

Labron Harris Looks To Join U.S. Amateur Immortals Today

DES MOINES, Iowa (UPI)—Labron Harris Jr., a scholarly slugger from Oklahoma, goes out for two swift rounds today which will help decide whether he is to join such U.S. Amateur immortals as Bobby Jones, Lawson Little and Harvie Ward.

They were back-to-back winners in this 68-year-old fairway classic and the long-driving Harris must survive two rounds today in order to keep alive his hopes for his second straight title.

No golfer has been able to win

two in a row since Ward accomplished the feat in 1955 and 1956. The last man before that was Little in 1934 and 1935. Jones did it twice — 1924-25 and then again in 1927-28.

The field, which included 200 hopefuls when they first teed off on Monday morning, will be narrowed to 16 by nightfall after today's two rounds over the long, narrow Wakonda Club course.

Harris' first opponent today will be Walter Stahl of Cleveland. While Harris, "driving better than I have at any time," was

beating 19-year-old John McKey of Orlando, Fla., 6 and 5, in the second round Tuesday, Stahl turned back Dr. Sam Valuck of Denver, Colo., 2 and 1.

Harris' path to the title will not be an easy one. Because among the 62 survivors going into the third round today were two-time champion Charley Coe; Deane Beman, the 1960 winner; Billy Joe Patton and the veteran Bill Campbell.

Coe, who won his first U.S.

Amateur crown in 1949 and repeated in 1950, made the third round with a 6 and 5 victory over Daniel B. James of Millbrae, Calif.

Beman, who had eight one-putts, defeated Charles M. Pott II of Clayton, Mo., 4 and 3.

Patton, conqueror of Frederick Franz of Crystal Lake, Ill., 3 and 2.

Campbell, the former West Virginia legislator, beat Marvin Giles of Lynchburg, Va., 4 and 2.

Oklahoma City Edges Spokane

If Dave Roberts wanted to run for mayor of Oklahoma City today he'd probably win by a wide majority.

The infielder drove in all of his team's runs last night as the 88ers defeated Spokane 4-3 in the first game of a best of seven playoff series for the Pacific Coast League championship.

Roberts smashed in a single tally in the third inning only to see his team fall behind in the fourth when the Indians tallied three times.

Roberts stepped up to the plate in the top of the seventh inning with Carroll Hardy and Al Heist on base, and blasted a 350 foot homerun over the right field wall. That was all the 88ers needed.

Starter Dave Giusti gave up three runs before being relieved

in the sixth inning by Jim Dickson, who was credited with the victory. Joe Moeller went all the way for Spokane to take the loss.

Spokane's scoring came on singles by Jim Barbieri and Rod Graber and a drive by Dick Nen. Left fielder Danny Murphy lost the ball in the dirt and by the time he came up with it, both runners scored and Nen was on third base. He scored on Dick Berardino's sacrifice fly.

Tonight Howie Reed (19-7) takes the mound for Spokane in an effort to even the series. Russ Kemmerer (5-2) will hurl for the 88ers.
