

# Spokane Sews Up PCL Title

The Spokane Indians, under the fine managerial direction of Danny Ozark, are the Northern Division champions of the Pacific Coast League.

The Indians clinched the title prior to the end of their game Friday night as Hawaii was downed by Oklahoma City to fall too far behind to catch the Indians, even if the Islanders won every remaining game and Spokane lost all of its games.

The new champions took over first place in the division on July 1 and never relinquished the top spot. They will meet the winner of the Southern Division in a best-of-seven series starting at Spokane Sept. 19 to decide the league champion.

Ozark annexed the title in his first campaign as head man of the Indians. Spokane won the title in 1960, when the league was not divided, by 11 1-2 games over Tacoma. Pedro (Preston) Gomez was the manager then.

Spokane lost its game with Portland, 4-2. Oklahoma City downed Hawaii, 4-1; Dallas-Ft. Worth edged Salt Lake City, 4-1, in the first game but the night cap was rained out. Tacoma whipped Denver, 6-3, and Seattle took San Diego, 4-1.

# Dodgers Defeat Giants, Spoil Defense Chance

The Giants are dead.

They were buried for all general purposes Friday night, nice and proper like by the Dodgers, who often said a few kind words over them after applying the coup de grace with a 3-1 victory.

Don Drysdale delivered the eulogy and when it was all over the Giants had dropped to third place and the Dodgers had increased their National League lead to seven games.

Drysdale not only scattered nine hits in winning his 17th, but he also singled home what proved to be the winning run off loser Juan Marichal in the fifth inning and had the added satisfaction of holding his long-time nemesis, Willie McCovey, hitless.

A crowd of 54,849, which swelled the Dodgers' home attendance to 2,022,327, saw their heroes make it two-out-of-two over the Giants in the current four-game series.

Chuck Hiller's single, an infield out and a single by Willie Mays put the Giants ahead in the first inning but that run turned out to be the Giants' only one of the game.

**Deadlock In Third**  
The Dodgers tied the score in the third when Jim Gilliam's double brought home Willie Davis, and Drysdale broke the tie by singling home John Roseboro in the fifth. Los Angeles added an insurance run off Don Larsen in the eighth. He left the base to have X-rays taken.

The Dodgers victory was marred only by the fact that shortstop Maury Wills jammed his ankle when he stole second base in the eighth. He left the game to have X-rays taken.

The Milwaukee Braves climbed into fourth place with a 3-1 victory over the New York Mets, the St. Louis Cardinals dropped the Philadelphia Phillies into fifth place by beating them, 11-6, Cincinnati nipped Pittsburgh, 2-1, and the Houston Colts cuffed the Chicago Cubs, 5-1.

The Braves, who are the hottest club in the majors at the moment, made it four in a row and 14 victories in their last 17 games by defeating Tracy Stallard of the Mets.

**Shaw Helps LeMaster**  
Milwaukee put together three singles and a sacrifice fly for two runs in the fifth and Lee Maye's second double of the game added a final run in the seventh. Denny LeMaster (11-3) was the winner with help from Bob Shaw in the seventh.

The Cardinals kayoed Ray Culp during a five-run rally in the seventh that unraveled a 3-all tie with the Phillies. Two-run singles by Curt Flood and Dick Groat were the key blows during the outburst and Ken Boyer belted his 10th homer with two on in the ninth.

Cincinnati manager Fred Hutchinson had to employ three pitchers to hold Pittsburgh to one run after the Reds scored both their runs in the first inning on a wild pitch by Don Schwall and Gordon Coleman's single.

Joe Nuxhall, credited with his

12th win in 18 decisions, checked the Pirates on three hits through the first seven innings but gave up a run in the eighth and was relieved by Al Worthington. Bill Henry then took over for Worthington in the ninth.

Spindly Pete Rynn, who generally confines himself to singles and doubles, hit his second homer of the season with one on in the first inning to highlight a three-run upswing by the Colts that beat the Cubs.

Runnels' shot came off loser Cal Koonce, who failed to survive the first inning. Ken Johnson struck out nine and yielded six hits for his seventh victory against 17 defeats.

## The 10 COMMANDMENTS OF SAFETY

- 1 Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This is the first rule of gun safety.
- 2 Guns carried into camp or home, or when otherwise not in use, must always be unloaded, and taken down or have actions open, guns always should be carried in cases to the shooting area.
- 3 Always be sure barrel and action are clear of obstructions, and that you have only ammunition of the proper size for the gun you are carrying. Remove oil and grease from chamber before firing.
- 4 Always carry your gun so that you can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you stumble; keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.
- 5 Be sure of your target before you pull the trigger; know the identifying features of the game you intend to hunt.
- 6 Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot. Avoid all horseplay while handling a gun.
- 7 Unattended guns should be unloaded; guns and ammunition should be stored separately beyond reach of children and careless adults.
- 8 Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun; never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.
- 9 Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water; when at target practice, be sure your backyard is adequate.
- 10 Avoid alcoholic drinks before or during shooting.
