

Committee Will Be Formed To Investigate Seaside Riot

SEASIDE, Ore. (UPI) — An investigative committee will be formed to look into rioting at this coastal community during the Labor Day holiday weekend, it was disclosed at a Chamber of Commerce meeting Tuesday.

Seaside Chamber President W. A. Ter Har said "we are going to appoint an investigative committee to check out the whole matter. We will go out into the state, everywhere it is necessary to get material for the report which will be forwarded to the city council with recommendations."

About 2,000 young persons clashed with the Oregon State Police riot squad, National Guardsmen and city police and firemen Saturday night and Sunday in the second straight year of Labor Day weekend rioting here. About 70 were arrested.

Report to be Publicized Ter Har said the committee's report would be publicized and "we hope will be accepted by the city."

"We offer no solution to the problems we had last weekend," he added. "We feel that we have failed somewhere along the line. We're not going to point a finger at anyone in particular as being at fault."

There had been reports of a racial movement against Mayor Maurice Payher.

Payher said earlier that a few "trained professional trouble starters, communist-inspired and instructed," led the mobs and touched off the weekend riots.

Mayor Criticizes Laws He criticized state laws which he said "tie the hands of law enforcement officers where minors are involved."

Miss America Beauties Brave Wind And Cold

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (UPI) — The 52 Miss America contestants paraded three miles along the Boardwalk Tuesday night into the teeth of a 20-mile-an-hour wind and met it tooth for tooth by smiling all the way.

The colorful kickoff parade of floats in the 37th annual Miss America pageant was marred by the stiff wind which dropped the temperature several degrees from an 8 p.m., EDT, reading of 73 degrees, plus thick humidity and a disappointing crowd of 150,000. Parade officials had predicted a quarter-million and blamed the lesser turnout on the weather. But the wind had its moments, particularly when it sent the white taffeta-and-nylon ballgown of 19-year-old blonde Miss South Dakota, Heather Paterson, fluttering out behind her float like a pennant and exposing her legs to a cheering line of spectators.

Another favorite of the Boardwalk crowd was striking brunette Miss Tennessee, Martha Ellen Truett, 19, who drew the biggest hand as she perched atop the rear of a convertible dressed in a red silk gown and white fox wrap. The spectators also were enthusiastic about their home state candidate, Miss New Jersey, Janet Adams.

Despite the wind and the chill dampness, Miss Illinois waved and smiled gaily with her grey fox wrap securely draped about her throat to ward off another attack of virus. Blonde Judy Schlieper had been confined to bed since her arrival Monday with a virus condition. She was hustled back to bed immediately after the parade and was expected to compete in the bathing suit competition tonight, barring complications.

Bill Ames, former Chamber of Commerce president, also spoke at the meeting. He read a report made last year following the first riot in the community of 3,900. That report recommended amendment and addition of ordinances to control juveniles in general.

Max Schafer Sr., publisher of the Seaside Signal, said "it is not only our problem. These kids came from all over the northwest. Unless the state police take the lead in whatever action is necessary, I don't know how we're going to cope with the problem."

Eight youths arrested during the rioting went before Municipal Judge John A. Black Tuesday.

Five Plead Guilty Five entered guilty pleas and were sentenced to varying penalties. The three others pleaded innocent. They will have trials later.

Sentenced and fined by Judge Black were: Ronald William Loop, 18, Portland, Ore., two charges, minor in possession of liquor, fine of \$50, plus \$4.30 in costs; disorderly conduct, \$50.

Steven George Halzer, 18, Portland, Ore., minor in possession of alcoholic beverages, fined \$100 and costs with 30-day suspended sentence.

George Barton Ness, 18, Manhattan Beach, Calif., minor in possession of wine, \$50 plus costs.

James Leo Sathre, 20, Kelso, Wash., disorderly conduct, for being on a roof over a police garage ramp, \$75 plus costs.

More youths arrested during the weekend were scheduled to go before Judge Black today.

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Veto Kills UN Rebuke Of Syrians

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI)—Secretary General Thant moved for a full report on the Israeli-Syrian border situation Tuesday following Russia's veto of Security Council action in the latest flareup between the two Middle East neighbors.

Soviet Ambassador Nikolai T. Fedorenko used Russia's 101st veto late Tuesday—the first Soviet veto since June 22, 1962—to kill a U.S.-British resolution implicitly condemning Syria for the "wanton murder" of two Israeli farmers Aug. 19 near the Sea of Galilee.

The slayings were followed by some ground clashes and an aerial dog fight between Israeli and Syrian forces. Both Israel and Syria complained to the United Nations, each charging the other with aggression.

Thant agreed at the end of Tuesday's debate to obtain a full report on the operation of the U.N. truce supervision machinery along the Israeli-Syrian frontier.

Named as the best local dog in show was Prince Thor of Barnstock, a Norwegian Elkhound, owned and handled by William C. Canton, 1030 U'pham Street. It was the second consecutive year that a Norwegian Elkhound has won the award. Last year's winner was King O'Winema Falls, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Donald Alt, Rte. 3, Box 64 of this city.

The show, in its 14th year, was sponsored by the Klamath Falls Dog Fanciers Club.

Shasta Field Gets Lights

MOUNT SHASTA — On Friday evening, Sept. 13, Mount Shasta football fans will see their first home game on a lighted football field when the Mount Shasta Bears entertain Alturas.

Field lighting has been a two-year project of the school and community organizations. The poles have been in place for some time, but the actual wiring by Pacific Power and Light is not scheduled until a week before the game.

The total cost of the lights, according to figures compiled by Gerald Brooks, is \$3,940.97. Donations by local organizations left a balance of \$3,104.17, and this amount was raised by the Bear Claws and presented to the school lighting fund.

Contributors included the school district, \$300; Mount Shasta Lions Club, \$218.40; Rotarians, \$218.40; Maralyn's Cafe, \$50; and Kimberly-Clark, \$50, for a total of \$836.80.

Reds Won't Release AWOL Captain

BERLIN (UPI) — U.S. Army Capt. Alfred Svenson of Scranton, Pa., who went AWOL four months ago and fled to Communist East Germany, was reported trying to escape to the West today.

A U.S. Army spokesman said Svenson sent word through a Western news agency (Reuters) bureau in Berlin's Soviet sector that he is being held in Red Germany against his will.

The 30-year-old American said he had tried to cross the border into West Berlin several times, only to be caught and manhandled by Communist police each time.

Svenson told his story at the news bureau Monday night, and the Army got the word early Tuesday, the spokesman said.

"U. S. authorities attempted later in the day to contact Svenson (presumably during a routine patrol of East Berlin), but were

unable to locate him," he said. Svenson crossed the Iron-Curtain border near Eisenach in a jeep on May 6. The East German agency ADN said he had asked for asylum in Communist territory. Repeated U.S. demands for the return of Svenson and the jeep were ignored by the Russians.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Even for the girls who take it off, the show must go on.

Behind the scenes at the Gaiety Burlesk Tuesday, bump and grind rehearsals were replaced by needle and thread classes.

The girls were busy making tassels and sewing on rhinestones to bits of fluff, hoping to replace the gaps left by a sneak thief who staged a G-string raid on their wardrobes.

Police said the thief slipped into the theater before the opening act on Labor Day and left the girls without a stitch.

According to the police, the thief walked off with about \$473 worth of costumes.

According to theatre manager Sam Goldberg, the police can't tell a custom-made G-string from a fingerprint. He says the costumes were worth about \$3,000.

"Take a G-string," Goldberg said. "Once you get through adding rhinestones and all that garbage, it's worth \$50."

Ginger Lee, the show's featured performer, hinted that the police needed a course in art appreciation.

One piece of her flimsy wardrobe was worth \$750, she hinted.

But even if the girls have only the bare necessities left for their act, Goldberg said the show would go on.
