Ford Wins 20th As NY Nears American Crown

Even manager Ralph Houk should be ready to admit now that the New York Yankees have tucked away their 14th American League pennant in 17 years.

If Houk needs any coaxing, this little bit of intelligence should convince him:

The Yankees came-walked past the Labor Day milestone with a 12-game lead — their biggest bulge at this stage of the race in 22 years. Back in 1941, New York led the AL by 18½ games after Labor Day action and finished the season 17 games in front of the second-place Boston Red Sox.

Whitely Ford became the American League's first 20-game winner of the season when the Yankees turned back the Detroit Tigers 5-4 Monday in the opener of their holiday doubleheader.

Tigers Win Nightcap
The Tigers bounced back to win the nightcap 2-1 behind Hank Aguirre, but what did that matter to the Yankees? Their nearest "pursuers," the Chicago White Sox, also settled for a split against the Los Angeles Angels — pulling out an 8-7 victory after losing the opener 7-5.

The Cleveland Indians blasted the Washington Senators 15-3, and then dropped an 8-7 verdict; the Boston Red Sox turned back the Baltimore Orioles twice, 4-3 and 2-0, and the Minnesota Twins won a pair from the Kansas City Athletics, 6-2 and 3-1.

Mickey Mantle returned to the Yankees' starting lineup for the first time in almost three months in the nightcap and banged out a pair of singles in three official at-bats.

The Angels snapped Gary Peters' 11-game winning streak in the opener. However, the White Sox rallied to win the second game on J. C. Martin's two-run double in the ninth inning.

Hit Twelve Homers
Twelve homers were hit in the Indians-Nats' twinnish — six in each game. Homers by Larry Brown, Max Alvis, John Romano and Joe Adcock produced 10 Cleveland runs in the opener. The Senators opened a 6-2 lead in the nightcap on four-inning homers by Don Zimmer, Eddie Brinkman and rookie pitcher Ed Hobaugh, then needed a sacrifice fly by Chuck Hinton in the seventh to preserve the victory.

Bill Monbouquette, with relief help from Dick Radatz, became the first Red Sox pitcher in seven years to win 19 games in one season when he turned back the Orioles in the opener. Rookie Bob Hefner posted his first major league shutout in the nightcap, allowing only five hits.

The Twins used their siege guns to good advantage against the Athletics. Two-run homers by Harmon Killebrew and Bob Allison settled the opener and Jimmy Hall unloaded a two-run clout to back up Lee Stange's five-hit pitching in the nightcap.

Player Defeats

WAUKEGAN, Ill. (UPI)—Gary Player defeated Jack Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer in a \$50,000 golf exhibition Monday with a one under par 69 and a 136 for the 36-hole match.

Nicklaus played the final round in 70 to finish second two strokes behind Player. Palmer slipped to a 74 Monday to finish last in the three-way match.

Player and Palmer were tied with 67's after the first round at Glen Flora Country Club. Nicklaus had a 68.

Player picked up first money of \$20,000 and Nicklaus collected \$16,000 in the exhibition sponsored by a Chicago discount department store. Palmer earned \$14,000.

Cubs Finish Giants' Hopes With Double Wins, 7-5, 6-0

Sandy's still a dandy, and now the Dodgers are hitting, too. That classy combination — very much in evidence on the Labor Day holiday as the Dodgers swept a twin bill from Houston, 7-3 and 7-1, and bagged 20 hits plus Koufax' 21st victory could mean that it's all over but the shouting in the National League pennant race.

Even though the second-place St. Louis Cardinals kept pace with a doubleheader sweep of their own, 6-1 and 6-2 over Pittsburgh, the Dodgers retained a six-game lead with only 25 to go.

And Los Angeles certainly showed no signs of folding as Koufax fanned 13 batters in the opening game to close in on his own National League record of 269 for a season. He now stands at 259 and, the way he's going, could break the record the next time out. His 21 wins are tops in the majors.

Podres Wins Twelfth
Another southpaw, veteran Johnny Podres, picked up the nightcap win, his 12th. While the Dodgers and Cards rolled on, the staggering Giants

dropped two games to Chicago, 7-5 and 6-0, and practically disappeared from the pennant race, 9½ games behind. Cub Dick Ellsworth won his 20th. The Phillies beat the Braves 9-4, while the Mets beat the Reds 5-3, and then lost to Jim Maloney's 20th victory 1-0.

Pitched Complete Games
Bob Gibson and Ron Taylor pitched complete games for the Cards as they kept at least a little pressure on the Dodgers. Gibson also hit his second homer of the year, Ken Boyer's 21st homer helped Taylor win.

The Giants lost Willie Mays in the fourth inning of their opener when he suffered a dizzy spell — due to exhaustion — while at bat. Then Ellsworth beat them in the opener, with the help of relief pitcher Lindy McDaniel, who notched his 18th save. Glen Hobbie rubbed it in on the Giants in the nightcap with a brilliant two-hitter as Ron Santo hit two homers, one a grand slam.

The Phils climbed within a half-game of fourth-place Milwaukee as Cal McLish went the route for his 13th win despite allowing 11 hits, including Hank Aaron's 36th homer.

Jim Hickman hit a first-man-up home run for the Mets to start them on the way to their opening game win behind lefty Al Jackson's six-hit hurling. Then Pete Huse homered to start the second game for the Reds and Maloney took it from there with a three-hitter in which he fanned 13 Mets.
