

Seattle Ramblers Edge Improved Owl Eleven, 14-12

South Salem Trounces Hapless Pelicans, 53-0

SALEM — The Klamath Union Pelicans suffered one of the worst defeats in recent years of the school here Friday night when the turbine-hot South Salem Saxons turned them every way but loose in thoroughly trouncing the visitors, 53-0.

The Saxons, who last week lost to second-ranked North Salem, 26-6, looked like an entirely different team as their offense worked to perfection, both in the air and on the ground to the tune of 442 total yards against a Pelican defense which took a beating most of the night.

The Pelicans, after playing a decent game last week against Grants Pass, the third-ranked team in the state, and losing by 12-0 and one on an illegal play missed by the officials, completely fell apart in face of the blistering Salem attack Friday night.

The defensive line was thoroughly beaten throughout the game and the offensive line gave little help to the backs. Mike Kitching was about the only semblance of an offense the Pelicans had as he rolled up 45

Beavers Upend Utah St.

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI)—Oregon State's quick-striking Beavers recovered from a shaky start and a brilliant performance by Utah's Andy Ireland Saturday night and went on to wallop the inexperienced Utes, 29-14.

A season-opening crowd of 17,381 saw the intercollegiate clash in Ute Stadium.

The Beavers spotted Utah a 14-0 lead, then struck for four touchdowns in the brief span of seven minutes, four seconds to take a 29-14 advantage. From that point on, the Pacific Coast independent gobbled up large chunks of yardage while playing a possession-type game.

AOI Chief Urges Work On Reforms

Robert R. Carey, president of Associated Oregon Industries, urged state AFL-CIO convention delegates today to work jointly with management for a workmen's compensation reform bill to be introduced at the next session of the Oregon Legislature.

Speaking to the AFL-CIO convention at Eugene, Carey said labor and management has "locked horns for years" on workmen's compensation reform and both have lost on every occasion.

Carey noted the suggestion made by Rep. Ed Whelan, D-Portland, and secretary of the Multnomah County Labor Council, that organized labor and management ought to get together periodically to discuss problems of mutual interest and concern, has been well received by both labor and business leaders.

"I feel it is a solid step in improving labor-management relations in Oregon," said the soft-spoken industrial leader. Carey suggested the workmen's compensation reform issue is an excellent example of a mutual problem which could be solved in this manner.

Klamath Tankers Beaten

Medford's fine swimming team defeated the improving Klamath Union team Saturday at the high school pool, the boys winning 52-27 and the girls winning 71-13.

Klamath's boys copped only two first places in the 10 events with Chester Aubrey winning the 100-yard butterfly event in a fine 1:18 flat. Ken Webb-Bowen was third in the same event in 1:24.7. Medford's Dennis Carson was second in 1:20 flat.

Phil Verdui won the other first and in the closest race of the day. He beat out Medford's Larson by three-tenths of a second in the 400-yard freestyle race. That is extremely close considering that the competitors have to swim the pool 24 times. The time was 5:26.6 to 5:26.9.

Steve Kramer placed third in the 200-yard freestyle in 2:19.6 to Bruce Hess' 2:19 flat. Hess is one of the top swimmers in the state. Dave Kovich was second in the 50-yard freestyle and second in the 100-yard freestyle. Kramer also copped a second in the 100-yard backstroke and Doug McGinty a second in the 100-yard breaststroke. The relay teams were second in both relays.

The Medford girls blanked the Klamath girls in firsts. Kay Kramer got a second in the 50-yard backstroke and a third in the 100-yard freestyle. Debbie Fern was second in the 50-yard freestyle and Carolyn Dey second in the 100-yard backstroke. Sharon Callison got a pair of thirds in the 50-yard breaststroke and the 100-yard breaststroke.

yards in nine carries for a fine 7.2 average. He got off on one play which probably would have gone all the way for a 53-yard touchdown, but a penalty stopped it.

South Salem's passing game rattled the Pelicans' secondary with eight completions in 13 attempts for 123 yards and one touchdown. The Whitebirds were able to complete only four of 16 and the quarterback was harassed so that he had little time to pick a receiver. The four passes, however, covered 63 yards and the Pelicans made only 75 yards on the ground, 65 by Kitching.

Jim Nicholson, Mickey Wright and Roger Bayne all tallied a pair of touchdowns for the winners. Nicholson got the Saxons off and winging in the first period when he dashed nine yards for the first score. Bruce Black booted the point.

Wright got the second tally when he bulled four yards for the six points and Black again converted. The Saxons scored with 14 seconds left in the half when Wright plunged across from one-yard away. Black kicked his third straight point.

The second half got worse. The Pelicans had nothing and the Saxons ran over them at will. Quarterback Bob Putman started the parade off in the third period with a one-yard buck and Black kicked again. Then came Nicholson's second TD of the night on a seven-yard run and Black finally missed a point after kick.

Dick Vogt got into the scoring act with a four-yard dash to pay dirt for the sixth tally and the kick conversion failed again. Roger Bayne got his first six-pointer when he took the ball across from two yards away and Warren Kellett ran the point over.

The final touchdown came on a 10-yard pass from sub quarterback Terry Noble to Bayne and the kick failed.

The Pelicans will take on Corvallis, another tough opponent, next week in a non-conference battle.

Penn State Upsets Oregon With Fourth Period Rally

PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI)—Penn State unveiled its new super-secret "swing-T" offense with a 17-7 football victory over slightly favored Oregon Saturday night.

The Nittany Lions exploded for a touchdown and a field goal in the fourth period to break a 7-7 tie.

Coach Rip Engle came up with a new formation featuring an end, called a "Z-back," split 12 to 15 yards on either side and an unbalanced line.

It opened up the Oregon defense and quarterback Pete Liske completed 11 of 12 passes for 113 yards and two touchdowns. Don Gaum and Dick Gingrich, a pair of converted quarterbacks, manned the new "Z back" position and did much of the receiving. Penn State went ahead to stay

Defensive Battle Produces Interesting Game For Fans

A pair of rock-ribbed defenses collided on Modoc Field Saturday night and except for a margin of two extra points would have battled to a deadlock.

As it was, the kicking toe of Joe Jones brought the Seattle Ramblers a thrill-packed 14 to 12 victory over the Oregon Tech Owls in their season's opener.

An aerial assault in the closing three minutes of play with Mike Glines engineering the attack bogged down on the Seattle 31-yard line as Seattle took over with only 46 seconds left and froze the ball to put their victory on ice.

The first score of the game came in the closing 18 seconds of the first half when Paul Utchinski went back to pass for the Ramblers who had the ball first and 10 on their own 15-yard line as the result of a pass interception by Dick Pulsevich.

Utchinski had the ball knocked out of his hands before he could pass and it rolled 15 yards into the Rambler end zone. John Harris of Oregon Tech alertly gobbled up the loose ball for the touchdown. An extra point boot by John Maracich was low and under the crossbars, but the Owl left the field at halftime holding an impressive 6-0 lead over the highly rated Ramblers, a collection of college and high school grid standouts.

Seattle opened the second half kicking off to the Owls and Gerald Luke returned it to the 30. Bob Battle picked up a yard, Luke failed to gain and a 15-yard clipping penalty put the Owl's back on their 14. Gordon Ranta booted out on fourth down to Seattle's 41.

From here, the Ramblers began to roll. Three plays with Lonnie Matthews and Martin Wyatt carrying brought them to the Owl 24. Ray Jackson cut over left tackle and moved around left end and scored standing up with five minutes gone in the third quarter. Joe Jones booted the extra point.

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tra point to give Seattle a 7-6 edge.

Both final counters came in the fourth quarter.

The Owls struck first, moving from their own 36-yard line with Glines, Claude Shipp and Bob Battle packing the pigskin, all the way to Seattle's five-yard line where Battle smashed over tackle for the score that put OTI in front 12-7. Maricich's extra point kick was blocked.

With 11:24 left to play in the final quarter, the Ramblers started a downhill march that began on the kickoff which Perry Harper returned to the 43 of Seattle. On straight power plays, paced by Wyatt, Bob Noel and Matthews, the Ramblers punched over three successive first downs. Jackson punched to the Owl three-yard line and hit paydirt on the next carry to make it Seattle 13-12 with just 2:39 left. Jones added the extra point, making it 14-12.

But the game wasn't over yet. Glines took to the air in the closing three minutes as the Owls racked up three straight first downs and moved from their own 20-yard line all the way to the Seattle 35 where a desperation carry by Shipp failed to get the first down and the Ramblers took over on their 31-yard line where quarterback Utchinski froze the ball and ran out the clock.

Both clubs found little running room on the ground against alert defenses, and both clubs battled to a virtual standstill in the statistics. Oregon Tech had 10 first downs to nine for the victors and the Owls chalked up 101 yards rushing and 64 passing.

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for a net total of 165 to 145 rushing and 69 passing for the Ramblers' net total of 205.

Even in defeat, the Owls pleased the meager rooters with their sharp game, and gave great promise of a full season to come that should produce a brilliant season.

Next voting for the Owls will be Saturday, Sept. 28, when they host Weber College of Utah on Modoc Field with kickoff time set for 8 p.m. Weber beat SOC Saturday night, 40-32.
