PORTLAND (UPI) — George Bayer, an ex-University of Washington football player, has been added to the field of the Portland Open golf tournament scheduled to begin Sept. 19 at Columbia-Edgewater Country Club. Bayer was runner-up to Jack Nicklaus in last year's tournament.

Other recent entries received by tournament chairman John Matschek Wednesday included Charlie Sifford, the only Negro ever to win a P.G.A. scheduled tournament; Frank Boynton, a regular member of the pro circuit from Tampa, Fla.; Rod Funseth, formerly of Spokane, and Tommy Jenkins of Jacksonville, Fla.

Golfers will compete for \$30,000 in prize money at the tournament.

Assault-Battery Charge Pressed Against Pinson

CINCINNATI (UPI) — Cincinnati Reds outfielder Vada Pinson was charged with assault and battery Wednesday night following his second skirmish in little over a year with the same sports writer.

The writer — Earl Lawson of the Cincinnati Post and Times-Star — filed the warrant. He said Pinson "grabbed my neck and shoved me against a wall" of the Cincinnati clubhouse after a night game in which Philadelphia defeated the Reds, 3-2.

Pinson posted \$300 bond and was freed. He was scheduled to appear for a hearing in police court today.

The incident was touched off by a story Lawson wrote for Tuesday editions of the paper in which he said Pinson could win the National League batting championship if he would bunt occasionally.

At the time of the writing, Pinson was third in the league with a .322 average.

Pinson accosted Lawson on his way out of the clubhouse after

interviewing players for a manager Fred Hutchinson told me to bunt. I would. But he hasn't said anything to me about bunting. You don't drive home 85 runs bunting."

"He blocked my path and started waving the story I had written in front of me with profanity flowing," Lawson said. "I started to walk away and he grabbed my shirt around the collar. He pulled me toward him, ripping the shirt. I tried to walk away again and he pushed me up against the wall. I made no retaliation and said nothing. Then I called the police."

Police Enter Clubhouse
Pinson was visibly upset when police entered the clubhouse and advised him to go with them to the station to post bond so they wouldn't be required to get a warrant and take him forcibly. Lawson signed the warrant at the police station and Pinson posted bond immediately and was released.

Pinson did not deny Lawson's accusation. He complained that the writer "always criticizes us when we're on the road, hoping we won't get to read it."

"My job isn't to bunt," Pinson said. "If the man (Cincinnati

Baker Gets Nod As Rams' Caller

The annual last-minute shuffle is on.

With the start of the National Football League season just 10 days away and the American Football League slated for regular season action this weekend, veterans began shuffling back into the starting lineups and the rookie sensations found their places on the benches.

Los Angeles Ram coach Harland Sware, after looking at rookie Ben Wilson and third-year man Art Perkins at fullback for four pre-season games, decided veteran Dick Bass was still the man for the job.

Sware also named Jon Arnett, Bass' running mate at halfback, to start with Bass in the Rams' pre-season finale against San Francisco Saturday night in Los Angeles.

Terry Baker got the nod at quarterback, but vets Roman Gabriel and Zeke Bratkowski are pressing the Los Angeles rookie for the job.

Three Detroit tigers sidelined most of the exhibition season will be back at their old posts against Dallas Saturday in New Orleans. Flanker back Terry Barr, quarterback Milt Plum and halfbacks Larry Ferguson, a first-year man, and Tom Watkins returned after being sidelined by injuries.

St. Louis Cardinals coach Walby Lemm named an all-veteran backfield to meet the Minnesota Vikings at St. Louis Friday

night: quarterback Charley Johnson, halfback Joe Childress, fullback Prentice Gault and flanker Bobby Joe Conrad.

Rookie Ray Poage, at the Vikings' flanker position, was the only first-year man named by coach Norm Van Brocklin in his starting backfield. Fran Tarkenton replaced Ron Vanderkelen at quarterback. Tommy Mason returned to halfback and Bill Brown to fullback.

"Holdouts" Sonny Jurgensen and King Hill of the Philadelphia Eagles were scheduled to meet today with general manager Vince McNally. Jurgensen and Hill, the Eagles' two quarterbacks, left the Eagles' training camp abruptly Wednesday in a move to have their 1963 contracts renewed and signed. They had been playing pre-season games without contracts.

Earl Faison, another "holdout," agreed to terms Wednesday with the San Diego Chargers of the AFL. Faison, the AFL rookie of the year in 1961 at defensive end, had been playing pre-season games without a contract.

Head coach Sid Gilman of the Chargers named veteran quarterback Tobin Rote to start in the season opener Sunday against Buffalo.

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Wright Tops Fem Golf Tournament

SPOKANE (UPI) — The winningest professional woman golfer, Mickey Wright, of Dallas, Tex., leads a bulging field of golfers into the fourth Spokane Women's Golf Association tournament which gets under way here today at the Esmeralda golf course.

Miss Wright, who is no stranger to Spokane after winning this tournament the last two years, is fresh from a big win in the Idaho Centennial LPGA held in Boise, Idaho, last weekend. Last year, Miss Wright set a LPGA 72-hole record here by carding a 275, 115 under par. She has won 10 tournaments this year and last week's first prize of \$1,200 pushed her season winnings to \$21,000.

Officials of the tournament said that the entry list is the biggest in the tournament's history.

Thirty-seven women professionals will be on hand when the \$10,000, 54-hole medal play competition begins.

Also entered in the tourney is Shirley Englehorn, Caldwell, Idaho, who has hopes of winning the tourney, which is sponsored by the Athletic Round Table, her sponsor in her early professional years.

Kathy Whitworth, most popular citizen of Jal, N.M., and runner-up to Miss Wright in the Idaho tourney last week and Barbara Romack, 10th money-winner last year and runner-up here last year will also be shooting for the chips.

A heavy sentimental favorite for the top spot will probably be Spokane's own 16-year-old Peggy Conley, only an amateur, who has played like a pro this summer.

San Diego, Oklahoma City Breath Apart For Crown

Only a breath separates the San Diego Padres and the Oklahoma City 89ers today in their "down-to-the-wire" battle for first place in the Pacific Coast League's southern division race.

Both teams won Wednesday night — the Padres nipping the Hawaii Islanders, 1-0, on John Flavin's four-hitter and the 89ers downing Salt Lake City, 3-2, on key hits by Al Heist and Carroll Hardy.

As a result, San Diego held first place today with a .521 percentage, while Oklahoma City was at .522. The 89ers have won one more game but also have lost one more.

Eli Grba was charged with his seventh loss for Hawaii, although he deserved a better fate. The only run he gave up to San Diego was scored in the sixth inning — and it came on a break.

After Art Shamsky doubled, Grba struck out Miler McWilliams, but the third strike eluded catcher Al Roselli and officially was recorded as a wild pitch. Shamsky moved onto third on the play and came home when Grba lost his touch and, in succession, walked Tony Perez and Tommy Helms.

The 89ers got their win over Salt Lake City by scoring all three of their runs in the third inning. Four singles and a walk did the damage with Heist driving in two of the runs and Hardy the third.

Nelson tired and held the Bees off the rest of the way.
