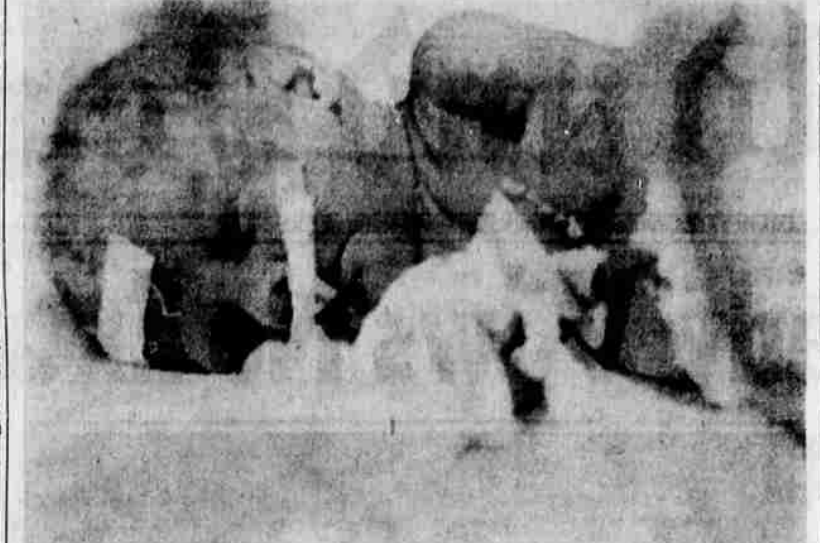

Fischer Quints Grow Stronger; Mother Yearns For Other Five

ABERDEEN, S. D. (UPI) — The Fischer quintuplets kept getting healthier today and their mother was so heartened she began yearning for her other five children at home.

Mrs. Mary Ann Fischer, 30, her short, curly red hair glistening and her lips lightly brushed with lipstick, expressed her joy Tuesday as she shyly met with newsmen for the first time since she gave birth to four girls and a boy Saturday.

Two of the quints had gained so much strength today that their doctor increased their food intake.

Dr. James N. Berbos, the general practitioner who delivered the five, said he had increased the amount of formula that Mary Catherine and James Andrew were getting by 1 cc.

He said all five tots were doing fine.

Meets With Newsmen

Mrs. Fischer was pushed into the basement cafeteria of St. Luke's Hospital in a wheelchair for the improvised news conference. She wore green slippers and a pale blue housecoat.

She said she would have gone into the delivery room again to avoid having the news conference. But it was evident that her concern for her children — all 10 of them — overshadowed all other considerations.

She confessed that she was "very happy" over her five tiny tots and she told how a mother of quads from another Aberdeen — this one in Scotland — had called her on the phone. Then someone asked:

"Are you lonesome for your children at home?"

"I sure am," she said.

"Have you been worrying about the children?"

Oldest Is Seven

Mrs. Fischer and her husband, Andrew, 39, already had Danny, 7, Charlotte, 6, Julie, 5, Evelyn, 4, and Denise, 3, before the quints came. Mrs. Fischer said she had spoken over the phone to the oldest three.

The children were "real tickled" over their new sisters and brother.

She said she hadn't thought yet whether she would dress the quints alike. Asked whether she would be happy to have the washer and dryer and other gifts already valued at several scores of thousands of dollars, she replied merely:

"Sure will."

A reporter asked her if she had a choice "Would you have quints again?"

"I told them upstairs (her room is on the third floor) that I'd rather go into the delivery room than come down here," she replied with a slight smile.

When she learned she was pregnant, did she want a boy or girl?

"I wanted a boy," she said quickly. "That makes the other boy happy."

Porter To Seek Freedom For Prisoners Of Castro

MIAMI (UPI) — Former Congressman Charles O. Porter of Oregon Tuesday announced plans to fly to Cuba Friday to ask Premier Fidel Castro for the release of an estimated 75,000 political prisoners in Cuban jails.

Porter said Castro will be requested to free the prisoners "on humanitarian grounds alone and to permit them to come to the United States if they wish to do so."

"We have nothing to offer, nothing to bargain with," he said.

The Eugene, Ore., lawyer, who served as Democratic congressman from 1957 to 1960, is making the trip on behalf of the Association of Relatives Pro-Freedom of Cuban Political Prisoners, Inc., a Miami-based organization.

Mrs. Consuelo Villaverde, president of the association, appeared with Porter at a press conference at which his journey was explained.

Porter said the United States "presumably" would not object to having the Cuban prisoners come to the U.S. if they have relatives here. Mrs. Villaverde said that probably a "large percentage" of prisoners would elect to remain in Cuba with their families there.

Porter, who will fly to Havana from Mexico City on Friday aboard a Cubana Air Line plane, said he expects to remain in Cuba about 10 days.

He indicated that his one advantage is that he has met Castro on three separate occasions — twice in Cuba in 1959 shortly after the bearded leader came to power and once in Washington, D.C., in April of that same year, when Castro visited the U.S.

He said he has also "been in touch" with New York attorney James B. Donovan, who negotiated the release of the Bay of Pigs prisoners from Cuba in exchange for \$53 million in ransom goods.

Porter said the administration has given him clearance to make the trip but it has not indicated either formal approval or disapproval of his objective.

Police Seize Marijuana

SEATTLE (UPI) — Police raided a University District rooming house Tuesday night, arrested 10 persons and seized marijuana and pep pills as the climax to a week of intensive investigation.

Nine of the persons arrested were minors and the other was a 28-year-old woman.

A member of the Police Department's special patrol squad, Joe Cordas, acting as an undercover agent, said he made several purchases at the house during the past week.

His last purchase, amounting to \$30, came Tuesday night just before police raided the house.

Police said a large amount of marijuana was seized.

Three women, 18, 19, and 28, and seven young men were arrested. The young men included four who were 18 years old, two 19, and one 20.

The 19-year-old said they were musicians. One young man, 18, said he was a student, while the other four said they were laborers.

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Publicized Romance Of Heiress To End In Divorce

ZURICH, Switzerland (UPI) — Heiress Gamble Benedict Porumbeau, who defied her family and American courts to get married three years ago, went into hiding today to dodge questions about her forthcoming divorce from the man for whom she risked a fortune.

Tuesday an attorney for Gamble, who was 19 years old when she married Andrei Porumbeau to cap a romance that captured headlines on two continents, revealed and moved out of their Swiss chalet overlooking Lake Zurich.

They have two children, Gheorge Mihai, 2, and Grigoreo, 9 months.

The attorney, Eigon Curtin, predicted the divorce will become effective in six months to a year if Porumbeau does not fight it.

"The claim is based on the ground of misconduct by Andrei Porumbeau," Curtin said. "Mrs. Porumbeau had revoked all powers of attorney to her husband."

In New York, Porumbeau refused to comment on the announcement. The one-time hairdresser, chauffeur, butler and consultant checked into a \$70-a-day suite at the Savoy-Hilton Hotel a week ago but later moved into less expensive accommodations.

Curtin said Gamble also had "gone abroad," but he did not specify where.

Porumbeau was 35 when he divorced his first wife and married "Gambi" before a justice of the peace in Hendersonville, N.C., on April 6, 1960.

The ceremony thwarted the wishes of Gamble's iron-willed grandmother, Mrs. Katherine Geddes Benedict, who had been determined to prevent the marriage.

The 77-year-old lady remained opposed to the match until her death in October, 1961. But when her will became known it was found she had left Gamble a \$20 million trust fund. On her 21st birthday, Gamble received \$300,000 in a lump-sum inheritance from the Remington typewriter fortune.

Accident Claims Life Of Boy, 2

SALEM (UPI) — John Severt Jr., 2, died at a Stayton Hospital Tuesday of injuries he received when a fork lift truck ran over him at a fertilizer plant at Shaw, east of here.

State police said the boy's father, John Severt Sr., said he had been unloading sacks of fertilizer and that the boy apparently wandered in back of the fork lift truck.

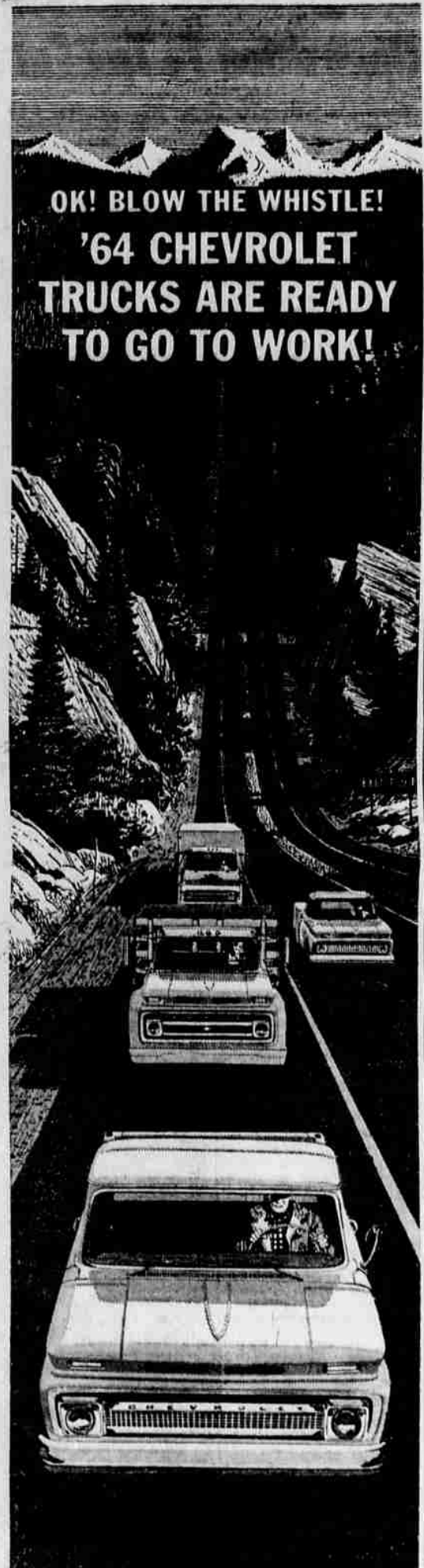
Cooper Heads Highway Group
