

PCL's Southern Loop May Be Decided Today

Pacific Coast League Roundup

From the looks of things the Southern Division championship may not be decided until Sunday, the final day of the Pacific Coast League season.

San Diego and Oklahoma City continue their bitter battle for the lead with the Padres holding a four percentage point lead over the 89ers.

The Padres took their single game from Hawaii last night 3-1 and Oklahoma City nipped Salt Lake City twice, 4-2 and 7-0. Dallas-Ft. Worth defeated Denver 2-1 and in 10-inning games, Portland edged Seattle 5-4 and Spokane came from behind to down Tacoma 7-5.

San Diego tops the Southern Division with a .5294 mark while Oklahoma City has .5290.

Crucial Games
Today the Padres meet Salt Lake City in a doubleheader and

the 89ers clash with arch rival Dallas-Ft. Worth.

All the scoring in the Padres game happened in the first inning. The Islanders scored their first run in 20 innings on a pair of walks and a sacrifice fly. But, the Padres came back in their half with four hits and Chico Ruiz' 49th steal to score three.

Ted Wills chalked up his 15th victory while rookie George Sherrod took the loss. A crowd of 7,234 saw the game and boosted the week's attendance in San Diego to 33,651. It marked the 14th win in 17 games in the latest home stand.

A 10th inning throwing error by Dave Hall gave Portland its overtime decision at Seattle. Haywood Sullivan hit the game's only home run in the second with a man on base but in the next frame fractured his index finger on the right hand and left the game.

Santiago Wins It
The victory went to the third

Beaver pitcher, Jose Santiago, while Billy MacLeod got the loss.

Spokane displayed its championship colors when it scored three runs at Tacoma in the ninth to tie the score and then added a pair in the 10th to win and give Howie Reed his 19th win against seven losses.

The 89ers closed out their season at home with the double win over Salt Lake City. Dave Giusti had a no-hitter for six innings and ended with a two-hitter. He now has a record of 13-11.

In the first game Ben Johnson took the victory although needing help from Gordon Jones. Hitting star for Oklahoma City was Carroll Hardy who had three hits in four trips, driving in a pair of runs. Catcher Joe Wooten doubled with the bases loaded in the third to drive in three tallies.

Ted Sadowski was the whole show as Dallas-Ft. Worth downed Denver for his 15th victory against 13 losses. The Rangers scored a run in the fourth in singles by Sandy Valdespino, Jay Ward and Cesar Tovar but a home run by Tommy Aaron tied it up in the fifth. Ward led the contest in the sixth with his 20th home run.

Football's Hall Of Fame Opened

CANTON, Ohio (UPI) — The National Football Hall of Fame became a reality Saturday as a host of dignitaries and football greats gathered here in the birthplace of professional football to dedicate the shrine.

A huge parade composed of 89 units left downtown Canton Saturday morning, headed for Fawcett Stadium where the hall was to be officially dedicated and the first 17 members inducted.

The actual dedication was to be made by U. S. Sen. Frank J. Lausche of Ohio, with National Football League (NFL) Commissioner Pete Rozelle accepting for the league, climaxing four years of work by the citizens of this industrial city of 125,000.

Eleven of the 17 inductees were here for the enshrinement. They were:

Sammy Baugh, Washington Redskins quarterback, 1937-52; Duck Clark, Portsmouth Spartans and Detroit Lions quarterback, 1931-38; Red Grange, Chicago Bears halfback, 1925-37; George Halas, founder and coach, Chicago Bears; Mel Hein, New York Giants center, 1931-45; Don Hutson, Green Bay end, 1935-45.

Curly Lambeau, Green Bay player, founder and coach, 1919-49; Cal Hubbard, New York Giants, Green Bay and Pittsburgh tackle and end, 1927-36; John (Blood) McNally, halfback with five teams, 1925-39; Bronko Nagurski, Chicago Bears fullback and tackle, 1930-37; and Ernie Nevers, Duluth Eskimos and Chicago Cardinals fullback, 1926-37.

The five deceased inductees are Joe Carr, league president, 1921-39; Tim Mara, founder of the New York Giants, 1925-39; Bert Bell, NFL commissioner, 1946-59; Pete (Fats) Henry, tackle for five clubs, 1927-36; and the immortal Jim Thorpe, halfback with Cleveland, Canton, Orange, Rock Island, Toledo and New York, 1915-26.

George Preston Marshall, founder of the Washington Redskins, was unable to get to Canton due to illness.

Oregon Tech's Football Team Faces Rugged Schedule With Optimism

If the 1963 Oregon Tech football team hopes to get into the high school stars from the Seaside area. Although the Ramblers claim they "play for fun only" they have continually produced winning teams. The Owls meet the Ramblers at Modoc Field Saturday, Sept. 21, at 8 p.m.

A week after the Ramblers, Oregon Tech will battle Weber College in a non-conference tilt. The Wildcats have a 220-pound halfback and a pair of 250-pound linemen. The Owls meet Weber at Modoc the following Saturday, Sept. 28.

The Owls will be preparing for Grays Harbor the next week and will be seeking their second straight victory in as many tries over the Aberdeen, Wash., crew. The fourth game will find the Owls launching what they hope will be a highly successful Oregon Collegiate Conference season when they take on Portland State.

The Vikings have 23 returning lettermen including Billy "Bye-Bye" White. He beat the Owls last year with a long punt return for a TD. This game is in Klamath Falls on Oct. 12.

Then the Owls invade old nemesis Southern Oregon at Ashland. This is a traditional game and is traditionally tough. The Owls were soundly defeated by SOC last year and hope to revenge that loss this season.

The Red Raiders lost a portion of their backfield, but will have their brilliant quarterback, Doug Olson, back again. However, the Raiders are once again picked to be the OCC champion.

Returning home the following week, the Owls will host Oregon College of Education's Wolves. The Wolves will have 20 lettermen and are expected to be improved over last season. The Owls play the Wolves Oct. 29 on Modoc.

The final two games are away from home. On Nov. 2 the Owls will take on Eastern Oregon in La Grande, which is no easy matter for any team. The Mountaineers are rebuilding and will be out to revenge last year's loss to OTI.

The Owls conclude the year against Southern Utan on Nov. 9. This will be the Owls' first meeting with the school at Cedar City, Utah.

So, it appears the Owls have their work cut out for them. The next two weeks will be filled with drills, scrimmages, skill sessions, and conditioning, prepping them for the rugged slate.
