Favorites Paired Off In Semis

WILLIAMSTOWN, Mass. (UPI) —Defending titlist Jo Anne Gunderson and former champion Mrs. Anne Quast Wells battle each other today in the semifinals of the 63rd U.S. Golf Association Women's Amateur tournament to see which one gets a shot at writing her name in the record book.

Peggy and a West Coast teenager, Andy Conley, is eyeing a mark in this event which has stood since 1896. Miss Conley, 16, of Spokane, Wash., meets Carol Sorenson in a fight for the other half of Saturday's 36-hole final at the Taconic Golf Club.

The unshakable Miss Gunderson, a Providence, R.I., blonde, is after her fourth title in seven years. Should the pretty 24-year-old former Washington state girl win, she would be only the second to capture this event four times.

Mrs. Edwin Vane Jr. was the other. She won it six times during the late 1920's, five times as Miss Glenna Collett.

Entering today's match, Miss Gunderson, thanks to Thursday's putting performance, was one-over par for 69 holes played this week on the par-72 layout.

Mrs. Wells, who played three more holes, was three over today. Miss Conley, if she wins today, would be in position to become the second 16-year-old to gain the crown. Miss Beatrice Hoyt, youngest tourney winner, did it at age 16 in 1896, the second year of the tourney.

Miss Gunderson, when she won it in 1957 at 18, was the second youngest.

By United Press International Cokey Dick Stuart may be all talk and a yard wide, but he can always say he topped Ted Williams.

And don't worry about the big uninhibited Boston first baseman—he'll say it all right because it happens to be true in one respect, anyway.

When the Pirates traded Stuart to the Red Sox last winter, so the story goes, he was asked whether he felt he would hit more homers than Williams did at Fenway Park.

Stuart promptly inquired: "How many did he hit his first year up?"

Informed that Williams had belted 31 homers his first season with the Red Sox, Stuart said: "I oughta' hit more than that."

Stuart, the American League home run leader, smashed his 33rd of the year with one on Thursday upped his total to 93—13 ahead of his nearest challenger.

Stuart, however, didn't quite do the job on the White Sox alone. Ed Bressoud drove in six runs with a grand slam homer and two sacrifice flies while rookie Dave Morehead earned his eighth victory with a seven-hitter. Joe Horlen was the loser.

The Yankees retained their 10-game lead even though they dropped a 7-4 decision to the Indians, the Orioles roughed up the Angels, 5-1, and the Athletics beat the Senators, 6-2, in the only other AL games scheduled.

Cleveland rocked Ralph Terry for three homers in handing him his 13th loss against 14 victories. Tito Francona hit his eighth homer and Fred Whitfield and Willie Kirkland each hit his 15th before Terry was chased in the fourth. Jim (Mudcat) Grant gained his 10th victory although he gave up a grand slam to Johnny Blanchard in the sixth.

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Rams Head For Clash In Portland

By United Press International The Los Angeles Rams left Southern California for Portland and a weekend re-match with the Dallas Cowboys today four men lighter on their player roster.

The Rams reduced the squad to 44 Thursday with the release of four men from the active list. In addition, lineman Duane Putnam, who had not been in summer camp this season, was taken off the reserve list and released as a free agent.

Of the four actives dropped, fullback Glenn Shaw was the only veteran. He joined the Rams in the middle of last season after having been on taxi squads of the Chicago Bears and Minnesota Vikings. The other three put on waivers were rookies—Ken Chancellor, center from Houston; Doug Brown, tackle from Fresno State; and Jerry Greenwalt, end from Occidental College.

The Rams finished workouts Thursday for their Saturday night game with the Cowboys, who beat them 17-14 in a pre-season opener in Memorial Coliseum.

The Cowboys, meanwhile, ended heavy drills at Forest Grove in the rain. Head coach Tom Landry welcomed the moisture, saying it gave his team a chance to get used to a slippery ball. He ran the Texas club through its entire offense.

They won the third and final game of their series with the

Dodgers, 3-2, Thursday night and it probably was more in the nature of a consolation victory than anything else.

The disappointed Cards, who lost the first two games of the showdown series, had the satisfaction of snapping the Dodgers' seven-game winning streak. That was mighty small consolation considering that the Dodgers still lead the National League by 6 1/2 games today.

What the sad situation amounts to for the Cardinals is this:

They came into Los Angeles last Tuesday all hepped up about their pennant chances because they had taken three in a row from the Giants and were "only" 3 1/2 games back. But they lost a full game — plus a precious opportunity — by the time they left L.A.

Meet Once Again

The Cardinals have one more shot at the Dodgers when they meet them again for a three-game set in St. Louis starting Sept. 16 but by then it may be too late.

The Cards broke a 2-all tie Thursday night when Ken Boyer doubled in the sixth inning and came home with the winning run on Julian Javier's single.

Ernie Broglio won his 14th although he departed in favor of Ray Sadecki in the eighth. Don Drysdale suffered his 14th defeat against 16 victories.

Giants Beat Braves

In the only other NL games scheduled, the Giants snapped their five-game losing streak with an 8-6 victory over the Braves and the Pirates beat the Cubs 9-3.

Juan Marichal won his 19th for the Giants even though Milwaukee's first baseman Joe Torre nicked him for a grand slam homer in the eighth inning.

Roberto Clemente's grand slam homer was the key blow in a five-run ninth inning rally that cemented the Pirates' victory over the Cubs.

Giants Face Cincinnati Series

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—San Francisco Giants manager Al Dark hopes his bullpen won't see red this weekend.

Nothing would please Dark more than to see Jack Sanford, Billy O'Dell and Billy Pierce go the distance in the San Francisco's three upcoming games with the Cincinnati Reds.

The Giant leader switched from O'Dell to Juan Marichal against the Milwaukee Braves Thursday, mainly because of worry over his bullpen.

"The bullpen is weak and tired and if O'Dell can't go the distance, I don't know who I would have had," Dark said after Marichal snapped the Giants' five-game losing streak with an 8-6 win over the Braves.

Marichal won his 19th game of the season, a career high for him, and cut the Braves win skein off at five straight. But he had to survive a grand slam homer by

Joe Torre to do it, righthander had an 8-2 lead and had gone three-up-three-down through the fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh innings.

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
