The committee will hold its next meeting in Klamath Falls Oct. 4.

## Turncoat Scott Rush Returns Short On Cash

HONG KONG (UPI)—American turncoat Scott L. Rush, who returned from Red China last Saturday, gawked at luxuries he has not seen for 13 years today and began making arrangements to go to visit his ailing mother in the United States.

Rush, a former U.S. Army sergeant who was captured in Korea in 1950, is from Akron and Marietta, Ohio, but his mother, Mrs. H. L. Rush, now lives in Tucson, Ariz.

He returned from China along with his Chinese wife and 14-month-old daughter.

He said he did not know when he would be able to leave for home. "I've completed most of the procedures," he said. "I hope I can go home with my family as soon as possible."

Rush, who told of hunger, hardship and discontent in Communist China, said he and his wife were fascinated by Hong Kong.

"We've been sightseeing and window shopping ever since we arrived here," he said.

Cecil Edwards was hired as executive secretary at \$750 a month, the lowest salary paid any of the interim committee executive secretaries. Barbara Hanneman was hired as committee clerk at \$420 a month.

The wildlife group is attempting to interest a private foundation in providing a special study grant to aid in the committee's work, and Edwards said encouraging progress was being made.

At Saturday's session the committee heard reports from Irving Larson of the State Police Game Law Enforcement Division, Oregon Fish Commission director Robert Schoning, Department of Planning and Development field supervisor C. William Miller, and Game Commissioner director P. W. Schneider.

Schoning said the problem of fish passage over the Willamette Falls at Oregon City may be solved soon. He said the Fish

Commission has developed plans. Private industry would be asked to contribute \$300,000 of the cost.

Schoning noted that Portland General Electric, which is awaiting results of another study, and other industries in the area can agree on the type of facility they want, the solution may be near.

He said present fish passage facilities at the falls are inadequate and prevent full use of water resources behind the falls.
