Wall Street chatter NEW YORK (UPI)—Bradbury K. Thurlow of Winslow, Co. & Stetson believes that the recent penetration of the 1961 highs will give rise to much broader public participation in speculative securities.

He does not think it will last as long or carry as far as it did in 1961, "but there does seem to be a fairly large amount of cash in the hands of individuals who are looking for fast stock market action," he adds.

Shearson, Hammill Co. points out that "investors cannot count on being bailed out of poorly situated issues by a general market rise, and, as always suggests new commitments in carefully researched, reasonably priced common stocks."

The illustrative and colorful handbooks, designed to guide the girls through the four levels of scouting, will go on sale Monday at the J. C.
