

Speaker Barton Defends Tax Bill, Fears Loss Of Number Of Reforms

SALEM (UPI)—The 1963 legislative session will include "a lot of tax reform we have been trying for years to achieve," House Speaker Clarence Barton said Saturday.

Sitting in the governor's chair he might someday campaign to occupy, the Coquille Democrat cited the graduated rates, unlimited medical deductions, and the tax credit parts of the bill as major reforms.

Barton, serving as governor while Gov. Mark Hatfield is out of state, said the \$60 million revenue increase measure included some features—such as the \$5 minimum filing fee—which he did not like. But he termed the compromise a better bill than most people realize.

Barton told United Press International a defeat of the measure at the Oct. 15 referendum could lead to "frenzied basic school soundings on that could be compounded on the next property tax bill."

School Taxes Reduced

"Because of this new tax measure school taxes in my district were reduced six per cent. If we have to cut basic, my taxes could go up 18 per cent next year," he said he would speak when he said he would defend the tax measure and to outline the fiscal crisis that faces the state.

He said if the bill is defeated, and Hatfield calls a special session, the governor would be required by the state's constitution to recommend a program to the legislature.

"We don't know whether a defeat of this measure would be a mandate to cut back, or whether new revenue sources should be explored, or whether we should use a combination of cuts and new taxes," Barton explained.

Favors Cigarette Tax

Barton repeated his support for a cigarette tax. He said if a cigarette tax were enacted at a special session this fall it could raise about \$8 million during the rest of the biennium. He said a one-shot speedup of withholding collections could bring in another \$12 million. This would mean only \$40 million in cuts would have to be made to keep the budget in balance.

"If we run out of money, we would have to levy a state property tax to keep up payments on the state's debt, but I don't think that would be a very popular move."

Barton said he strongly opposed any increases in college tuition fees. "Tuition is too high already," he insisted.

Mental Researcher Is Named Under Grant

Oregon's comprehensive mental health planning moved a step further with the recent appointment of a research analyst under Oregon's \$100,000 federal grant for mental health planning. He is Aubrey D. Taylor.

According to Robert E. Stevens, planning grant coordinator, Taylor's number one job will be to "assess where we stand at state and local levels in mental health resources. His principal tasks will be fact-finding and fact-gathering, and therefore we anticipate he will be a valuable resource for local communities who need such assistance in the planning of their mental health services." In addition, Stevens says, Taylor will serve as executive secretary of Oregon's Staff Development Committee of the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education, and will work with the newly set-up Mental Health Planning Board.

"Our mental health planning activities are now organized and community leaders throughout the state are working with us," Stevens announced. "However, we need to have a great amount of basic information in front of us before we are able to say what can be done to make mental health a community activity rather than one that is practiced only in state institutions. Taylor's job will be to help bring these facts to light."

Taylor comes to Oregon from Sacramento where he worked with the California Youth Authority. Previous to his work in California he was a senior instructor at the University of Oregon. He holds his B.A. in liberal arts with a major in economics from the University of California, and has done post-graduate work at the University of Oregon. He and his wife are residing in Salem.

Fort Rock State Park Use Heavy

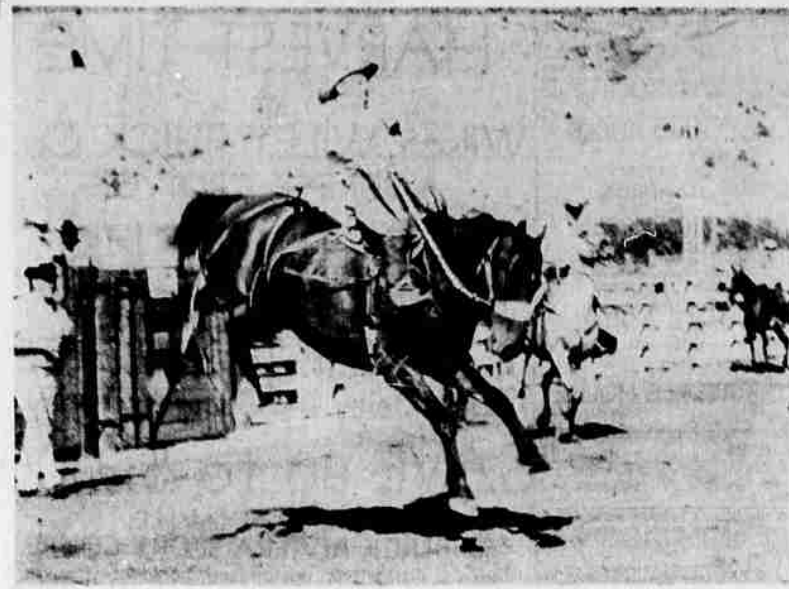
FORT ROCK—Use of the new Fort Rock State Park is considerably greater than expected, according to Alva Zimmerman, state district park supervisor of Bend. This was the report brought to the Fort Rock Grange by Bud Parks, a member of the Outdoor Recreation Committee of the fraternal organization.

The increase is due to better signs at the Highway 31 junction and intersections along the way, Zimmerman noted. The park is still too new to be listed in the current state park descriptive brochure. The 190-acre park has as its attraction, a semi-circular lava flow or crater rimming towering some 350 feet above the surrounding level plain.

Some Russian olive trees have been planted recently and more will be set out when the season is favorable for transplanting. This variety is hardy and drought resisting.

Harvey Heare and George Hay of the state park staff in Bend planted the trees and makes regular trips to the site for clean-up. Recent maintenance included removing a group of large yellow targets which someone had painted on the rocks. The park crew painted over the yellow with a shade that blended with the rock.

Providing water for campers and picnickers as well as for a limited amount of landscaping at the site is the prime need now, grange members feel. Water from wells is available at a low lift in this area, and electric power lines are close by.

Scribe Reports Mood And Manner Of Former President Eisenhower

EDITOR'S NOTE — Merriman Smith, who has reported the activities of four presidents for UPI, recently paid an informal visit to an old friend and news subject, former President Dwight D. Eisenhower. They chatted for about two hours in Eisenhower's Gettysburg office. No notes were made, no records kept, but here is Smith's report on Eisenhower's current mood and manner.

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (UPI)—It was more of a friendly chat than an interview. We compared notes on children and grandchildren, on aches and pains, trends in presidential news conferences, reading tastes and the 1964 political outlook. After about two hours, I asked him how he would describe our conversation.

"Just say you dropped in for a talk with the old farmer," replied former President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Eisenhower will be 73 years old next Oct. 14. He seems a bit heavier than when he left office in 1961, particularly around the face and middle. This may be because he has not been getting as much exercise as he did.

Works On Review

His principal preoccupation these days is completion of the second volume of his massive review of eight years in the White House, plus occasional articles for a national magazine.

He keeps in close touch with politics, particularly those involving the GOP. But more and more, Eisenhower shies away from the role of chief party spokesman. He is convinced this is a job for leaders.

Sitting in his small, cheerful office on the second floor of a building at the edge of the Gettysburg college campus, Eisenhower seemed quite relaxed. It was 9 a.m. and he had been in his office for nearly an hour.
