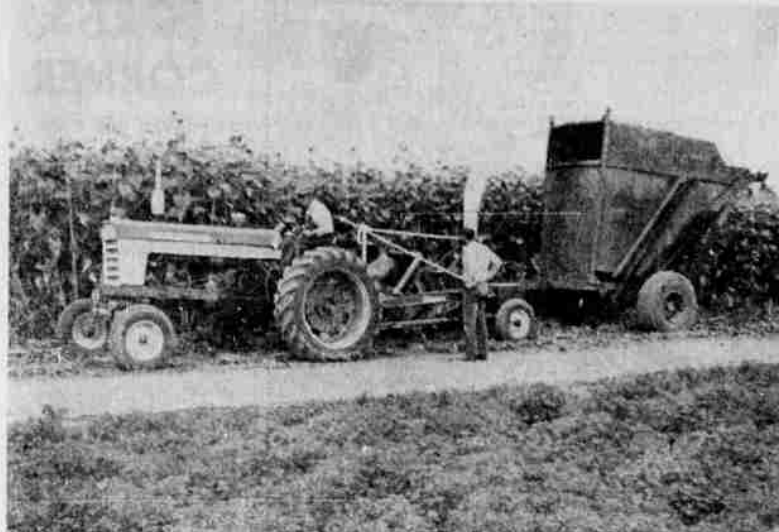

Workshop Planned On Credit

State Consumers Repay At \$2 Million A Day

SEATTLE—Every working day consumers in Oregon repay an estimated \$2,063,000 on the average, for goods and services bought with installment credit, according to an executive of the nation's largest diversified consumer installment financing firm.

"This statistic dramatizes the enviable record Oregon families have achieved in meeting their installment obligations while acquiring automobiles and other goods of lasting value," said Neil A. Miller, assistant vice president of Universal C.I.T. Credit Corporation and head of the company's Seattle division. "It also spotlights the dynamic role played by installment buyers in keeping the state's, and the nation's, economy moving forward."

The nation's consumers have increased their net worth—value of the assets they own less the debts they owe—by more than \$315 billion in the past 10 years, Miller said. In 1962 alone, consumers

Long Time Railroader Ends Run

Alfred F. Peterstainer, 1914 Portland, made his last run for the Southern Pacific on Aug. 24, 1963.

He thus completed more than 44 years service with the railroad, going back to Jan. 1, 1919, when he turned out as a brakeman on the Oregon, California and Eastern (OC&E) railroad here in Klamath Falls.

In 1920 he was promoted to conductor and later to trainmaster. He held that position until 1928 when the OC&E was purchased by the Southern Pacific and Great Northern railroads. At that time, supervisory duties were handled by the parent companies and Peterstainer then returned to the status of conductor which he held until his retirement.

During the period he was trainmaster, the OC&E was one of the major railroads in Oregon with a passenger station near South Sixth Street and was operating as many as eight trains a day between Klamath Falls and Bly.

Peterstainer was affectionately dubbed "Mr. OC & E" by his many friends and associates.

He expects to remain in Klamath Falls and turn his attention to many other activities that time will now permit him to do.

Membership is open to all duly licensed physicians who are members of medical societies approved by the board of directors, and who hold valid pilot's certificates.

Four Yards Purchased By Copeland

The purchase by the Portland-headquartered organization boosts the number of Copeland Yards in Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Nevada and California to 72. J. W. Copeland, president and general manager, said the new yards will enable the Copeland organization to be an even better buying organization.

West Coast To Purchase Two Turbo-Prop F27s

West Coast Airlines expects to exercise an option Oct. 1 to purchase two turbine-powered F-27 Fairchild passenger planes from Aloha Airlines of Honolulu, it was announced recently by J. Nicholas Bez Jr., vice president and assistant to the president.

The acquisition will be subject to approval of the Civil Aeronautics Board.

"West Coast also is desirous of obtaining a third F-27, which would increase its jet strength to 10 planes within the next few months," Bez said.

At present WCA operates to 44 points in six Western states and Canada with a fleet of seven F-27s and 14 DC-3s. The two additional F-27s will have the effect of increasing the overall passenger load capacity by 15.6 per cent when fully incorporated into the schedule. Each can carry 40 passengers in addition to cargo and cruise at about 300 miles per hour.

"The prospective expansion of our F-27 equipment will substantially upgrade the quality and reliability of service," said Bez. "and permit us to extend fast service to a number of cities not previously introduced to direct jet travel."

Full impact of the new capacity will be felt on schedules adopted for the first part of 1964, when the current program of fleet overhaul and renovation is completed.

The F-27s were introduced to U.S. air travel by West Coast Air.

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Jobs Reach Record Top Says Aide

SALEM—More Oregonians had jobs at mid-August than ever before, David H. Cameron, commissioner of the State Department of Employment, announced. A total of 765,700 workers had jobs, almost 15,000 more than were employed in August last year, the previous record high. The change from July was an increase of 34,200 in employment.

Despite the massive jump in the unemployment dropped only 4,400 to total 28,500 in August. The disparity was caused by the large numbers of people who entered the labor market during the month.

Twenty four thousand of the new jobs were in agriculture and food processing. Pole bean harvesting and processing provided the major share of the new job opportunities.

Settlement of the lumber industry labor management dispute resulted in an increase in employment of 6,600 from July to August. An estimated 3,000 workers had not returned to their jobs at mid-August but did later in the month.

Contract construction added 1,700 employees near the peak of the building season. Retail trade gained by 1,200 with heightened tourist traffic and back-to-school buying. Educational institutions caused most of a 1,600 employment increase in state and local government as preparations were under way for the new school year.

Shell Oil Co. Sponsors \$50,000 Awards Program

A \$50,000 awards program honoring women's clubs for outstanding work in aid to education will be continued in the 1963-1964 season for its second year, according to the General Federation of Women's Clubs and Shell Oil Company, co-sponsors.

Mrs. Dexter Otis Arnold, national president of the G.F.W.C., said that the clubs that won the 1962 awards—and the many others that were considered—enabled communities throughout the United States to improve schools, provide scholarships, aid in training teachers, and support education in other ways.

"The nation's future is in its schools right now," she said, "and we are continuing these awards to encourage all our member clubs to continue their efforts in helping education."

Two awards of \$500 each are made in each state. One goes to the club with the best education program in a community of 10,000 or more; the other, to the club with the best program in a rural area or community of less than 10,000.

Oregon Teen-agers Hold More Industrial Posts

SALEM — Oregon teen-agers 16 years of age increased in every month through August.

Labor Commissioner Norman O. Nilsen says the increase does not reflect the work in food-processing plants where minors use special seasonal permits which they may hold through vacation whether or not they are employed. A work force of 5,313 minors made application for canneries jobs this year, according to labor bureau records on the seasonal permits. Fifty canneries were authorized to use the special permit system. Nilsen asserts preliminary estimates of minors in the food processing plants indicate a lesser number than in recent years.

The teen-agers held 13,325 permits during the vacation months. Many thousands were employed in agricultural work where a permit is not required except in the operation of power-driven machinery. One out of every ten industrial jobs went to 14 and 15 year-olds.

The labor bureau points out one new factor in youth employment appears to be the emphasis placed in on-the-job experience by the retail selling classes of high schools. Mercantile jobs held by Oregon teen-agers rose 73 per cent during the past year. Teen-agers in restaurant and hotel occupations increased 20 per cent. Permits for employment of minors in manufacturing plants dropped 16 per cent.

Nilsen says he would like to remind all employers that minors permits for vacation jobs expire on the day school opens in the district. Minors under 18 years of age who have worked on a vacation-only permit should apply for an after-school permit if they plan to continue in the same job or take other employment.

Lung Completes Banking Course

Raymond H. Lung, trust division, U.S. National Bank of Portland, Klamath Falls branch, has completed a three-year course at the Pacific Coast Banking School in Seattle and received a diploma at the formal graduation ceremonies held Sept. 6.

Lung was among 17 Oregonians in the graduating class.

The school is one of five regional banking schools in the U.S. and is held annually at the University of Washington for two weeks during the summer months. The graduating class totaled 400.
