

Committee Approves Writer Suggests Bridge Column By Non-Expert

Giant Defense Fund

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate group heeded administration pleas and added \$60 million for research and development on the mobile mid-range ballistic missile program, upping the total for this weapon to \$103 million.

The House had slashed \$100 million from the rear of tracked vehicles.

The committee also earmarked \$125 million for continued research on the Dynastar rocket and R570 supersonic bomber programs. The House had given Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara more leeway to use the funds elsewhere if he saw fit.

Sen. Richard B. Russell, D-Ga., floor manager for the bill, said it probably would be put before the full Senate sometime next week, following final action on the nuclear test ban treaty.

Russell, chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, said the proposed funds would provide the manpower and weapons needed to maintain U.S. strength in the face of current world uncertainties.

The bill totaled \$47,371,407,000 which was \$288,398,000 more than approved by the house but \$1,642,830,000 less than the amount requested by President Kennedy.

It was not a record, however, being \$279 million less than the amount appropriated for defense last year.

The accent, as in last year's bill, was on strengthening special U.S. combat forces which wage conventional warfare, and providing more missiles for strategic warfare.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Most newspapers nowadays carry a bridge column. Which is good. But these columns are written by bridge experts. Which is bad.

Every now and then I read one of the columns and when I do I am always amazed by how jocular the cards are.

I was aware, of course, of Hoyle's decree that "The cards speak for themselves," but until I started reading bridge columns I did not realize they were such gabby little things.

When a bridge columnist is analyzing a hand, the cards chatter away like so many magpies, somewhat as follows:

"East led the club nine. It told west that east was short-suited in diamonds and the spade jack was unprotected."

"West captured the trick with the club king and returned a low heart, which said that he could establish the diamond queen and would ruff the second spade lead."

"This ability of cards to express themselves so fluently is altogether marvelous except that they have a basic speech defect."

Most of us bridge players limit ourselves to what is called "party bridge," or what is known in my circles as "drinking bridge."

We can understand what our own cards are saying perfectly well, but we have trouble hearing what the other cards say.

Therefore, it seems to me that someone should start a bridge column written by a non-expert and aimed at the party bridge set. Perhaps something along this line:

"North-South were the host and hostess and also vulnerable. North opened the bidding with a diamond.

"An opening diamond bid by the host tells the hostess that the ash trays are getting full and that she should empty them the next time she is dummy."

"East mentioned two hearts. A jump bid following an opening diamond said she had on a new dress and would like west to comment."

"West bid three hearts. A raise in partner's suit said the dress looked very nice but was a little snug around the hips."

"North passed. Declarer's failure to pursue his opening diamond bid said he thought snug-fitting dresses were real sexy."
