

LA Dodgers Defeat Colts, 4-3, In 10 Innings To Continue Pace

Operation lockup is proceeding for the Los Angeles Dodgers in orderly fashion.

Only a year ago the Dodgers were about to make a present of the National League pennant to the San Francisco Giants but this season there is no sign of a repeat performance. In fact, the Dodgers may right now be in the midst of a push that'll put them

out of reach of both the pursuing St. Louis Cardinals and the Giants.

The Dodgers won their fourth straight game and their sixth in their last seven Tuesday night when they rallied to shade the Houston Colts, 4-3, in 10 innings.

The victory enabled them to maintain their six-game lead over the Cardinals and a nine-game bludge over the Giants.

The old pros of the club engineered the comeback — Bill Skowron starting the winning rally with a pinch single, Jim Gillan keeping it going with a single and Wally Moon delivering the tying run with a sacrifice fly before Tommy Davis' game-winning single.

Ron Ferraroski, who retired the Colts after they had taken a 3-2 lead against Larry Sherry in the top of the 10th, received credit for his 14th win against only

2 defeats. Dick Farrell, fourth Houston pitcher, was tagged with his 13th loss compared with 10 wins.

The Cardinals beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 10-5, the Giants romped over the Chicago Cubs, 16-3, the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the Milwaukee Braves, 2-0, and the Cincinnati Reds downed the New York Mets, 5-0, in other NL games.

Football Hall Of Fame Opens Doors Saturday In Canton

CANTON, Ohio (UPI)—The National Professional Football Hall of Fame, conceived by a sports writer and nursed along by a massive community effort, will open its doors Saturday in the birthplace of professional football amidst the glitter of a Hollywood premiere.

A host of dignitaries and football greats will gather to dedicate the hall, a symbolic shrine to a sport that grew from a little-known meeting here 43 years ago into one of the country's great spectator sports.

The opening will climax nearly four years of work by the citizens of this industrial city of 125,000, who gave of their time, effort and money to insure for their city the title, "Cradle of Pro Football."

The idea for a pro football shrine in Canton was originated in 1956 by Germaine Swanson, then a sports writer and now city editor of the Canton Repository. For three years, the idea was considered "too grandiose" for the Canton area. But with encouragement from the management of the Cleveland Browns, the paper started the ball rolling in 1959.

Official sanction by the National Football League (NFL) did not come easily. Numerous other cities were vying for the honor. But a concerted effort by community leaders convinced NFL officials that Canton was the logical site for the hall.

It was 43 years ago this month that representatives of 11 football teams met here to form the American Professional Football Association, forerunner of the NFL. And it was here that the Canton Bulldogs, led by the legendary Jim Thorpe, became the country's first pro team.

Once the NFL had given Canton the go-ahead, a fund-raising drive was initiated by a voluntary Hall of Fame steering committee. In just 30 days, citizens of the area pledged over \$400,000 to make the dream become a reality.

In March of 1962, a permanent board of trustees composed of nine Stark County men and three NFL representatives was formed. One month later, Dick McCann, general manager of the Washington Redskins, was hired to direct the shrine's destiny.

Working out of a small office in a local hotel, McCann supervised the planning and construction of the building and began the task of gathering mementos for the hall.

Ground Is Broken

On Aug. 1, 1962, ground was broken for the hall, an ultra-modern circular structure crowned by a football-shaped dome. NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle officiated at the ground-breaking ceremonies, which featured the first Hall of Fame game between the New York Giants and St. Louis Cardinals.

Last month, workers began putting the finishing touches on the hall. McCann and his staff began moving in the huge collection of mementos and film that will make the hall a tribute to the memory of those who dominated the early years of the sport.

Among the mementos are a Carlisle Indian College jacket once worn by Jim Thorpe; Knute Rockne's helmet and Ernie Nevers' jacket and jersey.

The dedication of the hall also will include the enshrinement of its first 17 members. All of the living inductees except Washington Redskins owner George Preston Marshall, who recently suffered a mild stroke, have agreed to be on hand. Each will be introduced by a nationally known figure.

Already scheduled to appear are Supreme Court Justice Byron (Whizzer) White, a former Colorado All-American back; former Pennsylvania Governor David Lawrence, U.S. Sen. Frank J. Lausche of Ohio, United Steelworkers president David McDonald and Notre Dame's legendary Four Horsemen.

Billed as "football's greatest weekend," the dedication ceremonies will begin Saturday with a parade from downtown Canton to Rayceet Stadium, site of the enshrinement. A tour of the hall for dignitaries and the press will follow. Sunday's program features the second Hall of Fame game between the Cleveland Browns and the Pittsburgh Steelers. Bob Considine will be master of ceremonies for the weekend events.

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Padres Gain First Place Tie With Oklahoma City

Credit young Sammy Ellis with pitching the San Diego Padres into a first-place tie with Oklahoma City in the Pacific Coast League's southern division.

Ellis, a 22-year-old fast-baller, the parent Cincinnati Reds keep hoping will make it "big" in the major leagues one of these seasons, never was better Tuesday night as he struck out 12 batters while pitching the Padres to a 2-1 victory over the Oilers.

The Padres won the game in the ninth when Paul Saul opened the inning with a single. Tommy Helms sacrificed him along to second and he proceeded to third when Ellis was safe on his bunt attempt. Then, the veteran Chicago Ruiz singled sharply through the middle to score Saul with the run that left the Padres and Oilers in a flat-footed tie for first place.

Oklahoma City now has won 79 games and lost 73 while San Diego, which won the PCL title last year, has one less victory and one less loss. Thus, the Padres hold the edge over the Oilers because of that one less loss.

The veteran Russ Kemmerer was matching Ellis pitch for pitch until he pulled a leg muscle in the seventh and was forced to leave the game. Reliever Tom Borland took the loss.

San Diego scored first in the tense game, registering its first run in the second on a triple by Tony Perez and a double by Saul. The Oilers tied it in the sixth on a walk to Jim Mahoney, a sacrifice by Kemmerer and a single by Carroll Hardy.

Today, the Padres open a three-game set with the Hawaii Islanders.

'Borderline' Cases Sweat Out Pro Football Cuts

American Football League players who survived the latest roster cuts were able to breathe easier today, but "borderline" members of National League teams faced another week of waiting for the ax to fall.

The AFL clubs made their final cuts Tuesday, reducing their rosters to the 33-man limit for the start of the 1963 season next week.

In the NFL, all teams were forced to get down to the 46-player limit. The next cut, to 37 men, must be made before next Wednesday.

The New York Jets of the AFL underwent the biggest shakeup Tuesday when head coach Weeb Ewbank released 12 players, including quarterback Les Gruenke. Ewbank also signed three of his former Baltimore Colts players and placed two Jets on the injured reserve list.

Gruenke, a reserve quarterback with the New York Giants in 1959 and 1961, was obtained by the Jets from the Minnesota Vikings last September. He broke into the AFL with a huge pass for three touchdowns against the Oakland Raiders, but the sudden torn knee ligaments.

The popular, former Utah star must have anticipated the ax when he failed to complete a single touchdown pass as the Jets lost three out of four exhibition games.

"Lee looked good in practice but he didn't move the team well enough in the exhibition games," Ewbank said.

The former Colts signed by Ewbank were quarterback Dick Wood, who played last season for the San Diego Chargers of the AFL, fullback Mark Smolinski and right end Dee Mackey.

The Green Bay Packers, preparing for the defense of their NFL championship, traded offensive guard Ed Blaine to the Philadelphia Eagles and asked waivers on fullback Frank Meznik and defensive halfback Doug Hart.

Honkers Undergoing Season Of Rebuilding At Tulelake

The Tulelake Honkers, who had a successful season last year although they didn't win their league title, will be hard pressed this season because of heavy losses by graduation.

The Honkers are in the rebuilding process under a new coach in Oregon State University graduate Darrell La Rue and assistant Gary Straus of Southern Oregon College. Hank Smith, coach last season, remained in the school system but got out of the coaching end of the grind.

La Rue has 12 players back who saw some varsity action last season, but lost several top players by graduation including Mike Todd, Don Osburn, Jim Spedick, Bud Lomelle, Dean Callas and others.

The 12 lettermen include Brad Stezak, Dave Krizo, Rick Krizenbeck, Rich Krizo, Joe Hoyle, Bruce Young, Roy Krizenbeck, Bart Thomas, Rick Fuller, Robert Fensler, Robert Duran, Gary Tatum and Rych Prenger.

"Our step will be slow," related La Rue. The Honkers have some lean sides in Thomas at center, Hoyle at tackle, and Fensler at another tackle.

La Rue and his Honkers have a very rugged schedule to play. The first game will be against Merrill which will be one of the strongest Class B teams in the state this year if not the strongest. The Honkers were finalists last season and lost five players. And to add to the Honkers' woes is the fact that they upset Merrill last year in the opener, 10-13, and the Honkers will be out for revenge.

The second game will pit them against an always rugged Chiloquin, then Bonanza, Malin, Alturas, McClure, Cedarville and Dorris. Six of the eight Honker games are at home.

Coach La Rue said that his first 11 right now looks like this: Brad Stezak at quarterback, a junior; Roy Krizenbeck at fullback, a senior; junior Robert Fensler and senior Brian O'Neill at tackles; Rick Fuller, senior, and senior Robert Duran at guards; Dick Walters, a junior, at center; Bruce Young, a junior, and Gary Tatum, a junior, at ends; and David Krizo, a sophomore, and Johnny Fairclough, a senior, at the halfback slots.

The Honkers presently have 30 players on the roster. La Rue also lists 17 Jayvee players' names on the roster, all freshmen or sophomores.

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Harris Defends Amateur Title

DES MOINES, Iowa (UPI) — Laron Harris Jr. of East, Okla., will defend his National Amateur golf championship at the Walden Club course starting Sept. 18 in a 36-hole field that includes three other former titleholders.

Charles (Chick) Evans, who won the Amateur crown in 1912 and 1920, Charley Cox, the 1927 and 1928 winner, and Edna Stone, the 1929 champion, are the other three champions entered in this year's tournament.

Stuart Nearing RBI, Home Run Derby In AL

Dick Stuart received a rousing ovation (actually it was more like a Bronx cheer) when he picked up a hot dog wrapper correctly without fumbling it at Fenway Park.

Stuart, of whom it has been said his fielding really isn't so high, it's worse, paid no attention to the "cheers."

The oft-clumsy but always care-free Boston first baseman nonchalantly folded the wrapper and put it in his back pocket.

Maybe he should have left a little room because he also may find out putting two American League crowns in the same place.

Big Stu became the first American League player to drive in 100 runs Tuesday when he poked his 34th homer with one man aboard against Baltimore.

Some purists are bound to point out that the Orioles won the game, 4-3. Others will claim that even though Stuart leads the league in homers and RBI's his .283 batting average leaves him no chance of winning the triple crown.

What's wrong with a double crown? That wouldn't be exactly tin. The only American League other than Stuart with any chance at all of winning two of the three crowns is Al Kaline of Detroit. So Stu is ahead of some pretty good company.

As matters stand now, Stuart has hit more home runs for the Red Sox than he ever did in any one season with the Pirates. That doesn't go for Lincoln of the Western League, though. He hit 66 homers for that club in 1959 and if you don't believe it, ask you have to do is ask him.

Stuart's top one-season RBI total with Pittsburgh was 117 two years ago and he has a good shot at topping that, too.

Only two other games were played in the American League with the Tigers beating the Yankees, 3-2, in 15 innings and the Athletics defeating the Twins by the same score.

Celtics Obtain W. Naulls

BOSTON (UPI) — You can almost hear the cry — "Break up the Boston Celtics" — starting already.

With the loss of backcourt magician Bob Cousy to the Boston College coaching ranks, it looked as though the Celtics would be demoted as world champs this season.

But owner Walt Brown is not about to sit around idly watching his pride and joy go downhill.

He jubilantly announced Tuesday the purchase of high scoring forward Willie Naulls from the San Francisco Warriors for an undisclosed sum (estimated at \$18,000) and a future draft choice. The 6-foot-4 forward UCLA All-American will return to the Celtics Sept. 17.

Brown made no attempt to conceal his glee.

"It was a chance to get a real ball player without giving up any of your regulars," he said. "Despite the fact that he had a poor year last season and was injured for a time, he still is capable of getting us 20 points a game."

"I think he'll team up well with center Bill Russell and that's very important. I feel confident he will be physically all right."

Coach Arnold (Red) Audsbrook was equally delighted.

"We've been looking for him for almost two years," he said. "Naturally when we saw a chance to get him, we jumped for it."

"When Willie was in college he played a running type of game. He hasn't played that way in all the time he has been a pro. But we do, and I think he'll fit in perfectly."

"When we lost Cousy we lost 20 points a game. Naulls is one of the great shooters in the league. He'll get these points back and then some."

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Ralston Has Tough Time Topping Foe

FOREST HILLS, N. Y. (UPI) — From crying out to fire seemed the case today with colorful Dennis Ralston.

Ralston, seventh-ranked in the men's division of the national singles tennis championship, had to fight for his life in a five-set duel with unseeded Owen Davidson of Australia at dusk Tuesday. Southpaw Davidson is ranked only ninth in Australia.

But Ralston's opponent today is unseeded John Newcombe, ranked sixth by the Aussies.

Twenty-year-old Dennis of Bakersfield, Calif., ace of our recent Davis Cup triumph over Mexico, finally wound up with a 6-4, 6-6, 6-4 win over Davidson in the semi-drawings before 2,000 thrilled spectators at the West Side Tennis Club.

Ralston moved into the fourth round with top-seeded Chuck McKinley of San Antonio. They are the only seeded Americans left in the tournament, following Tuesday's upset eliminations of eighth-seeded Tim Richardson of Dallas, Tex., and seventh-seeded Eugene Scott of St. James, N.Y.

College boy David Sanborn of Los Angeles eliminated Richardson, 6-4, 6-6, 6-6, 6-3. Southpaw Thomas Koch of Brazil downed Scott, 4-6, 6-3, 6-3, 6-4.
