

Diane Walker Weds Vincent Orien Cheyne

MERRILL—Diane Lea Walker, eldest daughter of Klamath County Judge Robert R. Walker and Mrs. Walker, and Vincent Orien Cheyne exchanged wedding vows and rings in an afternoon ceremony, Saturday, Aug. 24, in the Merrill Presbyterian Church. Rev. Lloyd Henderson officiated.

The bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Cheyne of Klamath Falls.

The marriage united two long-time Klamath Basin families. Diane Lea was given in marriage by her mother and her father after she was escorted to the flower-banked altar by Judge Walker.

Mrs. Rudolph Paygr was at the organ for the wedding music and at the later reception. By special permission Mrs. Paygr played "Diane" during the lighting of the tapers at the altar by Lawrence Kaylor and Aubrey Campbell who also placed the white aisle cloth for the bridal party.

Chancel flowers in floral arrangements were white chrysanthemums, white hybrid delphinium, Minerva deep pink carnations with accompanying tall, slender pink tapers. A massed arrangement of woodwardia fern at the rear of the bridal party held white tapers in brass candelabra.

Pews down the center aisle were marked with pompon white chrysanthemums tied with wide Minerva shaded and pale pink satin ribbons and white lace accents, carrying out the pink and white wedding theme.

Cadman's "Because" was sung preceding the ceremony by Don Buckingham of Klamath Falls, who sang "The Lord's Prayer" following the vows.

A gown of imported French silk organza with snugly fitted bodice was fashioned with softly rounded neckline and long, tapered sleeves, pointed at the wrist. The long torso line was defined by corded points. The extremely bouffant skirt swept widely from either side with a high Empress bustle caught with two organza romance roses. Imported reemboroided alencon lace medallions with seed pearls were scattered on the skirt and bodice.

A tufted pill-box, enmeshed with tiny seed pearls, held the layers of French tulle which formed her veil.

Her flowers, a white cattleya orchid centering a cluster of bouvardia stephanotis and white feathered carnations, were carried with mother-of-pearl Bible for something old. Tiny seed pearl hearts were tucked among the blossoms.

Bridesmaids were maid of honor for her sister.

Bridesmaids were Danice Colwell, Klamath Falls; Diane West, Merrill; Suzie Williams, Bonanza; Christie Hinds, Eugene, a college friend, and Mrs. Jerry Micka Jr. of Malin.

All wore identical unadorned frocks of the deep Minerva-shaded peau de soie, fashioned with peg-topped skirts in the new short length, and snug, low-backed bodices, worn with tiny pink net hats held by self material and net roses, and short white gloves. Slippers were dyed to match the gowns.

They carried old-fashioned nosegays of Minerva carnations, elf rosebuds and pompon chrysanthemums in a frill of lace. The maid of honor's included tiny

pearl hearts to carry out the trim on the bridal gown.

Nieces of the bride, Wylie Lea, 5, and Karen Walker, 4, blonde and brunette daughters of Mr. and Mrs. James Walker, Merrill, in bluish pink frocks and circlets of flowers in their long curls, carried white baskets of blossoms down the aisle.

The rings were carried on flower-decked white satin pillows by nephews Daleray, 6, and De'an Walker, 5.

James C. Cheyne, Redwood City, Calif., was best man for his brother.

The wedding party and guests were ushered by William Rajnus Jr., Malin; Lawrence Kaylor, Orinda, Calif.; Monte Dehlinger, Aubrey Campbell and Terry Kuhlman, Klamath Falls.

Mrs. Walker chose a shell-pink brocaded silk sheath with brief jacket, matching slippers and white accessories. Her small hat of veiling was in shades of pink and she wore a cattleya orchid at the shoulder.

Mrs. Cheyne wore a teal blue jacket ensemble, with hat of silk and velvet and bone accessories. Her corsage was also a white cattleya orchid.

The bridal party received at a reception in the walled patio garden of the Walker home after entering the attractive spot beneath an arch of native greens entwined with the bridal colors and white wedding bells. The receiving line was backgrounded by a favorite blue spruce.

The five-tiered white pedestal wedding cake was encircled with delicate pink roses, silver leaves, white hearts, and kneeling cupids which held the layers. It was topped with a white cupid that held a miniature arrangement of the bridal flowers.

The bridal table was covered with a bluish pink taffeta cloth adorned with swags of deeper pink caught at intervals with pink taffeta roses.

The buffet table held a golden cupid bearing flowers and flowers were used effectively about the garden and the enclosed patio where Mrs. Paygr was at the organ.

The Klamath Falls Great Books Discussion Group will begin this year's meetings on Monday, Sept. 16 at 7:30 p.m. in the basement club room of the city library. Any interested person is invited to attend.

The Declaration of Independence will be the selection for discussion with Mrs. Jacqueline Scholl as leader.

The second meeting will be Sept. 30 with Mrs. Joan Binning leading a discussion of Plato: Apology: Crito.

Thereafter the group will meet on the second and fourth Mondays of each month.

The Great Books discussion program is a means of continuing liberal education for adults. A conversation for reading and for conversation about ideas are the only requirements for joining a discussion group. According to a recent Great Books Foundation pamphlet, many people are surprised to find themselves reading, and reading with understanding, works of Aristotle, Voltaire, Descartes and Rousseau. These and other great minds wrote, not primarily for scholars but for an intelligent audience of laymen.

Participants in a Great Books

Discussion Group meet for two hours twice a month. Each reading is short enough for a busy adult to finish during the period between meetings, yet long enough to contain a complete unit of thought.

One or two discussion leaders, by asking questions, stimulate the conversation and keep it to the point. Members are encouraged to interpret and evaluate the readings critically and independently—to think for themselves. The discussions are free and informal. Readings for this year are as follows:

1. Declaration of Independence; 2. Plato: Apology; Crito; 3. Sophocles: Antigone; 4. Aristotle: Politics, Book I; 5. Plutarch: Lycurgus and Numa with a comparison; 6. The Gospel according to St. Matthew; 7. Epictetus: Discourses, selections; 8. Machiavelli: The Prince; 9. Shakespeare: Macbeth; 10. Milton: Areopagitica; 11. Adam Smith: The Wealth of Nations, selections; 12. The Federalist, Nos. 1, 10, 15, 51; Constitution of the United States; 13. Tocqueville: Democracy in America, selections; 14. Marx and Engels: Communist Manifesto; 15. Thoreau: Civil Disobedience; Walden.
