Lt. Fisher is a graduate of University of Illinois and is working on his master's degree from University of California at Los Angeles.

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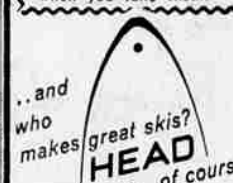
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
