

Prince Charles Undergoes Remarkable Change In Appearance, Personality; Develops Poise

LONDON (NEA)—Britons are amazed at how Prince Charles, the Prince of Wales, has changed in recent months.

The 14-year-old boy who one day will be king has shot upwards seemingly overnight, and he is now taller than his mother, the Queen. He has lost his puppy fat, his jaw has lengthened, his voice has changed and he now shaves the down from his upper lip—once a week.

But the changes are not all physical. Overnight, Charles has developed poise. His bearing is manly, his personality attractive. Of course there was that cherry brandy episode. His parents may have winced when Charles walked into a hotel bar and ordered a drink recently, but most of the nation was secretly delighted.

Britons are already looking forward to Charles's investiture, when the Queen will publicly crown him as Prince of Wales.

This takes place when Charles is 16, at Caernarvon Castle in Wales. It will mark his public debut, and mean that henceforth Charles plays an active role in public life.

As Charles returns to Gordonstoun for a second year, many Britons are wondering whether this unorthodox school which his father attended is really good for the prince.

Does it offer the best training for kingship, or is it guided by cranky ideals which have no place in British life? This is the question that is being asked here.

Much of the criticism of Gordonstoun stems from the fact that its founder, Dr. Kurt Hahn, was a German. Anti-German feeling is never far beneath the surface here. The criticism can be summarized in three statements:

1. Gordonstoun seeks to foster an "elite" along Teutonic lines. Actually, Dr. Hahn appears to have been inspired more by the Greeks than by the Germans.

Just as Plato called the ruling class of his ideal republic "guardians," so the head boy at Gordonstoun is known as "the guardian." He is assisted by "helpers," who correspond to Plato's "auxiliaries."

2. Gordonstoun has no academic standing. In the five-year period ending 1961 only 19 boys entered Oxford and Cambridge, which are Britain's top universities.

3. Gordonstoun places too much emphasis on physical training.

The boys, Prince Charles included, start their day at 6:45 a.m. with a couple of fast laps around the track, followed by a cold shower, all of which is unnecessarily harsh, it is argued here.

Others, however, see virtues in Gordonstoun's regimen. The fitness program is praised in some quarters as building character and encouraging initiative.

Gordonstoun boys, for example, are expected to be able to handle a boat.

One of the most controversial features of the school is its "honor system," whereby the pupil is encouraged to mark down on a personal training card every time he infringes the rules. He is also honor-bound to list his personal failings.

Prince Charles, for example, is a nail-biter, and under the Gordonstoun system this should go down on his card as a black mark.

One of Gordonstoun's most closely guarded secrets is the punishment that was meted out to Charles after the cherry brandy episode. It is said, however, to have involved a session with the headmaster, after which the boy was sent to his room in a hurry to sit down.

There is a flourishing black market in Prince Charles name tags at Gordonstoun.

The name tags are bits of white tape on which the prince's name is embroidered in red, and they are supposed to be sewn inside his school clothing.

But there was a raid on the linen room after which the bits of cloth were swapped feverishly among Charles's schoolmates.

This is proof, if proof were needed, that the future Prince of Wales finds it hard to lead the life of an ordinary boy here.

The truth, of course, is that Prince Charles is not "ordinary" boy. How can he be when every sixpence he spends for a chocolate bar bears the profile of his mother?

Even the postage stamp that he sticks on the letter home bears the Queen's portrait.

What "ordinary" boy has an income of \$28,000 a year? This is Charles's revenue from the Duchy of Cornwall. Although he never sees any of it, it is still credited to his estate. (His income will be raised to \$84,000 a year when he is 18).

Troubled Gemini Space Program May Be Doomed To Die In 1964

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI)—The United States stands a better than even chance of having to wait another 16 months or longer before it can send more astronauts into space.

This means the Soviet Union, which would hardly be expected to stand idly by amid such a golden opportunity, might have all to itself the entire year of 1964 to build an impressive and perhaps insurmountable lead in the race for man's conquest of space.

And it could mean a major shakeup in America's manned space flight programs — particularly its expensive, time-consuming and thus far fruitless Project Gemini — in the next six to twelve months.

Gemini, billed as the "follow on" to the famed Project Mercury, is supposed to send two-man teams of U.S. astronauts into orbits around earth for a variety of long duration flights that also would perform some key tests in linking space ships together.

But Project Gemini may develop death rattle even as it is painfully born. Congress could well see to that when, next January, it starts comparing expenses with results and takes note of the following items:

Date Was Postponed — The first manned flight in Project Gemini originally was set for late 1963. That already has slipped to October, 1964, and it is an odds-on favorite to skid all the way into 1965. Since the Mercury program was axed, that would mean no U.S. manned space flights next year.

— This, in turn, means the Gemini program may be running square into the rear end of the first earth orbit flight of the three-man Apollo space ships now set for late 1965. Congress may question the value of running such a little-and-late project like the

watched night and day by a police officer? Charles's "private eye" is Detective Constable Michael Varney, who sleeps in an adjacent room in the dormitory, and follows his charge around in a small auto, whenever Charles goes cycling with the rest of the boys.
