

Who Will Rule Spain When Franco Is Gone?

MADRID, Spain (UPI)—Ask almost any politically minded Spaniard what he believes is Spain's greatest internal problem, and the reply will be, "the succession."

Spain officially is still a kingdom, but the phrase, "the succession," applies to only one man and that is Generalissimo Francisco Franco, in all respects Spain's chief of state.

Today's Spain, 25 years after the civil war, is a nation moulded by Franco and ruled by his decisions.

Francisco presents being called a dictator, preferring rather to regard himself as a man who fulfilled a national need and still is answering to it.

Woelever the definition, Spain has found tranquility after 100 years of civil war, enjoys a rising prosperity and once more is looking to the world beyond the Pyrenees.

Even Franco's home critics admit there is no one in the country able to match him in national prestige.

There is opposition in Franco's Spain, said one knowledgeable American.

But it is an opposition upon which it is hard to place your finger, the source pointed out to this correspondent who flew to Spain aboard an Iberia Airlines plane to be shown the situation close-up.

Except for the Communists and the anarchists, no one is plotting against him. The minimum wage has been raised to a dollar a day, and the little man about to raise his standard of living with a new apartment or a television set is not willing to risk it in a new revolt.

Most of the opposition simply is waiting for Franco to get out of office or die.

Approaching 71, Franco shows signs of neither.

But neither has there been a decision on the succession, the man or system which will enable Spain to continue its era of stability.

Francisco himself has said he cannot be expected to continue in office forever. Up until a short time ago, it appeared he was grooming the young Juan Carlos to take over the Spanish throne for a resumption of the monarchy. Highly placed Spaniards believe that idea is fading in the face of mounting public resistance.

Needs Army Support
Whoever is to rule in Spain must have the support of the army. Telling that requirement is Vice President Capt. Gen. Agustín Muñoz Grandes, the only man whose military rank equals Franco's own.

Another alternative is the council of the realm, a council which would be composed of representatives of labor, the Catholic church, the universities and professional groups who would advise a form of government and submit it to a plebiscite.

Finally there has been a suggestion that Franco himself might retire, giving the country an opportunity to reach its own peaceful solution but holding himself ready to return to office in case of need.

Within Spain political groups are barred and the right of assembly limited. Efficient police quickly subdue opposition demonstrations. In some government circles there is a hope that a gradual relaxation of restrictions will develop within the people themselves a sense of political responsibility.

But meanwhile the question of the how, who or what of "the succession" remains unanswered. Above for Thursday PM's, Sept. 12.

THE DOCTOR SAYS Outlook Improves For Palsy Victim

If you are one of the many sufferers from palsy, also called Parkinson's disease and paralysis agitans, your plight is not as hopeless as it once was. This disease starts gradually between the ages of 40 and 60.

The symptoms include weakness, stiffness and the characteristic tremors or shaking palsy — all of which are slowly progressive.

The tremor is usually noticed first in the thumb and index finger of one hand, where it consists of a pill-rolling motion. Later, other fingers become involved, and then the legs and head. The tremors cease during sleep.

The disease does not affect the mentality of the victim.

The cause is unknown, although efforts have been made to link it with many other conditions.

One odd feature of this disease is that the victim by concentrating can exercise some control over the involuntary movements for a few seconds.

Even a severely disabled sufferer can, in case of fire, for example, run out of the burning building. But as soon as the emergency is over the tremors return and are as bad as ever.

For many years a wide variety of drugs have been used to treat this disease. In general they have improved the morale of the victim and enabled him to gain weight and care for himself, even though his friends and relatives could not see much difference in his ability to control his tremors.

The drugs used have been more successful in reducing muscular stiffness or rigidity and weakness than in stopping or lessening the palsy.

The chief disadvantage to the drugs has been the fact that the dosage has had to be increased from time to time, and the effective dose is usually associated with undesirable side effects. For this reason surgical measures for relief have been sought. Early efforts included removal of superficial layers of the brain or cutting part of the spinal cord, but these procedures impaired voluntary movement.

Dr. Jones is a member and past president of the Rotary Club of Eugene. He was elected a district committee member for the 1962-63 year's 54th annual convention in St. Louis, Mo., last June. He is director of the district's 272 district governors under an arrangement whereby the district gives the use of the property during his lifetime.
