Jamaica—four to five inches above the knee.

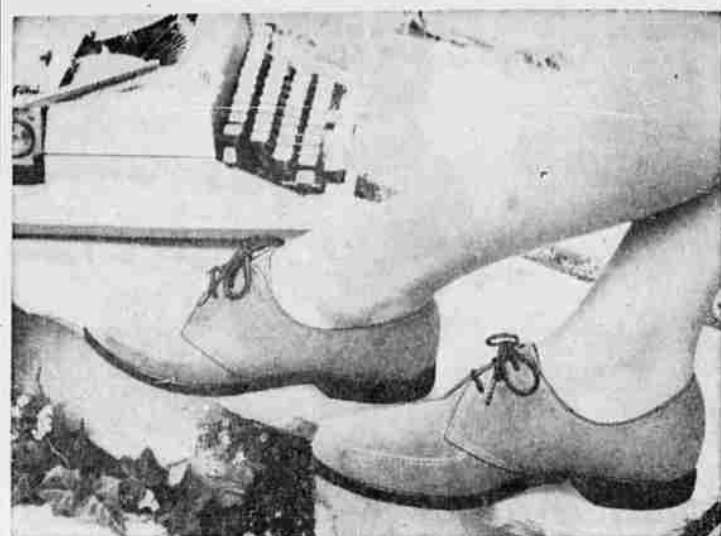
Tennis Short—nine inches above the knee.
