Union Members Ratify Contracts

PORTLAND (UPI)—Officials of the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) and Lumber and Sawmill Workers Union (LSW) announced today their members have ratified three-year contracts with the Timber Operators Council and three independent firms.

The contracts call for wage increases of 20 1/2 cents an hour.

The independents are Potlatch Forests Inc. of northern Idaho and Montana and two Tillamook firms, Diamond Lumber Co. and American Wood Preserving Co. of Harvey Nelson, president of the IWA's Region 3, said workers voted overwhelmingly in favor of the TOC agreement in a referendum conducted by that union. He declined to give figures.

The LSW let it up to its local 29,000 workers this summer to approve or reject the contract, and Ted Prusia, executive secretary of the Willamette Valley District Council, said all have gone along.

Prusia said LSW locals already have signed contract with about half of the TOC firms, but some of the 100 members of the employer organization have balked at the terms. He said negotiations are continuing. The TOC does not have the power to bind its members to the contract, which was agreed upon Aug. 15.

The announcements today left the Northwest lumber industry dispute which at one time idled 29,000 workers this summer in what Prusia called the "mopping up" stage.

The only plants still strike-bound are the U.S. Plywood Corp. operation of Anderson, and Yamhill Plywood Co. at McNamara. The latter is operating with non-union labor.

Both unions still are negotiating with several independent firms, among them Boise Cascade Corp., Brooks-Seaton Corp. of Bend, McCloud River Lumber Co. of McCloud, Calif., and Martin Products at Sutherlin and Oakland, Ore.

Students Who Visited Cuba Fearful Of Future

MADRID (UPI)—A group of 54 American students who defied a government ban on travel to Cuba Tuesday were reported worried about the effect the trip will have on their future.

Several have refused to give their names or home towns to reporters on the ground they might face dismissal from colleges or universities if they are identified.

They were expected to fly to New York Thursday and face a Department of State investigation for violation of the Cuba travel ban. Maximum penalties are five years in prison and a \$50,000 fine.

Some of the group, which flew into Madrid Monday night, talked glowingly of the seven-week tour of the Caribbean island. The group was invited by the Cuban Student Federation and the Cuban Student Union.

One member of the group, Clinton M. Jenks of Monroe, La., said Tuesday the trip disillusioned him about Cuba under Premier Fidel Castro.

"I don't know how they lived the thousands of schools," he said, "but I am sure the people of Cuba never lived worse than they do now."

"They told us the people were better off now but I don't believe it," he said.

The 20-year-old drama student made the trip with his wife, Clara. He grew a beard during the trip but had it shaved off here Tuesday.

Other youths, who declined to give their names, said "Cuba was great. Castro has given his people much better living conditions than before."

Richard Thorne of Berkeley, Calif., said the group traveled all over Cuba. "What impressed me was the thousands of schools," he said. "Castro is certainly trying to educate the people."

Robert Katika of San Francisco said the State Department ban on travel to Cuba and Communist China didn't worry him.

One member of the group, Christian Lee Rainer, 23, of San Francisco, was arrested by Spanish police on arrival because he had no passport, but was released Tuesday night when the U.S. Embassy intervened. Rainer said he lost his passport in Cuba last week.

Show To Draw 711 Dogs

A record entry of 711 canines from throughout the United States and Canada will compete for various trophies and awards at the 14th Annual All Breed Dog Show slated for 9 a.m. Saturday, at the Klamath County Fairgrounds Pavilion Building.

Dogs will vie for awards in categories of Best in Show, Best of Group and Best of Breeds. In the later event, each breed will have at least five entrants before prizes will be awarded, according to Dave Penny, chairman of the show.

Entries in the show will range in size from Chihuahuas to the Great Pyrenees, a pure white canine standing about 32 inches high and weighing approximately 150 pounds.

The annual dog show, sponsored by the Klamath Falls Dog Fanciers, was first held in 1950 and attracted some 350 entries. Since then the annual list of entries has gradually increased until last year the event was ranked 110th in the nation with 600 dogs competing in the show.

Judges for this year's competition include Dr. A. A. Milten, Rock Hall, Md.; Anton B. Korbel, Hillsborough, Calif.; and Maurice L. Baker, Minneapolis, Minn.

In addition to Penny, the local committee includes Betty Perrin, Larry Bergman, George Rydzek and William Canton.
