

Cards, Dodgers Win, Remain Same; Yanks Could Clinch Tie

St. Louis Using Dodgers' Method Of Winning-Hurling

The St. Louis Cardinals are using the Los Angeles Dodgers' own most potent weapon — pitching — to cling to the front-runners' coattails in the National League pennant race.

Pitching has been the Cardinals' most serious problem all season but it's suddenly jelled — and just at the right time if the Redbirds are going to overtake the Dodgers, whose once-proud staff is beginning to get the blind staggers in the stretch.

The Cardinals staff turned in its third consecutive shutout when Ray Sadecki and Ron Taylor combined in a five-hitter Wednesday night for a 4-0 victory over the Chicago Cubs. The win enabled the Cardinals to remain three games behind the winning Dodgers and made it 14 victories in their last 15 games for Johnny Keane's fast-closing team.

The Dodgers again got shaky pitching from ace Don Drysdale but reached into their bullpen for the necessary relief aid as they downed the Pittsburgh Pirates, 9-4, and eliminated them from the race.

Sandy Koufax is the only Dodger pitcher who has gone the distance in the 11 games played by Los Angeles this month. During the same period the Cardinals have had six complete games from among three different pitchers.

Giants Lose Again
The New York Mets pushed the fading San Francisco Giants another step toward extinction, 4-2, the Cincinnati Reds routed the Milwaukee Braves, 14-3, and the Houston Colts nicked the Philadelphia Phillies, 4-2, in other National League games.

win his ninth game for the Cardinals went 5-2-3 in the final 13-13. Stan Musial's sacrifice fly and an infield out produced two St. Louis runs in the fourth inning and Mike Shannon hit his first major league homer to drive in the other pair in the eighth. Dick Ellsworth suffered his ninth loss against 20 victories.

Maury Wills had four hits and Frank Howard and Ken McMullen two each as the Dodgers recalled out 13 hits. Drysdale was

rocked for eight hits and two runs in three innings but Pete Richert held the Pirates to two runs for four innings and Ron Perranoski closed it out with two innings of hitless relief. Smokey Burgess homered for the Pirates.

Mets Score Early

The Mets dropped the Giants 11 games off the pace behind the seven-hit pitching of Al Jackson, who won his 11th game of the season. The Mets scored all their runs in the first two innings off Jack Sanford, who lost his 13th decision. Ron Hunt and Tim Lincecum had three hits each for the Mets.

Gordie Coleman hit a pinch grand slam in a nine-run fourth inning and Vada Pinson hit two homers as the Reds crushed the Braves. Jim Maloney won his 22nd game and struck out eight to raise his season total to 232 — one short of the club record set by Frank (Noodles) Hahn in 1901.

Rookie Jim Wynn's two-run eighth-inning homer and the four-hit, nine-strikeout pitching of Dick Farrell carried the Colts to their victory over the Phillies. Cal McLish was tagged for all Houston's runs in suffering his 11th setback against 13 wins.

Unknown Upsets Defending Champ

DES MOINES, Iowa (UPI) — An upsetting unknown from Cleveland and four of the top stars were among 16 hopefuls who set out today in the fifth round of the U.S. Amateur golf championship with a quartet of them to be left in the running by nightfall.

Walt Stahl, making only his second appearance in the Amateur, hoped to continue his unexpectedly brilliant play and had to do so if he hoped to survive among such as Charley Coe, Deane Beman, Bill Campbell and collegiate champion Dick Sikes.

The lanky 28-year-old gear salesman was a total of only three over par over the tough Wakonda Club course in contributing the tournament's top upset by flattening defending champion Labron Harris Jr., 2 and 1, and then roaring past Bob Cochran of St. Louis, 6 and 5.

Today he goes against Dave Stockton of San Bernardino, Calif., in the fifth round and then, if he is to reach Friday's 36-hole semifinals, would have to face the winner of a match between Beman and Barry Meerdink of Muscatine, Iowa.

Campbell, the former West Virginia legislator, will face John C. Owens, the Kentucky amateur champion, in the first of today's two 18-hole rounds.

Sikes' fifth round opponent will be Ed Tutwiler of Charleston, W. Va.

Coe, seeking to win the title for the third time — he captured it in 1949 and then again in 1958 — today meets 21-year-old James Thompson of Mission, Texas.

Defending Champs Can Tie For Title On Anniversary

This could be the day the New York Yankees clinch a tie for their fourth straight American League pennant and the 28th in their golden history.

All that's needed is a Yankee victory over the Kansas City Athletics and a Cleveland Indian triumph over the Minnesota Twins. Then, one Yankee victory or one loss by either the Twins or Chicago White Sox would mathematically eliminate the last two remaining "contenders."

The Yankees moved to within easy grasp of their third straight flag under Ralph Houk when they beat the Athletics, 8-2, Wednesday night for their 96th win of the

season. And, in typical fashion, it was Whitey Ford supplying the pitching and Mickey Mantle contributing the big blow.

Ford, gaining his 22nd win of the season and the 197th of his career, turned in a neat seven-hitter while Mantle, playing his way toward top form after a season of injuries, sent his old buddy off in front with a three-run homer in the first inning.

In A Breeze
After that it was a cakewalk — with Mantle adding a double and a single to his game total and Joe Pepitone driving in three runs with a homer and single. Ford struck out five and walked three behind the 13-hit attack to which every Yankee regular contributed at least one blow.

The Twins drubbed the Indians, 9-3, the White Sox edged out the Baltimore Orioles, 3-2, the Washington Senators defeated the Detroit Tigers, 6-5, in 10 innings and the Los Angeles Angels beat the Boston Red Sox, 4-1, in other American League action.

Harmon Killebrew hit his 33rd homer of the season and the fifth grand slam of his career and Earl Brandt also homered to lead the Twins' 13-hit attack. Lee Stange pitched a seven-hitter and struck out eight for his 10th win while Dick Donovan suffered his 13th defeat.

Huris Three-Hitter
Eddie Fisher pitched a three-hitter to win his eighth game as Dave Nicholson hit a homer and

a run-scoring single for the White Sox. Camilo Carreon also homered for the White Sox and John Orsino homered for the Orioles.

Rookie Carl Bouldin pitched four scoreless relief innings and gained his second major league victory when Dick Phillips led off the bottom of the 10th inning for the Senators with a homer. Dick McAuliffe had a homer and a single to lead the Tigers' attack.

Aubrey Gatewood pitched a four-hitter in his major league debut and had a shutout until the ninth when Dick Stuart's triple and a sacrifice fly by Russ Nixon gave the Red Sox their run. Charley Dees led the Angels' 12-hit attack with three singles.
