

Oregon Tech Rounding Into Top Form For Opener With Ramblers

The Oregon Tech Owls are rapidly rounding into shape for their season opener next Saturday on Modoc Field against the rugged semi-pro Seattle Ramblers.

The Oregon Tech grid staff spent the first week installing the prototype offense the Owls will use. Head Coach Ron Pfeister felt the griders were fast to pick up the desired skills and plays.

The latter part of the week the Owls concentrated on their passing attack. Quarterbacks Mike Glines and Lloyd Smith practiced their signal calling and exercised their throwing arms. Glines, a 5-9, 160-pound bundle of dynamite, is a wiry freshman from Crater High who directs the action with the authority of a seasoned veteran and throws the ball well.

Glines and Smith will pass to excellent receivers in John Pattinson, Boise JC transfer, and Claude Shipp and Bob Thorne. Pattinson is a 6-4, 220-pounder who has fair speed and his size is an advantage for the Owls. Should the quarterback decide to throw to the other side, Shipp and Thorne are real speedsters.

The two Owl speedsters have shown their ability to be good, deceptive receivers with burning speed. Shipp runs a 9.5 and Thorne a 9.6. Also on the receiving ends will be Sonny Luke, the All-American halfback from Grays Harbor.

Injuries in the Owl camp have been held to a minimum. The first week was marked by bruises and stiff muscles but nothing serious enough to sideline any participants. John Harris, defensive tackle, fought a bout with the flu but will be ready for action Saturday.

The Owls will go into the contest with the Ramblers carrying a slight underdog role. The explanation for this is that the

SF 49ers To Battle Minnesota

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The San Francisco Forty Niners, battered, bruised and beaten unmercifully during the exhibition season, open the 1963 National Football League campaign Sunday against the favored Minnesota Vikings.

But even after two months of intensive training, Coach Red Hickey doesn't know who will start at quarterback for his club.

The Nov. 1 claimant of the job, John Brodie, has such a bad right arm that he hasn't been able to throw in practice all week.

The No. 2 man, Bob (Muddy) Waters, has been so ineffective in exhibition games that Hickey is hesitant to start him.

Doesn't Know Plays
And the No. 3 man, old Sam Etcheverry, has been around such a short time he doesn't know the plays yet.

The Vikings are 2½ points favorites, according to the Las Vegas bookies, mainly because they trounced the Forty Niners in an exhibition game, 43-20.

A crowd of 38,000 is expected for the battle in Kezar Stadium. It would be the smallest opening-season attendance since the Forty Niners joined the National League.

Sorry Record
The fact that the club had a 0-5 exhibition season record accounts for the probable drop in attendance.

The team has been beset with injuries since opening day of practice. Currently there are four men on the injured waiver list in addition to several on the squad who are traveling at half speed.

"I won't know until warm-up time before the game who we'll be able to start at quarterback," says Hickey.

Coach Norm Van Brocklin of the Vikings is having no such trouble. Fran Tarkenton is set to start. He led the club to a surprising 4-1 record in the exhibitions.

Stung and Wounded
"But forget those exhibitions," says Van Brocklin. "We are for 0 as far as league games are concerned. The Forty Niners have been stung and they'll be coming after us like a wounded animal."

In addition to the man who does the quarterbacking, the Forty Niners will have in the backfield Lloyd Winston, second-year man from USC, at the right half, and the reliable J. D. Smith at fullback.

Bob Cousy Belittles Recruiting

SEATTLE (UPI)—Former professional basketball star Bob Cousy said Friday that recruiting in college basketball is getting "way out of hand" and is one of the biggest problems he has encountered in his brief career as coach at Boston College.

Cousy, who retired as a player with the Boston Celtics last year, was in Seattle briefly as part of a public relations tour with a sports apparel company.

He spoke at a luncheon, talked to newsmen and conducted a couple of basketball clinics.

Talking about recruiting, Cousy said, "It's getting to be so much of a headache. I can see now why so many pro coaches left the colleges."

"It's getting way, way out of hand," he added.
He said that when he graduated from college he got only two offers, but today he figures even a mediocre player gets at least a dozen and a good one could get as many as 200.
As for his own recruiting efforts, Cousy said, "I'll do what's necessary and that is all. I'd keep me from doing any more."

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The Ramblers are under new guidance but have basically the same team that played here a year ago.

Ray Jackson, an outstanding

fullback and safety at the University of Washington, will lead the Ramblers. On defense, big Sam Buckley is the Rambler to watch. He has made many a college ball carrier pay for the yardage gained.

From a spectator's point of view, Saturday's game should be a great one. Both the Ramblers and the Owls have exceptional size and speed on the club. The Ramblers have the weight advantage on both offense and defense. The Owl offensive line will average 228 and the defensive unit 250. The Rambler beef will average 240 in the offensive line and 290 on defense.

Both the Owls and the Ramblers boast speed. With several track stars suited as football players, the audience should be treated to a razzle-dazzle performance.

Both clubs will have power packing fullbacks. The Owls will display their 230-pound JC All-American Bob Battles. An attempt to share glory with Battles will be made by Seattle's Ray Jackson and Jim Jones.

The Ramblers, who are 45 strong, were recently defeated by the semi-pro Portland Thunderbirds, 23-0. They are anxious to get into the winning column and are aiming high at the Owls. The Ramblers have two games under their belts and have the advantage of experience. The Owls are anxiously awaiting the season opener. They hope to revenge the 1962 loss to prove they are a team to watch this season.
