Trojans, Bears Highlight West Football Schedule

You say the best quarterback on the West Coast is either Pete Beathard of Southern California or Craig Morton of the California Bears?

Could be, but neither looked like world shakers Saturday although they got the job done against stubborn opposition.

Beathard, the Trojans' ace passer, clicked on only five out of 16 passes against Colorado as Southern Cal swept to beat the Buffaloes in the mud, 14-0. But Pete did score both touchdowns on five yard runs.

Morton, California's highly-touted passer, led the Bears to a 15-0 victory over Iowa State. Craig only connected on two of nine passes during a sloppy first half. But in the second, he scored to climax an 80 yard drive then connected on a 58 yard skyscraper to Loren Hawley for the TD that put Cal on top for keeps.

A First For Levy
It marked the first time in four seasons that coach Mary Levy of the Bears won an opener.

In other games, a pair of upsets were tacked on Washington teams with the Air Force knocking off the Huskies, 10-7 while Texas Tech downed Washington State, 16-7. Around the rest of the circuit, Penn State defeated Oregon, 17-7. Oregon State rallied to down Utah, 29-14. Stanford sat on San Jose State, 29-13. Colorado State ended a 26 game losing streak by ripping University of the Pacific, 20-0 and Idaho bombed Fresno State, 32-8.

Pitt's Panthers turned in a routine, 20-0 victory over UCLA Friday night in Los Angeles.

Southern Cal, top ranked last year and holding the same status in this season's future book, had troubles with Colorado in the mud

at Boulder. Two of Beathard's passes were picked off but the blond quarterback scored from five yards out in the second and final quarters for the win. The second TD climaxed a 68 yard march.

Half-Time Deficit
California, trailing Iowa State 5-0 at the half, took an 8-5 lead in the third period when Morton sneaked over from the one to cap an 80 yard march and then skirted end for the two point conversion. Dick Limerick's sec-

ond field goal put the Cyclones back in the game but Morton's 58 yard pass to Hawley wrapped it up in the fourth quarter.

Terry Isaacson, the Air Force's sharp quarterback, drove the Falcons 91 yards in the final period and scored the clinching touchdown from the seven for a 10-7 win over Washington. The Huskies' lone score came on a 91-yard kickoff return by sophomore Steve Bramwell.

The Red Raiders of Texas Tech capitalizing on three field goals

by H. L. Daniels, turned back Washington State after John Brown had scored in the first period to give the Cougars a brief lead. Donnie Anderson intercepted a WSU pass and ran it 43 yards back for a touchdown to cement the win.

A 32-yard field goal by Ron Coates late in the fourth period sent Penn State into the lead permanently against Oregon. The Nittany Lions also scored on a 40 yard pass from Pete Liske to Don Caum. Mel Renfro tallied

After three weeks of the new season, only one team — the San Diego Chargers — today could claim a perfect record. And Sid Gillman's men could fall next Sunday when they entertain the defending champion Kansas City Chiefs.

Three AFL games were played Sunday — and all produced upsets.

The Boston patriots knocked off the previously unbeaten Oakland Raiders, 29-14; the New York Jets surprised the Houston Oilers, 24-17; and the Chiefs were erased from the perfect record list when they were held to a 27-27 stand-off by the Buffalo Bills. San Diego and Denver were idle.

The Green Bay Packers proved they can win the big game without Paul Hornung, but the New York Giants showed that without Y. A. Tittle they're nothing.

The Packers demonstrated the class of champions Sunday against the club they had to beat, drubbing the Detroit Lions, 31-10.

But the Giants, with Tittle morosely pacing the sidelines because of a chest injury, were clobbered by the Pittsburgh Steelers, 31-0.

Two of the National Football League's old stars, one Johnny-come-lately, and one young man with great promise also proved a few points on the second weekend of the season.

Jimmy Brown showed further that he thrives under the Cleveland Browns' new regime when he broke loose for two long runs in a 41-24 rout of the Dallas Cowboys.

Johnny Unitas showed his old clutch touch when he engineered a 10-point last-period surge that earned the Baltimore Colts a 21-14 triumph over the San Francisco 49'ers.

Billy Wade, who knocked around the league for several seasons before winning a steady job with the Chicago Bears two years ago, pitched three touchdown passes in a 28-7 win over the Minnesota Vikings.

And 24-year-old Charlie Johnson, undoubtedly the brightest young quarterback prospect in the NFL, also threw three scoring passes in leading the St. Louis Cardinals to a come-from-behind 28-24 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles.

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Navy, Northwestern Top Football Field

While Miami's George Mira was recovering from shock, Roger Staubach of Navy, Tom Myers of Northwestern and Pete Liske of Penn State took an early opportunity to place themselves and their teams in position for national prestige.

Staubach, Myers and Liske — three classy quarterbacks — were among the top performers during college football's first big weekend, leading their teams to important opening game victories.

As usual, there were some big upsets, including Memphis State's 0-0 tie with Mississippi, North Carolina State's 36-14 win over Maryland, Air Force's 10-7 victory over Washington, and Florida State's stunning 24-0 win over Miami Friday night. Little East Carolina also posted an embarrassing 29-10 upset over Wake Forest, which has lost 11 straight.

Top Performer
The weekend's top individual performer was Staubach, the Navy junior who completed 17 of 22 passes for 171 yards and one touchdown during the Middles' 51-7 victory over West Virginia.

A crowd of 35,000, largest to see a football game in Morgantown, W. Va., watched Staubach ruin what many considered to be one of West Virginia's most promising teams.

He played only half the game but that was more than enough

Canadian Holes Chip For Title

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Big Mike DeJohn Tops Ring Card

NEW YORK (UPI) — Big Mike DeJohn of Syracuse, N.Y., is favored at 8-5 to beat Canadian George Chuvalo in their nationally televised fight at Louisville, Ky., Friday night.

Their 10-rounder tops this week's boxing schedule.

Chuvalo of Toronto, Ont., scored four straight knockouts this year. Accordingly he was chosen as a substitute against DeJohn when Ernie Terrell of Philadelphia had to withdraw from the Louisville bout because of a stomach disorder.

DeJohn, 31, is favored because of his punch. In his 13 years as a professional he scored 31 knockouts, while winning 46 of his 58 fights. However, he also was stopped five times.

Chuvalo, 26, likewise is a good hitter who registered 19 knockouts among his 24 wins in 32 bouts.
