

'Why Don't They?' Proposals Cover Wide Range Of Ideas

NEW YORK (UPI) — Those 85,000 homemaker consultants are at it again, dogging manufacturers to improve their products. Many of their suggestions are on packaging; some are about the product itself; others are purely wife-savers on the labor front. The consultants are the part-time workers for National Family Opinion, Inc., a Toledo, Ohio, consumer research firm. Their newest list of "why don't they?" ranges from improvements in rain wear to home sewing suggestions. One housewife wrote, "why don't they?" make plastic rain hoods with small shoulder capes attached for better protection in wet weather. Another suggested that boys' shirt patterns correspond in size and measurements to ready-made shirts.

Still another asked manufacturers not to put so many pins in new garments, especially children's clothes where they are a "safety hazard" since it is hard to uncover all before a garment goes on. Old Chairs Better One correspondent complained that many furniture manufacturers are sacrificing comfort for appearance in chairs—"the great majority today are too short backed and long seated," she wrote. One complained of the non-uniformity of length for dress belts; that some were too long,

while others barely met, in dresses of the same size. Other "why don't they?" suggestions included: Install all electrical outlets in new housing high enough to prevent the stooping, crawling and searching which go on in the older homes. Also place them away from the center of large wall areas, where inevitably the outlets are behind sofa and piano. Make the appearance of dressing rooms in stores match the appearance of the dress department itself. The dress sections might be glossy, appealing and expensively done, but fitting rooms look like the hangover of a bargain basement sale. Common complaint—pins on the floor, a hazard to the shopper who often sheds her shoes to step into a garment instead of pulling it over her head. Put cotton lace trim on cotton clothes. Ever try to iron cotton at high temperature on the iron, then run the iron at the same heat over the synthetic lace trims? The lace usually "melts" against a hot too high. More Suggestions Make loops large enough at the neck or collar end of sports shirts so the wearer can button without tearing of the loop. Make loops in the center back of women's coats as they do men's, for secure hanging when regular coat hangers are not available. Fasten the size label of a garment, especially in children's clothes, so that it will not pull or wash out. While at it, why don't they put sock sizes on both socks with an indelible dye? In homes where children's socks are nearly the same size, sorting becomes a problem. Mark special waxed paper for wrapping sandwiches, with perforations to mark the length needed for the average sandwich. When wrapping sandwiches for children's lunch, for instance, paper often is wasted because it's torn too long or too short. Make baby food jars the same size at the top as at the sides so no food is left in the jar. Manufacture a granulated non-calorie or low-calorie sweetener with the same bulk as sugar. Good for diabetics or dieters. Then, sugar-free cookies, cakes and other desserts could be made with favorite and familiar recipes and "sugared" desserts would be possible again.

27 Injured In Bus Crash

SHAMROCK, Tex. (UPI) — Greyhound bus driver Madrid Reid peered through a blinding rainstorm Tuesday night and saw an automobile ahead of him in trouble. He veered his bus to miss the car. The 43-passenger scenic-cruiser overturned and 27 persons were injured. None of the injured was in serious condition today. Richard Fisher of Jefferson, Ohio, driver of the car, said a bolt of lightning startled him and a gust of wind blew him to the left side of the road. Reid, of Oklahoma City, turned his wheel to avoid the car, and skidded on the rain-slick road. The bus overturned and came to a halt astride the center line of U. S. Highway 66. "I felt the bus sliding," Mrs. Audrey Wutrich of Taena, Ariz. said. "The next thing I knew, I was on the bottom. A lady was wedged on top of me along with a lot of suitcases. There was a glass everywhere." Greyhound officials estimated damage to the bus at \$10,000. The bus was on a schedule from St. Louis to Los Angeles and had just made a stop in Shamrock. City firemen Tuesday afternoon extinguished a grass fire in a vacant lot at 424 Market Street. There was no damage.

Man Wants Jail Term

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (UPI) — John Monteiro, 23, wants to go to jail. Terminal Island Prison at Los Angeles, Calif., to be exact. Why? His wife Carmen is serving three to five years there for passing bad checks and he wants to join her. Monteiro appeared before Superior Court Judge Ralph E. Moody on a charge of assault. He pleaded guilty and asked to be sent to Terminal Island. Moody noted that Monteiro had appeared in court 42 times since 1958, and agreed to send him to jail for five years—but he didn't specify which one.

Pendleton Rodeo Opens

PENDLETON (UPI) — The nation's top cowboys opened competition as the 52nd annual Pendleton Roundup got under way today. A total of 199 cowboys, headed by Dean Oliver of Boise, are seeking \$28,000 in prize money in the four-day rodeo in six arena events. The Roundup officially started at 1:15 p.m. at the main arena although cowboys began competing in the first go-around at 8 a.m. Oliver, leading money winner in the first go-around at 8 a.m. Oliver, leading money winner this year on the national rodeo circuit and a former Roundup All-Around Cowboy winner, was scheduled to begin his quest of the calf roping title this morning. Other arena events in the rodeo are bareback bronc riding, steer wrestling, bull riding, steer roping and saddle bronc riding. The colorful Eastern Oregon pageant also includes cowboy breakfasts, two beauty contests for Indian girls, western dances, parades, street shows and Indian ceremonial dances.

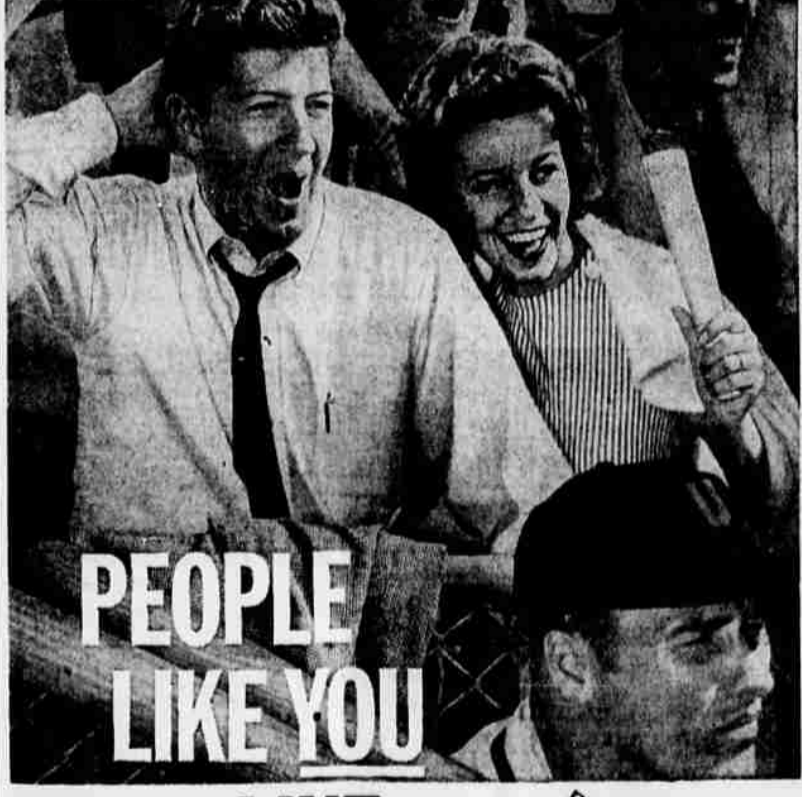
