

U.S. Takes Close Look At Viet Nam Issue

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States is conducting an intensive survey of all its relations with South Viet Nam, including economic and military aid, in its efforts to bring about governmental reforms there, informed sources said Saturday.

Officials said President Kennedy's declaration Sept. 2 that the United States would not pull out of Viet Nam entirely and abandon its 14 million people to the Communists still stands. But they said this still leaves a "broad spectrum" of possible U.S. actions.

The "spectrum" lies between efforts at persuasion, which have so far failed, and a complete withdrawal.

Administration officials described the present situation in the troubled South Asian country as the "eye of the hurricane" — the first phase over, the second not yet begun.

The first round began in late August with South Vietnamese government raids on Buddhist pagodas, mass arrests of Buddhists, and imposition of martial law, followed by unsuccessful United States efforts to end these repressions by merely "deploring" them.

Officials here still see an inevitable disaster ahead unless the Vietnamese government makes major changes in policy.

Their assessment is that the Vietnamese people themselves will not indefinitely continue to support a government of repression. They are also certain Congress and the American people will not indefinitely permit the United States to maintain 14,000 troops in Vietnamese fighting zones and pour \$1.5 billion a day into a country which so openly violates basic American ideals.

One way or another — through collapse of the government's war effort, through popular discontent, or through U.S. congressional action to terminate U.S. aid — officials see "the end of the road" ahead and a probable Communist takeover of South Viet Nam unless the government there undertakes reforms.

These would have to include a settlement with the Buddhists. And officials believe there might also have to be a "broadening" of the Vietnamese government to include religious, labor, military and other opinion groups not now well represented.

Father Chooses Stay In Jail Over Giving Up His Children

"I'll just wait it out, your honor," he said.

These words signify the plight of Charles Hoppe, a man who would rather sit in jail than give up his children to his former wife.

The judge said he can't release Hoppe without a bond of at least \$1,500.

Hoppe says he couldn't secure that bond.

The judge suggested that the sheriff of "wherever the children are" take the children and transport them to Oregon.

But Hoppe said he didn't want to "trouble him with that," and he again declined to reveal the children's location.

The judge said he has no desire to keep Hoppe locked up, but said he couldn't release him without some assurance that he would return.

Hoppe said that in that case, "I'll just wait it out, your honor."

And the judge sent the man back to jail for another 10 days.

Polio Hits Record Low

An all time record low of poliomyelitis has been reported in Oregon and the United States for the period from Jan. 1 through Aug. 17, the Oregon State Board of Health has reported.

A total of three cases of the disease have been reported during that period, compared to a total of four cases for the same period in 1962, the board disclosed. Of the three cases diagnosed, two have been paralytic.

Meanwhile, 173 cases of polio have been reported in the United States. This total remains well below one-half of the level reported for the comparable period in 1962. It was said. Of the 173 cases noted, 148 have been paralytic.

Manuscripts containing an account of emigrants being attacked by Indians on the old Applegate Trail, near Goose Lake, represent one of three gifts and one loan received by the Klamath County Museum last month, Curator Mrs. Irene Seely has reported.

The historical account was written by Isaac Constant, a pioneer of 1852, and has been donated to the museum by Sam Ritchey, 201 Jefferson Street.

Another historical item contributed to the museum is a fragment of a wagon wheel, comprising part of a metal rim and spokes, which was found on the emigrant trail where it emerges from the west side of Clear Lake. The donor is Ward F. Payne, nephew of Doris Palmer Payne, author of the book, "Captain Jack."

The other gift consisted of photographs, cards, clothing and books donated by Jessie Turpin Stevens, 522 Lincoln Street. Among the books is "Looters of the Public Domain," one of the earliest documents written on the need for conservation.

On loan to the museum is a Chinese vase which came from its finder, G. E. Hawkins, 1836 Logan Street. Hawkins discovered the vase in a field near Worden and has queried the Smithsonian Institution for information on the object.

Attendance at the museum last month numbered 1,003, marking the second August in succession that more than 1,000 persons have visited the establishment.

Dr. Leyhausen says purring is good in kittens. A kitten purrs to show it is happy, just as some babies gurgle.

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
