Smith Wins Rainy Open

EUGENE (UPI) — Players on the women's professional golf tour wrung out their clothes, dried their hair and moved on to a sunnier climate today following the close of the \$10,000 Eugene Women's Open here Sunday.

Marilynn Smith of Tequesta, Fla., scored a four-stroke victory by shooting a two-over-par 76 on the final day of the four-day, 72-hole tournament for a 295. Her first comment was:

"Don't I look like a drowned rat?"

A downpour in mid-afternoon forced tournament officials to hold up play for 45 minutes. At least an inch of water was standing on many greens when the rain finally stopped.

Late in the afternoon, players still were using towels to sop up water on the 17th green before they could putt.

Miss Smith and Kathy Whitworth of Jal, N.M., winner of last weekend's Spokane Open, were tied at 219 at the start of the day but Miss Whitworth called a one-stroke penalty on herself when her ball moved on the first hole. She was off her game the rest of the day.

She came in with an 80, good for 299. It was her first over-par round of the tourney.

Mickey Wright of Dallas, Tex., the first-day leader who was seeking a record-breaking 11th tournament win this year, finished third at 300 after shooting a 79 on the final day.

The women's tour moved on to Visalia in, hopefully, sunny California.

3 Champs To Battle This Week

NEW YORK (UPI) — Boxing gets an autumn boost this week, with three world champions scheduled for action and with the Saturday television bouts shifting back to Friday nights after a three-year lapse.

Among the trio of champions, only one will be making a title defense. Pone Kingpetch of Thailand defends his world flyweight (112 pound) crown against southpaw Kiyoyuki Ebihara of Japan at Tokyo Wednesday night. They are scheduled for 15 rounds.

Kingpetch, 27, will receive \$30,000 for making his first defense since he recaptured the title from Japan's Fighting Harada last Jan. 12. Ebihara, a good puncher, scored 23 knockouts while winning 39 of his 41 bouts.

Willie Pastrano of Miami Beach, world light heavyweight (175 pound) champion, meets Gregorio Peralta, heavyweight champion of Argentina, in a nationally televised non-title 10-rounder at the Miami Beach Auditorium Friday night. ABC will continue to televise the weekly fights on Friday night, just as it did on Saturday nights.

Lightweight champion Carlos Ortiz of New York is slated for a non-title 10-rounder with Pete Acera, champion of the Philippines, at Honolulu Stadium Tuesday night. If Acera is impressive, he may get a shot at Ortiz' 135-pound crown.

Former top heavyweight contender Eddie Machen of Portland, Ore., returns to the ring Monday night at Santa Monica, Calif., after a 14-month absence because of a nervous breakdown. He is slated for 10 rounds with Ollie Wilson of Miami, Fla.

Also on the comeback trail, former heavyweight challenger Tom McNeely of Medford, Mass., meets Earl Atley of Philadelphia at the Boston Arena Monday night.

ing performance of the National Football League's opening weekend was the Chicago Bears' revamped defense.

In a game that owner-coach George Halas described as "the greatest team effort I've ever experienced," the Bears held the champion Green Bay Packers to a net total of 160 yards Sunday and knocked off coach Vince Lombardi's men, 10-3.

This was the lowest Packers score since 1959 and the first time they were beaten in Green Bay since 1960.

Brown indicated he enjoys the new regime of coach Blanton Collier by scoring three touchdowns in Cleveland's 37-14 win over the Washington Redskins; Tittle threw three touchdown passes and ran 9 yards for a score in the Giants' 37-28 triumph over the Baltimore Colts, and Tarkenton's passing set up two last-period TD's that gave the Minnesota Vikings a 24-20 victory over the San Francisco Forty Niners.

In the other game on Sunday's program, the Philadelphia Eagles and Pittsburgh Steelers battled to a 21-21 tie, and in Saturday night games, the Detroit Lions whipped the Los Angeles Rams, 23-2, and the St. Louis Cardinals upset the Dallas Cowboys, 34-7.

The NFL's seven opening games attracted 334,734 fans—an average of 47,819 per contest.

The largest crowd — 60,029 — watched the Giants-Colts battle at Baltimore. The smallest turnout was the 30,781 that watched the Vikings-Forty Niners opener at San Francisco.

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Tarkenton Passing Arm Brings Victory To Minnesota

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — As far as coach Red Hickey of the San Francisco Forty Niners is concerned today, three quarters is long enough time for any football game.

The prospectors led the Minnesota Vikings until the final four minutes of play Sunday, then dropped a 24-20 decision—which is just about what the odds-makers had predicted.

"We played well during the first half," said Hickey. "At the intermission, I felt we were going to win it."

Hard To Stop
"But playing against Fran Tarkenton (Minnesota quarterback) is like playing against a team with an extra man in the backfield. It's hard to contain that boy. He can run and scramble and get out of trouble. He's hard to stop."

Coach Norm Van Brocklin of the Vikings agreed.

"It was the greatest game in Tarkenton's career," said Van Brocklin. "He kept the team going when it might have given up after drives to the 17 and 15-yard lines were stopped in the third quarter on a pass interception and a fumble."

Tarkenton completed 20 of 29 passes for 262 yards and one touchdown and he set up the other two Viking scores with perfect aerials.

Frustrating Game
It was a frustrating game for the Forty Niners. They had dropped five straight exhibitions and apparently had this one all tucked away when they went into the fourth quarter holding a 21-10 lead.

Then the roof caved in as Tarkenton led his boys on touchdown marches of 67 and 71 yards.

San Francisco, playing before 30,781, the smallest opening-day crowd since the club joined the National Football League, had it electrified its fans when Abe Woodson took the opening kickoff 103 yards for a touchdown.

Two Field Goals
Minnesota tied it on Tarkenton's 41-yard touchdown pass to score came when John Brodie
