

Officials Can't Agree On Course If Tax Issue Defeated

(Editor's note: Is there excess "fat" in state government? Do voters want economy, or do they want some new taxes? Last of a series.)

SALEM (UPI)—State officials are deeply concerned over the

possible defeat of the 1963 legislature's \$60 million tax increase measure at the Oct. 15 special election.
But there's no agreement on what should be done.
Some say the defeat would be a mandate from the people against any tax increase.

Senate President Ben Musa, D-The Dalles, feels that way. He says "it would be a kick in the teeth of the voters to pass new taxes if voters turn down the tax measure." Senate Tax Committee Chairman Boyd Overhulse, D-Madras, agrees.
House Speaker Clarence Bar-

ton, D-Coquille, feels defeat of the tax measure should be met by some cuts in spending and enactment of some new revenue measures.
House Tax Committee Chairman Richard Eymann, D - Marcola, feels some new taxes should be enacted. His committee already

has some ready in case a special session of the legislature is called.
Present Bill 'Compromise'
The present tax bill has been termed a "compromise of compromises" by Gov. Mark Hatfield.
That's because there is a deep difference of philosophy between the House and Senate. Hatfield fears a special session could erupt into another Senate - House fight such as the one which dominated the closing days of the 141-day 1963 regular session.

Some state officials say privately that Hatfield might be able to trim \$60 million from the \$404 million general fund budget.
"If he uses a scalpel instead of a cleaver," he might be able to do it without crippling state services, one high official said.
But the same official warned "this is not really the way to get the job done. There is some fat in state government, but it would be much better if the cuts could be made in an orderly manner rather than as an hysterical reaction to a voters revolt."
In spite of public clamorings designed to salvage the tax bill at the Oct. 15 election, many state officials admit privately the measure seems doomed.

Obviously she has very considerate children. Which figures. Miss Coca herself is certainly not the type who would chuck a duck out of the house on a rainy day.

I should explain that Miss Coca is participating in what some press agent has labelled an "aerathon." It's a gimmick to publicize her new television series, "Grindl," which premieres later this month.

An "aerathon" requires her to fly to one city for breakfast, to another city for lunch and to another city for dinner.

Miss Coca is ideally suited for that type of tour because flying terrifies her.

"You're going to have a problem on this trip," she warned her

traveling companion, Lindsay Durrant.

"How so?" asked Miss Durrant.

"I have to have three drinks before I can get up enough nerve to board an airplane, and when I have three drinks I'm a problem," Miss Coca explained.

Actually, however, she was spoofing about the drinks. Miss Coca signed a temperance pledge when she was six years old.

I asked Miss Coca how she had managed to control her fear and she said she does it by day-dreaming. While in the air, she dreams up situations where things go wrong with the plane.

This method has one basic defect, however. Miss Coca still hasn't decided what song she should sing.

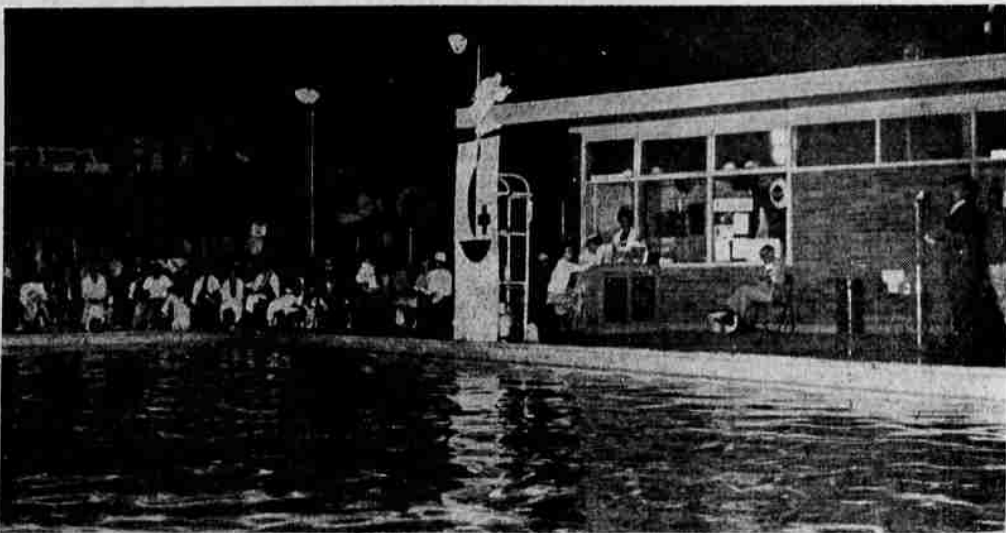
She was leaning toward "Nearer My God To Thee" until Miss Durrant reminded her that it was what the band played when the Titanic was sinking.

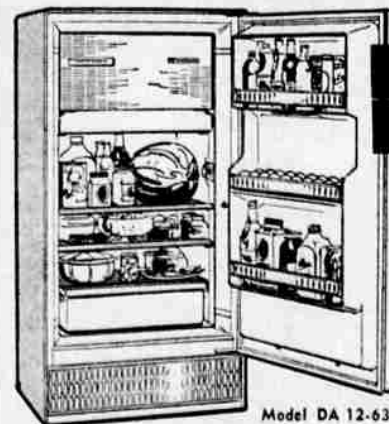
