Upsets Highlight College Opening

The way the nation's major colleges opened the first full week of 1963 football activity you'd have thought Sandy Koufax was pitching for the winners—three shutouts in three games.

The most stunning whitewash Friday night occurred in Miami where the upstart Florida State Seminoles blanked the Hurricanes' great All-America passer, George Mira, for the first time in his career with a 24-0 trouncing.

Steve Tensi, the tallest quarterback in the nation at 6-5, outduelled the 5-11 Mira by completing 13 of 20 tosses before a crowd of 57,988 in Miami's Orange Bowl.

Seminole halfback Fred Biletnikoff scored all three State touchdowns, two on Tensi passes and the third on a startling 99-yard run with a Mira interception.

Florida State, a 7-6 loser to Miami last year, thoroughly discredited the form sheets which had given the Hurricanes an

eight-point edge. Pittsburgh added insult to the odds-makers' already-fatal injury by routing UCLA, 20-0, in what had been termed a "pick 'em" contest.

Bruins Outclassed

The Panthers totally outclassed the Bruins in the intersectional contest witnessed by 28,095 in the Los Angeles Coliseum as Pitt rolled up 27 first downs to the UCLA's six. Rick Leeson, one of the outstanding fullbacks in the country, scored one touchdown and kicked field goals of 27 and 31 yards to personally wreck the West Coast club.

Only Texas, pegged as the nation's No. 1 club in many pre-season pools, followed form, and even the mighty Longhorns fell a bit short. A 25-point favorite over hapless Tulane, the Longhorns had to bull over two fourth-period scores to score a 21-0 victory over a Green Wave club that is winless in its last 12 games.

The Longhorns, playing before a slim crowd of 18,000 in New Orleans' Sugar Bowl, could only manage a field goal by Tony Crosby in the first half, but rolled up 18 points after the halftime intermission on another foot by Crosby and two TDs by wingback Phil Harris.

In Sherman's first year at the Giants' helm in 1961, Conerly quarterbacked the team to the National Football League's Eastern Division title. A member of the Giants for 14 seasons, Conerly retired after the club was

whipped by the Green Bay Packers in the NFL's 1961 championship playoff.

The Memphis Press-Scimitar, in a copyrighted story, reported Friday that Conerly received the checks from Maurice I. Lewis of Memphis, Tenn. Lewis was indicted Jan. 8 in Memphis on football gambling charges and is still awaiting trial.

The newspaper said one check, for \$3,500, was dated Nov. 6, 1961, when Conerly was still with the Giants.

Conerly, who lives in Clarksdale, Miss., and only recently was appointed to an executive role with Standard Oil of Mississippi, bit-terly dismissed the checks as payments for loans he had made to Lewis.

Hamilton, a former captain in the intelligence division of the Los Angeles police department, was brought into the official NFL family as a watchdog after the scandal which resulted in the indefinite suspension last April 17 of Alex Karras of the Detroit Lions and Paul Hornung of the Green Bay Packers for betting.

"We intend to talk to Conerly about the checks," Hamilton was quoted as saying by the Press-Scimitar. "He may have a good explanation, but we certainly intend to get to the bottom of it."

Jack Mara, president of the Giants, said Conerly telephoned him and asked him to "tell the boys I never did anything wrong."

Stu Miller Nearing Record As American League Reliever

Don't overlook little Stu Miller of the Baltimore Orioles when adding up the noteworthy pitching performances of the 1963 season.

The 165-pound flutterball artist can't match the remarkable performances of Sandy Koufax and Ron Perranoski in the National League or Whitey Ford and Dick Radatz in the American League.

But he stands at least an even chance to write a new relief pitching mark into the AL book: most appearances in a season.

Miller relieved in his 69th game of the season and picked up his fifth win Friday night in the Orioles' 7-6 triumph over the Washington Senators. The former San Francisco right-hander thus moved to within two appearances of the AL mark set by Mike Fornieles of the Boston Red Sox in 1960 and can set a new standard by appearing in three of the Orioles' remaining seven games.

Leaders' Magic Number Is Three

The Dodgers' long-awaited "tomorrow" could be today.

After the agony of 1962 and the pressure of the last few weeks, the Dodgers now suddenly find that their "magic" National League pennant-clinching number is down to three.

Another Dodger victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates Saturday night while the St. Louis Cardinals are idle and then a Los Angeles win and St. Louis loss today would end it and make the Dodgers champs.

What looked so difficult a week ago now seems so easy after Don Drysdale's 2-0 triumph over the Pirates Friday night and the Cardinals' 1-0 setback at the hands of John Tsitouris and the Cincinnati Reds. The Dodgers' lead is suddenly ballooned to five games and they need to win only three of their last eight games to clinch even if the Cardinals were to win all six of their remaining games.

Don Drysdale, who has been the hard-luck pitcher of the Los Angeles staff this season, pitched a seven-inning, struck out three and didn't walk a batter in registering his 18th win of the year.

Engineer Triple Seal
In beating the Pirates for the 12th time in 16 games, the Dodgers were limited to nine hits but used their speed to get their runs. Tommy Davis scored on the front end of a triple steal, which also involved Willie Davis and Ken McMullen, in the second inning and Maury Wills beat out an infield hit, went to second on a sacrifice, stole third and tallied on catcher Smokey Burgess' wild throw in the fifth.

Wills' steal, his 37th of the season, set a new Dodger mark of 233 stolen bases in a career, eclipsing Peeewe Reese's former mark.

The Cardinals suffered their fourth straight loss when Tsitouris threw a three-hitter at them for his 11th victory. The Reds scored the only run of the game off Ray Sadleir in the fourth inning when Don Pavletich doubled and tallied on Ken Walters' single.

The Chicago Cubs nipped the Milwaukee Braves, 1-0, the San Francisco Giants drubbed the New York Mets, 6-3, and the Houston Colts edged out the Philadelphia Phillies, 3-2, in other National League games.

In the American League, Kansas City beat New York, 4-3, after a 5-4 defeat. Baltimore topped Washington, 7-6, and Chicago nipped Detroit, 2-0.

Wins 21st Game
Dick Ellsworth pitched a three-hitter, struck out six and walked two to win his 21st game for the Cubs, who scored the game's only run when Andre Rodgers homered in the eighth inning. Ellsworth, a 20-game loser in 1962, has won more games than any Cub pitcher since Hank Wyse won 22 in 1945.

Willie McCovey hit his 39th and 40th homers and Ed Bailey and Orlando Cepeda also homered to lead a nine-hit San Francisco attack that brought Juan Marichal his 24th victory against eight defeats. Marichal's routine going job raised his season total of innings pitched to 304 and made him the first Giant pitcher since 1934 to surpass the 300 total. Carlton Willey suffered his 14th defeat for the Mets.

Ken Johnson gained his 10th triumph against 17 losses for the Colts when Carl Warwick hit a three-run homer off Dennis Bennett in the seventh inning. The loss was Bennett's fifth against eight victories.
