The Klamath Union High prospective football members got their first taste of hard work Monday as Coach Bob "Gabby" Williams put the 80 prospects through the grind in a pair of first-day drills.

Williams said that more would be out today because several still had to take their physicals before beginning practice sessions. And then the Babe Ruth team arrived Monday afternoon and several boys off that team will be hanging up their spikes and donning the football equipment today.

The team Monday was put through several healthy and invigorating exercises before going through some dummy scrimmages and several maneuvers to get their bodies into condition for body contact by working with the heavy dummies.

There were no first-day dropouts from the drills but Williams said he would know more about that when today's drills got underway. The first one began at 9:30 this morning and another is slated this afternoon at about 5:30.

There has been no real scrimmage as yet but one is planned Thursday when the first cut will be made. Williams said that the first cut will be made after the scrimmage and then the teams for the Chicken 'n' Beans will be decided upon. The game is the annual intra-squad game which begins the season.

The Chicken 'n' Beans game is to be held at Modoc Field Saturday night at 7 o'clock.

Three Rookies Cut By Team

FOREST GROVE (UPI)—Three rookies were dropped from the roster of the National Football League Dallas Cowboys at their training camp here Monday.

Coach Tom Landry reduced the team's roster to 4 players in his final cut. He placed injured Wendell Hayes, a flanker back from Humboldt State, on waivers and released defensive tackle John Cornett from Rice and defensive halfback Nat Whitmyer from Washington.

Hayes is scheduled to have an operation on his leg this week. The Cowboys, who dropped a 20-17 decision to the Los Angeles Rams at Portland Saturday night for their first defeat in three exhibition starts this season, loosened up in a workout Monday.

They meet the San Francisco 49ers in another exhibition game at Bakersfield, Calif., Friday night.

If Stan Musial is as sharp with his words as he is with his bat, there's another dark cloud hanging over Los Angeles.

The Dodgers, who apparently had wrapped up the National League pennant with a seven-game win streak last week, continue to be their own worst enemies as the race heads for the treacherous September stretch.

Musial promised Monday after his St. Louis Cardinals had whipped the San Francisco Giants, 6-3, that "we've still got a chance to overtake them."

The Dodgers then added life to the prophecy by dropping a 3-

decision to the Cincinnati Reds to creep within 5½ games of the league lead.

Los Angeles now has lost four of five games in its home park following the impressive streak and 1962 isn't so far behind that the players don't remember.

The Milwaukee Braves shugged the Houston Colts, 11-7, in Monday's only other National League contest.

American League action was limited to a two-night doubleheader at Washington between the Minnesota Twins and the Senators. Minnesota lost a chance to gain a firmer hold on second place by dropping the nightcap, 7-3, after capturing the first game, 5-2.

Gordy Coleman provided the major share of the batting support with his ninth home run of the year following a single by Frank Robinson in the fourth inning. The Reds picked up their final run in the eighth when Tommy Harper scored from first base on a Vada Pinson single and a poor relay home by Junior Gilliam.

The lone Dodger score came in the fourth when Tommy Davis singled home Willie Davis, who had walked. Don Drysdale (16-15) was the losing pitcher.

The Cardinals pushed across three runs in the ninth inning to snap a two-game losing slump.

resounding back-to-back homers by Harmon Killebrew and Bob Allison sparked the second-place Twins to their opening game victory. Dick Stigman, with late-inning relief from Bill Dailey, evened his record at 11-11. But the Twins' edge over Chicago was narrowed to a half-game again when the Senators capitalized on Dick Phillips' homer and erratic Minnesota pitching to capture the nightcap. California, OSU Resume Relations

CORVALLIS (UPI) — Oregon State University and the University of California today announced resumption of football relations.

The schools said they have agreed on home-and-home games to be played at Berkeley Nov. 8, 1969, and in Corvallis Nov. 7, 1970.

The Beavers and the Bears have not met on the gridiron since 1960, when California scored a 14-5 victory here.

California has won 15 games and Oregon State 11 in the series which started in 1905.

The Beavers now have football games scheduled with all members of the Big Six. They meet Southern California this fall and UCLA in 1967 and 1969. Stanford, Washington and Washington State have remained on the OSU schedule since the breakup of the Pacific Coast Conference.
