## Chamber Committee Offers Six Points Opposing Treaty

Six points why the U.S. Senate should refuse to ratify the U.S.-Soviet nuclear test ban treaty were presented to the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce by its National Affairs Committee during the weekly meeting of the chamber Wednesday.

Committee Chairman Ross Ragland recommended that the chamber's board of directors oppose the ratification of the treaty and then express its position to Oregon state senators in Washington, D.C.

Brooks Dickman, presiding for President Jim Monteith and Vice President Jim Stillwell who were absent, accepted a motion deferring the matter until the next meeting of the board.

After presenting his recommendation, Ragland cited Russia's bad faith in the past and the risk that the U.S. might be lulled into a false sense of security as two principal reasons why the treaty should not be ratified.

Ragland further pointed out that it is unrealistic to assume that a test ban would result in an end to the production of nuclear weapons. A treaty such as the one devised in Moscow would not stop a non-signatory country which desires to become a nuclear power from manufacturing such weapons, he said.

On a fourth point, Ragland said that the establishment of such a treaty would tend to increase world tension, not decrease it. Non-signatory countries may begin testing and "get ahead of the present nuclear powers," increasing international tension, he explained. In addition, there would be suspicion that Russia might cheat or abrogate the treaty without warning, Ragland added.

On another point, Ragland stated that such a treaty could interfere with the development of peaceful uses of atomic energy as tactical weapons and also would curtail the development of anti-missile defenses in the U.S.

In conclusion, there is nothing in the treaty that couldn't be accomplished by an agreed moratorium between the two nations, he remarked.

In other business, Dickman announced that the chamber had received a letter from Gov. Mark O. Hatfield in which the governor commented that he had requested the state highway engineer to investigate why corrections had not been completed on a highway sign in Weed, Calif., according to a proposal made in April.

The sign reads "Portland via U.S. 99 and Klamath Falls via U.S. 97." The chamber has sought to have changed that part of the

Howard said most of the bicycles stolen are taken at night from yards and that a simple lock would discourage virtually all of the thieves, most of whom are juveniles.

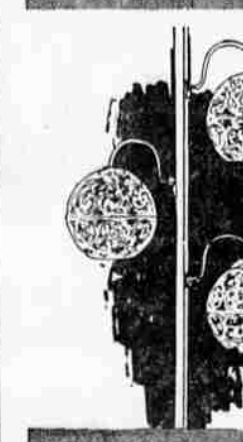
