Opening last Sunday at the Klamath Art Gallery in Maple Park, the show features the paintings of Klamath Basin artists.

Three works in the "Dimensions of '63'" exhibit were named for cash awards by the three-man jury, composed of prominent Oregon artists.

First place prize money of \$30 went to Howard Hall of Klamath Falls for his abstraction in oil and a pencil drawing by Ly'e Matoush, Klamath Falls, captured the second place award of \$20. Mrs. M. G. Blackburn of Malin received the third place money of \$10 with an oil painting.

Honorable mention was given to the entries of Roberta McDonald, a sophomore student at Sacred Heart Academy, and Ron Tore Janson, also of Klamath Falls.

"Dimensions of '63'" will continue at the gallery through the month of September. The public is invited to view the show each Sunday from 2 to 5 p.m.

Governor Defies Federals; Closes Schools To Negroes

Violent Accidents Take Big Toll Of Oregonians

Violent deaths took the lives of 16 Oregonians over the weekend.

Another resident of the state died when he was struck by a car in Southern California after falling off the back of a truck.

Accidents Sunday included one traffic victim, four drownings and a death by electrocution.

A two-car crash on a county road 20 miles east of Eugene Sunday resulted in the death of one-year-old David Laurence Sandlin Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. David L. Sandlin Sr., of Eugene.

According to State Police, the child was riding in a car with his parents when it collided head-on with a vehicle driven by Harold Delmar Ludington, 22, of Eugene.

Mr. and Mrs. Sandlin, Ludington and Danny Smith, a passenger in the Ludington vehicle, were hospitalized in Eugene.

Drownings Claim Four

William Philip Gauthier, 51, Salem, was dead on arrival at Pacific Communities Hospital in Newport and his two companions were injured after their sports boat capsized in heavy fog off the south jetty of Yaquina Bay Sunday.

Listed in satisfactory condition were Edwin Harrison, 46, McMinnville, and his 11-year-old son, Terry.

The coast guard said the trio had been fishing in the ocean and apparently tried to re-enter the bay on the wrong side of the jetty in the fog.

William Francis Mulick, 16, Portland, drowned in the Clackamas River at Oregon City Sunday afternoon.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI) — Gov. George C. Wallace defied the federal government in three cities today by ringing white schools with armed state troopers who turned away Negroes who tried to enter.

Wallace's action thus set the stage for another showdown between the fiery segregationist governor and the federal government which had said troops would be used if necessary to force the integration.

In Washington, Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy was closeted with his assistants planning the next step.

Wallace sent nearly 400 troopers into Birmingham, Tuskegee and Mobile to turn away the Negroes who had been ordered admitted by the federal courts.

Systematically, the troopers barred the way for 13 Negroes at Tuskegee's only white school; turned back two teen-agers at Murphy High in Mobile; two girls at West End High in Birmingham and a Negro boy at Ramsay High in Birmingham.

Even as the troopers accomplished their mission—apparently Wallace's first step to force the government's hand—the color barrier fell for the first time at an Alabama public school below the college level.

A Sunday fatality near San Diego, Calif., took the life of Jackie Gene Garrison, 23, of Foster. Garrison was sleeping in the back of a truck when he tumbled onto Highway 101 and was struck by a car.

According to a witness, the driver stopped for a moment after striking Garrison, then sped on. Police are looking for the unidentified driver.

August John Covie, 36, and Dale Allison Kile, 33, both of Portland, killed in a two-car collision on the Sunset Highway near Portland Sunday.

Mrs. Louella Snyder, and her sons, Richard, 10, and David, 4, dead in a fire which destroyed their two-story frame house in Sweet Home Saturday.

Rocky Finds Things Cool In Illinois

OREGON, Ill. (UPI) — New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller tested Illinois Republican political winds here Saturday and found them a trifle chilly.

Top GOP officeholders, including Senate Minority Leader Everett M. Dirksen and Rep. John B. Anderson, who represents this district, were absent, along with the Republican secretary of state and state treasurer.

The highest ranking GOP officeholder in the state who was on hand for the first of a series of Rockefeller weekend visits around the nation was Ray Page, the state superintendent of public instruction.

Political observers to the New York capital assessed the trips as efforts to win support for Rockefeller's unannounced candidacy for the 1964 GOP presidential nomination.

The weekly tours will give Rockefeller a chance to estimate his chances to win the nomination, and gauge the impact of his divorce and remarriage to Mrs. Margaretta Fidler Murphy last spring.

On subsequent weekends, Rockefeller will travel to Colorado and Virginia-West Virginia.

The Rockefeller's scheduled a flight to nearby Rockford, Ill., in their private plane to fulfill an invitation extended last spring to address a 1963 Congressional District rally at Oregon.

Invitations which also went out to top Illinois Republican officials and candidates mostly were declined or ignored.

Soviets Fish Near Alaska

KODIAK, Alaska (UPI) — A fleet of 14 Russian fishing vessels has been sighted in Shelikof Strait, it was reported Saturday. The strait separates Kodiak Island from the mainland and is claimed as inland water by the state of Alaska.

The Alaska Fish and Game Department was expected to send a reconnaissance flight over the area Saturday to check on the report.

If the Russians are actually in the strait there is a possibility that there might be a repeat performance of action taken against Japanese vessels operating in the same area last year.

In April, 1962 two Japanese fishing boats and a mother ship were seized by Alaska fish and game officials and their captains arrested on charges of fishing inside the state's inland waters without a state commercial fishing license.

The crewmen of an American fishing vessel, the Mercator out of Kodiak, reported seeing the Soviet vessels in the strait.

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
