LAKEVIEW — Baskets of coral and white gladioli on each side of the pulpit formed the background for the wedding of Margaret Hunsaker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Rex Hunsaker of Lakeview, and Daniel G. 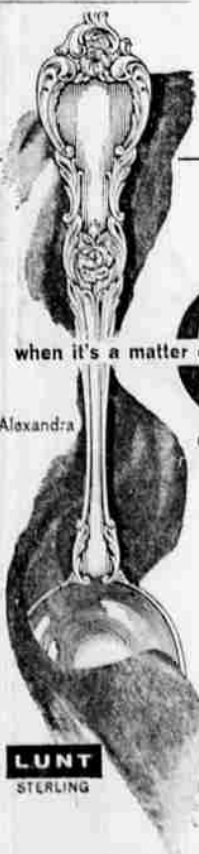
