Yearling Age Deer Picture Improved

There is one significant difference between the prospects for deer hunting in 1962 and for the forthcoming season: That is the improvement in the yearling (16-month-old) age class in the district herds.

The winter of 1961-62 was sufficiently harsh to result in a rather undramatic but obvious loss of deer varying in some areas from mid-winter well into the spring.

As usual, there were large losses of fawns born the previous spring. This happened at a particularly unfortunate time as range forage supplies were far below normal for the third year in a row and the production of fawns by the doe herd was below average. Even without a winter loss, the prospects for 1962 were not as favorable as in the three previous excellent years.

TEE TALK

SEATTLE, Wash. (UPI)—Coach Jim Owens of Washington said today that only one player was hurt in Saturday's battle against Air Force. Guard Roll Hagen hurt an elbow and won't make the trip east to face Pittsburgh this weekend.

Owens blamed poor timing for the upset 10-7 win by Air Force. The Huskies repeatedly jumped over the line ahead of the snap and drew five-yard penalties.

PULLMAN, Wash. (UPI)—Washington State, damped by Texas Tech 16-7 last Saturday, at least reported no injuries and expects to be at full strength for Saturday's tussle at Iowa.

The Cougars worked on passing, running and punt protection in Monday's drill.

MOSCOW, Idaho (UPI)—Idaho will be without the services of wingback Cary Smith Saturday when the Vandals meet tough Utah in Boise.

Coach Dee Andros said the little back, who led Vandal rushers with 64 yards gained in Saturday's 32-8 romp over Fresno State, is nursing a shoulder separation and is expected to be out for a month.

EUGENE, Ore. (UPI)—Coach Len Casanova praised guard Anker Hagerty and tackle Pat Matson after viewing movies of Saturday's 17-7 loss to Penn State. Coach Casanova put his players through a two-hour workout Monday in getting ready for Saturday's battle at Stanford.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UPI)—Oregon State center Dick Ruhl probably will miss the Beavers' home opener against Colorado Saturday night.

Ruhl suffered bruised ribs as the Beavers won a come-from-behind 20-14 battle against Utah at Salt Lake City.

Fullback Booker Washington, who injured his knee, and end Doug McDougall, who suffered a shoulder injury, were also listed as "doubtful" for Saturday's game.

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI)—Guard Ron Caligari, who is battling an infection, was the only California Bear out of action as the Bears drilled for Saturday's battle at Idaho.

The Bears, who defeated Iowa State last Saturday, worked on punt and kickoff coverage Monday. Coach Mark Levy said he felt the Bears were weak in the kicking game.

ATLANTA (UPI)—A hearing on the Saturday Evening Post's motion for a new trial in the \$3,000,000 libel award to former Georgia football coach Wallace Butts has been set for Oct. 16.

Federal Judge Lewis Morgan set the date Monday.

The Post asked for the new trial on a contention that a witness in the trial "testified falsely," that the jury was prejudiced, and that Morgan erred in refusing to permit testimony in connection with Butts' activities away from the university.

The \$3,000,000 jury awarded Butts on Aug. 20 was one of the largest libel judgments ever made.

Butts sued after the Post ran an article in its last March 23 issue that claimed he conspired with Alabama coach Paul "Bear" Bryant to rig the 1962 Alabama Georgia football game.

Bryant also sued and his suit against the magazine is pending.

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LOS ANGELES (UPI)—John McKay, the reigning "Coach of the Year," is not buying an Oklahoma t-shirt as he looked ahead to his Southern California Trojans meeting the Sooners in the television game of the week here Saturday.

The Sooners will be given all the respect due a school that annually fields one of the nation's top football teams, McKay indicated Monday before the Southern California Football Writers meeting.

McKay listened attentively as Oklahoma's spokesman Harold Keith hinted the 1963 edition of the Sooners grid machine was "slow" and had been outgained and outdone by Clemson in their seasonal opener.

"I hope I never see a fast team if Oklahoma is slow," McKay said. "We know Oklahoma is a very fine football team. And it's the team that gets the most points that wins, not the team that runs up the statistics."

McKay was not too satisfied with his club's 14-0 victory over Colorado but his dissatisfaction was more over the playing conditions. A downpour at Boulder, Colo., made it difficult for both teams and deprived the Trojans of the chance to demonstrate whether they were the equal of last year's national championship team.

The UCLA Bruins, badly burned by one team from the state of Pennsylvania, hoped to do better against a second, Coach Bill Barnes said his club did few things well against Pittsburgh here last Friday.

But he was hopeful that a few corrections might result in a better performance against the strong Penn State club at University Park, Pa.

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Although he failed to complete a pass, Carl Jones will get the starting quarterback assignment again, Barnes said.

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As if Ford wasn't enough, Yankee manager Ralph Houk also announced that his regular lineup, including Roger Maris and Mickey Mantle, would all be on the field for the first time since June 1.

And if that lineup threatened to further darken the long-extinguished Angels' picture, it also promised to diminish the fading light of the club's final bright spot, Abbie Pearson.

Pearson, in the midst of the scramble for American League batting honors just a few days ago, was knocked down in third place in the standings Sunday when he went hitless in the team's 5-3, 2-1 double-header loss to Cleveland.

However, where the \$1 million would be found was not discussed.

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
