Oregon DAR Group Visits Lakeview Area

Thirty-nine women made up the group which came to Lakeview by chartered bus to acquaint themselves with the exceptional items in the Schminck Memorial Museum. They represented chapters from Portland, Bend, Astoria, Eugene, Corvallis, McMinnville and Albany, and were joined here by four members from Klamath Falls, Mrs. Guy Barton, Mrs. Wood, regent of Eulalia Chapter, Mrs. William L. Wales Jr. and Mrs. Lloyd Ryser.

A no-host breakfast started the day, after which the group visited the museum under the direction of the curator, Jennie Carroll. As guests of the Lakeview Soroptimist Club for lunch at the Indian Village they were taken on a picture tour of the county with projection and comment by Mrs. Anne Sprague, county school superintendent, and prominent member of the club. She concluded with the message that once one has lived under the spell of Lake County, no longer are you satisfied with any other spot on earth. The guests were presented with mementoes of the area, and of Lakeview as the tallest town of Oregon.

At three o'clock in the after-

noon at the grave of Mrs. Schminck, who died in 1962, the marker was placed on the grave by Mrs. Craig Coyner of Bend, state regent, with tribute to the memory of a faithful member.
