Firm Will Buy Power Facilities

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Federal Power Commission Tuesday authorized Pacific Power & Light Co., Portland, Ore., to acquire electric facilities in Wyoming and Oregon.

SALEM (UPI)—Machinery for a special election Oct. 15 was thrown into gear today by Jack Thompson, elections supervisor of the Secretary of State office.

With the apparent success of the drive to refer the 1963 legislature's tax bill to the people, Thompson began drafting plans for the statewide election.

He said a voters' pamphlet would have to be prepared and sample ballots mailed out.

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WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Federal Power Commission Tuesday authorized Pacific Power & Light Co., Portland, Ore., to acquire electric facilities in Wyoming and Oregon.

In separate transactions, the company will pay the government \$212,000 for facilities used by the Bureau of Reclamation in Carbon and Sweetwater counties, Wyo.; and buy from Eastern Oregon Electric Cooperative distributing facilities in the Pendleton, Ore., area for \$68,012.

SALEM (UPI)—While thousands of persons throughout Oregon either oppose or support a referendum of the 1963 legislature's \$60 million tax increase package, few of them know what's in the revenue bill.

The package adopted by the legislature includes three major divisions — a liberalized capital gains tax offset by increases in the corporate excise tax, a one-shot speedup of withholding tax collections to be used only if needed, and increases in personal income tax rates.

The personal income tax in Oregon is a flat 3 percent. The package would raise an additional \$44 million. The one-shot speedup would bring in another \$12 million just before the end of the current biennium.

Income Features Listed
The main features of the new personal income tax bill are these:
—Removal of the federal income tax deduction.
—Joint treatment for head of household.
—Students allowed as dependent credit.
—Full extra credit for blind persons.
—One-half extra credit for senior citizens over 65.
—\$22 tax credit for personal and dependence deductions.

Governor Puts Scott On Board
SALEM (UPI)—Harry W. Scott, former Salem School Board chairman and owner of Scott's Cycle Shop, was appointed to a seven-year term which ends Aug. 1, 1970.

The appointment is subject to Senate confirmation. He succeeds Mrs. J. B. Caldwell.

In spite of a late, rainy spring, day-use park attendance increased by about 172,000 persons the first half of 1963 as compared to the same period last year, according to figures compiled by the Parks Division of the State Highway Department.

A car count revealed that from January through June 1962, there were 1,268,159 cars driven to the parks. During the same period of 1963, there were 1,440,324 cars.
