

Rejuvenated Owls Host Rugged Seattle Ramblers Saturday

An almost completely new unit of Oregon Tech Owls will take the field Saturday night at Modoc to do battle with the always rugged semi-pro Seattle Ramblers in the first game of the season for Coach Ron Pheister's new charges.

Optimism is the key word at Oregon Tech this season in football. Coach Pheister and his assistants, Howard Morris and Larry Burleson, did a splendid recruiting job to get some fine

junior college transfers and some very fine looking freshmen to put on the field this season.

The coaching staff, all new last season, came into the Owl nest completely unarmed and with no chance to recruit on their own. They had to take what was on the campus and the Owls finished with a terrible 2-6 season, next to last in the conference.

But the coaches did have a chance to recruit this year and it will be worth the money to

come out and see what they recruited. The Owls look like a very good ball club this year and the coaches are just about to bust their seams with enthusiasm.

The Owls will be an exciting club to watch—win or lose—with some of the players recruited. But the Owls don't figure to be pushed around by any team this year and that includes the Ramblers.

The Owls will be paced by a pair of junior college All-American backs. One is Sonny Luke, a Grays Harbor JC All-American halfback. He has good football speed although he isn't blistering fast. He is an exciting runner and an experienced one. The other is 231-pound fullback Bob Battles from Contra Costa JC where he gained All-American honors. He can run the 100 in about 10.7, very good for such a big man. He is hard to bring down and

supplies the up-the-middle power the Owls lacked last year.

One of the best catches whom the Klamath fans have watched for years is Crater High School's all-around athlete Mike Glines. The cocky little signal caller will be the field general for the Owls. He runs very well and throws very well. The Owl aerial game should be 100 per cent better this season.

Those three will be in the starting backfield along with Vic Ventura, a sticky-fingered back from Hawaii. Other backs who will see offensive action will be fullback Alan Brady (202), Claude Shipp (152), John Marisich (155), Henry Pelfrey (179) and Randy Sorenson (154).

There are some other backs, most of which will be on defense. The line will include two returning lettermen in Kenny Lenhardt (197), the captain, at one guard

and Richard Yamashiro of Hawaii (187) at the other. Tackles will be Rockne Luckman (249) who was at OTI last semester but didn't play, and Bob Bonner (231). Ends will be 211-pound JC transfer John Pattinson and 179-pound Gary Burt. Center is letterman Chuck Hawkins (211).

The defense will have Ben Brannham (211) and John Harris (239) at tackles, Jack Kutter (256) and John Snead (215) at guards, with Bruce Rodabaugh (207), Vaughn Cartwright (217), Carl Schultz (205) and Steve Kowalchuk (176) at linebackers. The backs will be the veteran of the club, Sam Leon Broadous (176), Leon Warren (175) and Gary Wald (151) at safety.

Chiloquin's Al DeBortoli (156) also could see some defensive duty as a linebacker. Shipp will see a lot of action as an offensive halfback. He has the top speed on the team at 9.5 and can really burn when he gets loose.

The Ramblers will be the biggest team the Owls will face all year. Their probable starting offensive unit will have Ray Jackson, a 185-pound bruiser, as one halfback with 195-pound Tony Softli. Paul Uchinski is the probable quarterback at 195 and Jerry Cail (203) at fullback.

The line will be bolstered by the veteran of the club, Sam Buckley, an end and primarily defensive man at 245. Others might be Gene Yerabek (200) at center, Bob Beattie (235) and

Officials Driving For Club

MILWAUKEE (UPI)—County executive John Doyle and a local banker today were trying to muster a drive to keep the Milwaukee Braves from moving to another city amid speculation the ballclub was planning to do so.

Doyle said Thursday he had talked with the executive director of the Greater Milwaukee Committee, and the group planned to take up the Braves' situation at a meeting scheduled today.

He was being backed in his drive to keep the Braves in Milwaukee by banker Elliot Fitch, who Thursday bought 1,000 tickets for 1964 because "Milwaukee must remain a major league city."

Doyle indicated today's meeting would center on ways to stimulate season ticket sales and exploration of the radio-television revenue potential.

Braves' President John McHale reiterated Thursday night the ball team has made no commitment to any city, including Milwaukee, for the 1964 season, despite having a contract with the county for the stadium that runs until 1965.

McHale said the Braves' board of directors would consider very soon the offers of all cities who have approached the owners in recent weeks about moving the franchise that came here from Boston in 1953.

Caveman, Viking Tussle Tops

North Salem's Vikings have their work cut out for them tonight, but in a way it's just a "tune-up" as Oregon prep football starts its second week of 1963.

Coach Spike Hillstrom's second-ranked Vikes take on Grants Pass on the latter's home field. Grants Pass ranks third in the Journal coaches' poll.

Next week North Salem plays host to the current top-ranked team, Medford, to which it lost the state A-1 title game last year. Medford is at Boise tonight.

Jefferson of Portland will be favored in a Friday night game against Roosevelt. The Democrats are ranked fourth.

Other top games include fifth-rated Roseburg hosting Springfield; sixth-ranked Pendleton at home against The Dalles; and seventh-ranked Beaverton playing Central Catholic.

Some other top games include: Hillsboro at Astoria; Sunset at Milwaukie; Oregon City at St. Helens; Crater at Sweet Home; Albany at Corvallis; Klamath Falls at South Salem; Ashland at Lebanon; Marshfield at Eugene; Sheldon High; South Eugene at North Bend; North Eugene at Willamette; Bend at Mac-Hi; Redmond at Hermiston; Madras at Baker and Prineville at La Grande.

College Football Squads Begin Action This Weekend

College football opens its attendance "war" with the professionals this weekend with an estimated 500,000 expected to witness 12 top collegiate contests.

Three games, including Pittsburgh at UCLA, Florida State at Miami (Fla.) and Texas at Tulane, are on the card tonight.

The Florida State-Miami battle is expected to attract a near-capacity crowd of 65,000 in the Orange Bowl; 35,000 are anticipated for the UCLA-Pitt game and 30,000 at Tulane in the Sugar Bowl.

Capacity crowds are promised already Saturday at LSU where 67,500 will see the Tigers entertain Texas A&M; at West Virginia, where 35,000 will watch Navy play the Mountaineers; at Little Rock, where Arkansas and Oklahoma State clash before an overflow of 48,500.

The Pitt Panthers boast one of their best all-around backfields, headed by All-American candidate Paul Martha, a halfback. The Bruins have had a year to get used to the T-formation since converting from the single wing and the contest is rated a toss-up.

Florida State makes a habit of upsetting the powers and will have to call on its habit to stop quarterback George Mira and Miami's Hurricanes, who are an eight point choice in the intra-state rivalry.

Pastrano To Battle Peralta

MIAMI BEACH (UPI)—World light-heavyweight champion Willie Pastrano takes on Argentina's tough heavyweight king, Gregorio Peralta, tonight in a non-title bout which brings the television fight of the week back to Friday.

It shapes up as a tough 10-rounder for Pastrano who fights out of Miami. He has 60 wins, 11 losses and 8 draws compared to Peralta's 41 wins in 43 bouts.

It will be the first time since 1960 that the weekly fight will be seen on Friday night. The event began on Fridays in 1944, but was shifted to Saturdays three years ago.

Both boys are 29, and Peralta has come a long way from his first fight when he lost to Mauro Mina in 1960. That was the only bout he ever lost. He has one draw.

Pastrano has been rocked many times in his career, but has showed a lot of staying power. He won the title on a decision from Harold Johnson in Las Vegas June 1.
