing Criticism
MIAMI BEACH (UPI) — The World Boxing Association (WBA), buffeted by criticism that it has no control over the fight game, saw more clouds rising at its 44th annual convention today with the threat of two big states to "go it alone."

If the two — California and Illinois — should drop out of the WBA, they would join New York and Michigan as the only non-member states in the country.

Neither state sent a delegation to the meeting here, but representatives of their athletic commissions said Monday they were unhappy with the association.

Babe Ruth Tournament Play Opens

FARMINGTON, N.M. (UPI) — The Babe Ruth League world series was in its second day today with four games scheduled in the winner's bracket of the double elimination tourney.

In the opener at noon, Klamath Falls, Ore., met Joplin, Mo. Fredrick, Md., played Puerto Nuevo, Puerto Rico, at 2 p.m. in the other day game.

Farmington, N.M., a winner Monday night, meets Tulsa, Okla., in the first night game at 6 p.m., and Oakland, Calif., plays Atlanta, Ga., also a winner Monday night, in the 8:30 p.m. game.

In opening day action Monday, Farmington smashed Frankfurt, Germany, 6-0, with Farmington pitcher Doug Vaughan pitching the fourth one-hitter in Babe Ruth League world series play.

Atlanta beat Oak Lawn, Ill., in the second game 10-5. Three errors, a balk and two wild pitches in the fourth inning gave Atlanta a big five-run inning.

For Want Of A Stopper Giants Hopes Down Drain

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — For want of a stopper, the San Francisco Giants' pennant hopes appeared to be going down the drain today.

The Giants returned home from St. Louis 6 1/2 big games back of league-leading Los Angeles after being swept three straight at St. Louis. They now are in third place, a game back of the Cards.

St. Louis entered the bottom of the ninth trailing 7-5 Monday but pulled out an 8-7 decision. It was almost an exact duplicate of Saturday's game when the Giants again took a two-run lead into the bottom of the ninth and then blew the contest. Manager Alvin Dark just can't get his crew of ex-American League relievers to hold a lead.

The hated Dodgers meanwhile have the league's best in this department in Ron Perranoski, which might explain the difference between the two clubs so far.

San Francisco trailed 5-4 entering the ninth at St. Louis Monday and Harvey Kuenn greeted ex-Giant hero "Sad" Sam Jones with an infield hit. A grounder moved him to second and Willie Mays singled him home. Ed Bailey was walked and then Felipe Alou became a hero for a few brief moments with a booming triple to dead center.

But in the Cards' half, Billy Hoelt walked Bill White who had hit a two-run homer in the ninth off Hoelt that doomed the Giants Saturday.

This time, it was Ken Boyer who did the damage as he put to, Cubs 21.

With time running out in the NL race, they must win at least two of three from Los Angeles this time to keep their pennant hopes alive.

And should the Dodgers sweep this series as they did last month it will be bye bye Redbirds.

Leave Giants Reeling
The Cardinals left the defending champion Giants reeling on the ropes and 6 1/2 games off the pace.

The Giants took a 7-5 lead in the top of the ninth with a three-run burst that featured Felipe Alou's two-run triple. Alou, though, wound up as the goat when the Cards pushed across three runs in the bottom of the inning for their hard-earned victory.

Bill White walked to lead off the frame and Ken Boyer followed with his second two-run homer of the game to tie the score. Jack Fisher relieved Billy Hoelt at this point and retired the next two batters before Julian Javier singled.

Catcher Tim McCarver then singled to right center. When Alou bobbled the ball, Javier

scored all the way from first on the hit and error.

Sam Jones, although nicked for the only other NL game.

A pair of home runs by Max Alvis powered the Cleveland Indians to an 8-3 victory over the Boston Red Sox in the lone American League game.

The Phillies scored a run off Galen Cisco in the second inning on successive singles by Don Demeter, Clay Dalrymple and Bobby Wine. That was all the
