Herald And News Adds Noted Political Columnist

The noted political correspondent and Pulitzer Prize-winning author, William S. White, becomes a regular Washington columnist for the Herald and News, starting next Wednesday. Thereafter, his by-lined articles reporting and analyzing the key developments in national and international affairs will appear three times a week in these pages.

Long known as one of the ablest members of the Washington press corps, Bill White has spent almost two-thirds of his 35-year career as a newspaperman in covering the complexities of politics and government at the national and international levels. Starting as a full-time reporter for the Austin (Tex.) Statesman while a sophomore at the University of Texas, he got a job with the Associated Press upon leaving college, and was soon transferred to its Washington Bureau, where he served successfully as a political reporter, feature writer and political correspondent. He became general night editor and, later, war editor for the organization's general offices in New York, and then went overseas as an assault war correspondent. He crossed

the English Channel with the invasion forces on D-Day. Joining the New York Times in 1945, White returned to the nation's capital as a Washington correspondent. In 1956 he became chief congressional correspondent for that paper—a post which he resigned April 1, 1958, to become Washington columnist for United Features. His column now appears regularly in more than 130 leading newspapers throughout the country.

In addition to his long and intimate knowledge of the Washington scene, White has an unusual ability to recognize political "news in the making"; to sense, dig for and clearly, concisely report the underlying facts that will make future headlines. Though now technically known as a Washington "columnist" rather than a "correspondent," Bill White still regards himself as a political reporter, and his job as primarily

that of reporting the most significant news developments fully, clearly and candidly, with analysis and occasional comment.

In 1955, White received the Pulitzer Prize in Letters for his distinguished biography of the late Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio. He is also the author of "Citadel: the Story of the U.S. Senate," and of the much-discussed, "Majesty and Mischief: A mixed tribute to F.D.R.," published in November, 1960. He is a contributing editor of Harper's Magazine, has written numerous articles on national affairs for many other leading periodicals.

He has held the chair of Regents Professor at the University of California in Berkeley, delivering a series of lectures on national politics and journalism to graduate students and faculty members. He has also lectured at a number of other institutions, including the Air War College, Mount Holyoke College, and Princeton University.

White was born in DeLeon, Tex., on May 20, 1907, and attended the University of Texas for three years (1923-1926). He and his wife, the former Jane McConnell of Boston, Mass., live in the Chevy Chase section of the District of Columbia. They have two daughters, Lucia and Victoria. White is a member of Sigma Delta Chi, the Overseas Writers, P.E.N. International, and the National Press Club.

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Teamsters Seek National Contract

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Teamsters union has moved to seek a uniform national contract for 450,000 drivers, warehousemen, mechanics and clerks in the trucking industry.

A national study committee composed of the Teamsters Executive Board, and representatives from 50 joint councils and big freight locals adopted a resolution Wednesday endorsing national negotiations in 1964.

The committee decided to call upon each of the four Teamster conferences in the country to name 10 delegates each and two alternates in a national policy-negotiating unit.

Union President James R. Hoffa said he believed the first national contract would take effect in his own Central Conference, consisting of 12 Midwestern states.

The resolution, adopted at a two-day meeting, declared that national bargaining would remove wages as a factor in competition among truckers. A single national contract also would free the unions to use boycotts and selective strikes across the nation. They are now prohibited where separate contracts are in effect.

Hoffa said the next step is to get about 600 Teamster locals, with members who would be affected by such a contract to grant powers of attorney to the national negotiating group.
