

Leaders Slate Meet To Boost Export Sales

NEW YORK (UPI)—Sales meetings sometimes are rated, in today's time-budgeted economy, by the prominence of the persons on the speakers' list.

There is one coming up at mid-month in Washington which should have not an empty seat in the house.

The speakers' line-up is headed by the President and runs along through five cabinet members, plus other lesser officials.

It is a sales conference on a national and international, all-business, all-product scale. Its purpose is to whip up a greater effort in the field of export sales, and to awaken more of American industry to the sale opportunities they are offered abroad.

About 200 leaders of government industry and labor have been invited to attend the conference, to be held at the Mayflower Hotel Sept. 17-18. At the Regional Export Expansion Council office here, it is noted that it will be addressed by President Kennedy, Secretary of State Dean Rusk, Secretary of Commerce Luther Hodges, Secretary of Agriculture (Civil) William L. French, Secretary of Labor (Civil) Arthur J. Altmeyer, and Secretary of the Treasury Douglas Dillon.

The past year has seen the reason for such a conference grow in importance. While the United States has a favorable balance of trade, in that it sells more abroad than it buys, it has not been able in the past year to make a sizable dent in the unfavorable balance of payments. Four 4-Hers from Klamath and Lake counties won ribbons for baking at the fair.

Debra Kennedy of Klamath Falls was awarded a blue ribbon for food preparation, and Carolyn Conn of Lakeview and Susan Noble and Maralee Reppe, both of Klamath Falls, won blue ribbons for "food adventures."

Barbara Nicholson of Klamath Falls and Charlotte Wells of Lakeview won blue ribbons for their projects in Clothing V division of 4-H competition.

Clothing V consists of more difficult materials and more complex dresses.

Jeanne Webber of Fort Rock won a blue ribbon in the intermediate division of leathercraft competition.

Trap Foils New York Holdup Try

NEW YORK (UPI)—The ice cream vendor carried a revolver under his white jacket. The street cleaner pushed a container on wheels with a shotgun inside. The taxi driver wore a bulletproof vest, and the animal keepers conferred by walkie-talkie radio.

To the casual eye, there was nothing out of the ordinary in the scene at the Bronx Zoo up until 11:05 a.m. Tuesday.

But at 11:05 the peaceful atmosphere was shattered and the zoo became a jungle setting for human violence.

In a gun battle lasting five minutes and 75 shots, three would-be bandits lost out in their attempt on a \$50,000 bundle of holiday receipts. They were ambushed by the ice cream vendors, street cleaners, animal keepers, and other disguised members of a 50-man platoon of policemen.

The battle left one bandit dead and another critically wounded. A third was captured after a futile escape attempt in a getaway car.

The police trap was organized after detectives received a tip that a zoo truck carrying cash receipts would be held up.

The truck's driver, wearing a khaki zoo uniform, was Detective Kenneth Ford. Another detective, Philip Denney, sat next to him, and four others crouched in the back. All wore armored vests.

At 11:05, two men stepped out of the trees with guns drawn. "They said to us 'This is a stickup. Get your hands up and get off that truck,'" Ford said. "The man on my side fired point-blank at me. I could hear bullets whiz by."

"I ducked low and jumped down. We all piled out of the truck and the battle was on. I managed to get off six shots. They headed for the road right where more of our men were waiting behind the rocks. We all blasted away."

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Goulart Completes Two Tough Years As President Of Strife-Torn Brazil

Brazil's President Joao Goulart observes an important anniversary on Sept. 7.

It was on that date two years ago that he took office after the sudden resignation of Janio Quadros had left Brazil leaderless and on the verge of civil war.

Goulart has regained for his office the powers stripped from it two years ago by a combination of conservative politicians and military leaders. But it has been a rough two years and Brazil, torn by extremists of both left and right, continues to march toward an uncertain future.

The independent foreign policy first proclaimed by Quadros has been maintained, and Goulart and a succession of foreign ministers have continued to cultivate friendly relations with the Communist world.

Pressing Brazil to the right has been the United States, with occasional hints of a cut off of badly needed financial aid.

Pushing to the left are the well-staffed embassies of seven Communist nations.

Tries Moderate Stand
Goulart himself has attempted a moderately leftist stand which

has brought him under fire from both right and left.

In mid-August, Goulart spoke before a leftist workers rally and asked support of his land, tax, banking and other administrative reforms.

Hecklers shouted at him, demanding "where do you stand?"

The Communist-controlled General Labor Confederation has charged that Goulart has "bowed to Yankee pressure" and warned that "the workers can wait no longer for their emancipation."

But the same policies attacked by left-wing labor are not going far enough also are attacked from the right as proof of a charge that Goulart seeks to make himself a Brazilian copy of former Argentine dictator Juan Peron.

Leftists also are angered by Goulart's negotiations with American and Canadian power companies for purchase of their public utility subsidiaries in Brazil. They accuse him of surrendering Brazilian
