## Rights Given Two REA's

SALEM (UPI)—Two rural electric cooperatives with a portion of their operations in Oregon today were allotted exclusive service areas by the public utility commissioner.

The firms are Columbia Rural Electric Association, Walla Walla, Wash., and Surprise Valley Electrification, Alturas, Calif.

Commissioner Jonel C. Hill said these were the first such grants made to out-of-state utilities since the Oregon law allowing such certification went into effect in 1961.

Columbia Rural has about 1,600 customers including 48 located in the Umatilla County area allocated to it.

Surprise Valley has about 600 customers and 385 miles of distribution lines in the Lakeview-Warner Valley and Paisley-Summer Lake areas.

## Youths Flee From Home

Two teenage youths escaped from the Klamath County Juvenile Home late Monday night and were still loose today.

Authorities said the two boys, aged 15 and 16, apparently escaped through a window. They were discovered missing at 11 p.m. The 15-year-old is a Klamath Falls boy and the other youth was arrested here over the weekend as a runaway from South Salem.

# Ruling Backs Santa Fe Bid

WASHINGTON (UPI)—An Interstate Commerce Commission examiner today recommended the Santa Fe Railway be given authority to acquire the Western Pacific through a common stock exchange.

In a 143-page opinion, examiner Paul C. Albus picked Santa Fe over the Southern Pacific which had also sought to acquire the 1,193-mile Western Pacific.

The commission estimated Western Pacific's total assets at \$180,360,753.

Albus wrote that "acquisition of Western Pacific by Santa Fe would preserve and strengthen inter-rail competitive influences in the Pacific region, contribute to healthy industrial growth, tend toward a better competitive balance of rail systems, and make available substantial economies and savings.

"These advantages to the public can be secured without injury to existing routes or gateways or to other railroads," he held.

In commenting on his denial of Southern Pacific's application to control Western Pacific through capital stock ownership, Albus said:

"The record indicates that Southern Pacific handles approximately three-fourths of the rail traffic in Northern California, with Western Pacific handling about 10 per cent and Santa Fe about 7 per cent. Control of Western Pacific by Southern Pacific would concentrate under a single interest and control over 90 per cent of the rail traffic in Northern California."

# Rabid Bats Found In State

Two rabid bats were discovered in Oregon last week increasing the number of the mammals so infected this year to seven, the Oregon State Board of Health has reported. Four of the incidents, all of which were associated with possible animal or human exposures, were reported in

Curry County with one each from Deschutes, Jackson and Lane counties.

Recently, questions have been asked regarding airborne rabies. Airborne infection of rabies has been reliably demonstrated from bats to humans where large colonies of bats roost in caves, the department said.
