

Preparation Will Ease Back-To-School Problems

Should Be Prepared

Explain this to the child and assure him that you will supply his needs as soon as the teacher indicates what they are.

Check With School
For early registration check the date the school office opens and will be ready to accept students.

Parents should not plan to enter or stay in the classrooms. Teachers are and should be giving all their attention to the students. You should send your child to school in the normal way, walking or by bus. If it should be necessary to take him, say goodbye outside the building. This will be to everyone's benefit.

Children sometimes will build up a fear of the first day. Parents may contribute to this attitude by making a big issue of the first day. It is not advisable to emphasize this. Perhaps it is possible to achieve a gradual approach. Summer schedules might be slowly changed to coincide with those of school days. Generally, activities might be carefully directed toward those faced in school.

Why not have the child play on the school grounds? This may help to develop a more secure feeling.

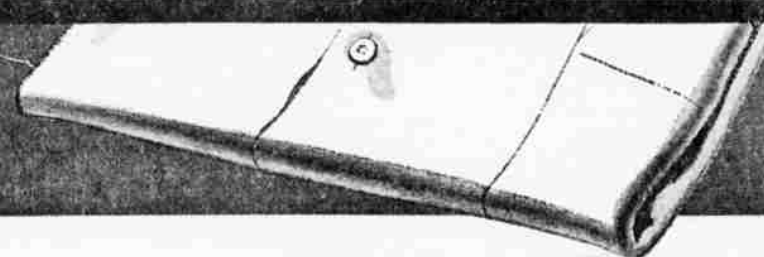

South Works Nice Finesse

Remember the key word "ARCH"? Analyze the lead. Review the bidding. Count the losers. How to make this hand? West opens the king of diamonds and continues with the queen and nine. East takes the third diamond with the ace and leads the ten of clubs. West's queen forces dummy's ace and you play two rounds of trumps. West discards the jack of diamonds on the second trump.

So far you haven't had to do any thinking, but if you want to make this contract you have to find the way to avoid the loss of a heart trick. Most players would try a few rounds of trumps, lead a heart to dummy's ace and finesse the jack on the way back. West would take his queen and the hand would go down the drain.

A few players would review the bidding and come to the conclusion that West needed the queen of hearts for an opening bid and that East would have responded if he held the queen of hearts in addition to the ace of diamonds he had shown. If they tried to drop the queen of hearts they would lose.

A really good player would figure out that he could make the hand if West held the queen of hearts and East the ten. The odds would be against this, but at least it would be his best chance. When South played hearts he would start by leading the jack from his own hand. If West ducked he would let the jack ride. If West covered he would win with dummy's king and would finesse against East's ten of hearts. Either way his opponents would be in the soup.

Record Set For Airline

Bob Moore, manager of the West Coast Airlines terminal office, reported that Wednesday produced the most boardings in a single day ever recorded at the airport here since West Coast began operations at this point.

Moore said that a total of 63 persons boarded airplanes on Wednesday. The previous highest single day's boarding was 61 persons in 1960.

Average daily boardings, Moore said, were about 33.

He could give no special reason for the big jump in the number of persons boarding on Wednesday and indicated that it did not consist of any special mass flight.

'Oldtimers' Booth Set

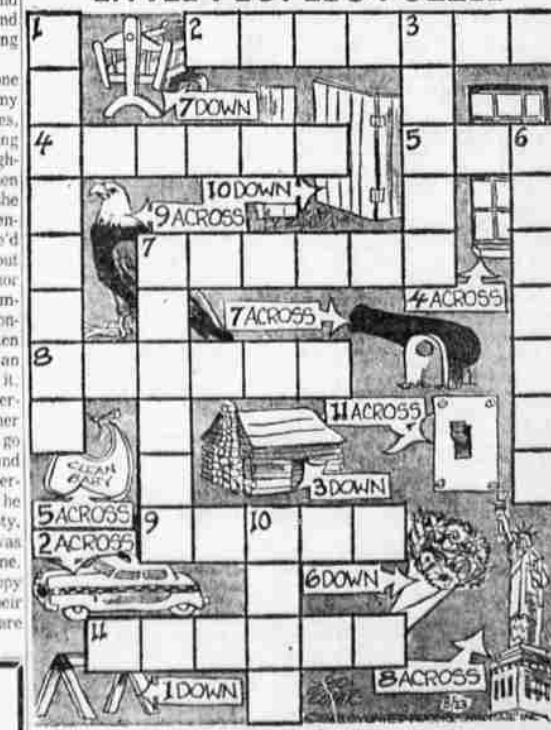
LAKEVIEW — Contact with oldtimers who will visit the Lake County Fair during the weekend of Aug. 31, Sept. 1-2, will be made through the establishment of a registration booth in the exhibit building, according to plans made by the Lake County Historical Society at a meeting held in the Memorial Hall Tuesday evening, Aug. 20.

Mrs. John Orr, who is coordinating the work of collecting historical data for the group organized during the past year, will have charge of arrangements for the booth and the presence of members to handle the registration.

There will be tape recorders on hand to record the stories that the pioneers are willing to tell of the early days of the area. The oldest person to appear each day will be singled out for special recognition.

Fred Peat, president of the group, brought up the subject of incorporation, and local attorneys, T. R. Conn and Forrest E. Cooper, brought out the advantages of incorporation as a charitable organization and affiliation with the Oregon State Historical Society. It was decided to go ahead with such organization so that advantage could be taken of any donations to the society on a tax-free basis.
