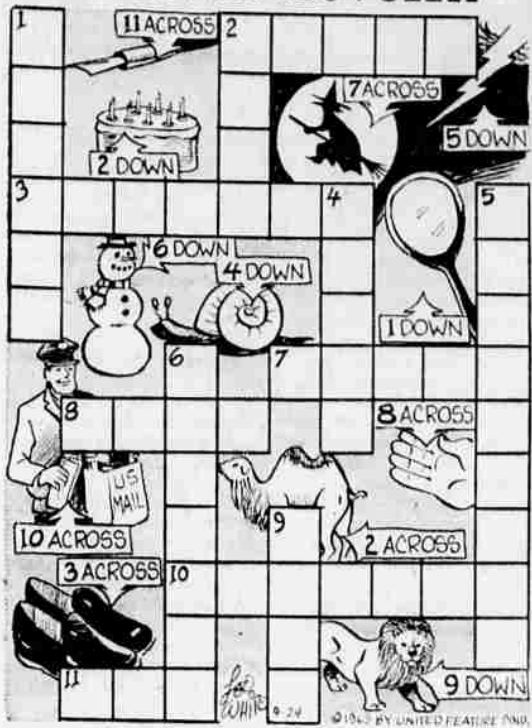


LITTLE PEOPLE'S PUZZLE

Civic Theatre Group Selects President, Plans Production

Recent meetings of the Klamath Civic Theatre resulted in the election of two new officers to the board and the announcement of its first production of the season.

William Hagerman, local businessman and long-time member of the group, will succeed Peter Langreen as president following Langreen's resignation. Elected to the post of secretary was Nancy Jackson, KUHS teacher, who will replace Mrs. Paulann Langreen. Miss Jackson has been active in the theatre since arriving in Klamath Falls a year ago, and participated in both productions last season.

Bob Scholl, business manager and treasurer, will retain his office.

The season opener will be "Blithe Spirit," a comedy in three acts by Noel Coward. Hagerman, who directed last year's comedy, "The Man in the Dog Suit," is slated to direct the play.

Readings or try-outs began Monday night, continuing through Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock in the Spruce Room of the Willard Hotel. All readings are "cold," with no one rehearsing for any part in advance, and are not limited to members of the theatre group.

Anyone interested in bidding for a part in the play or in any aspect of production is urged to attend the try-outs, Hagerman said. Casting will be announced soon after the try-outs, and rehearsals will start almost immediately.

Hagerman announced that the next regular meeting will be the annual birthday meeting and a kick-off for the membership drive. The meetings are held on the first Monday of each month in the

Presidential Envoys Arrive In Birmingham

Two former military men, one a brigadier general and the other a colonel, arrive in Birmingham, Ala. today at the request of President Kennedy to try ease racial tensions.

The two-man mediation team, former Army Secretary Kenneth Royall and Earl Blaik, the ex-Army football coach, conferred with Kennedy in Washington Monday before leaving on their assignment.

The President also met separately with two white groups from Birmingham — one composed of civic leaders and the other of ministers.

Kennedy said all of the group involved in the Birmingham situation, including Negro leaders with whom he met last week, "have expressed confidence that these matters can be settled on a local level. That is also my strong belief."

A federal grand jury in Birmingham indicted eight men Monday on charges of attempting to block the integration of public schools two weeks ago. The eight were connected with the militant segregationist National States Rights party.

Police used tear gas Monday to break up a civil rights march by Negro high school students at Shreveport, La. One officer was struck on the shoulder with a rock and two girls were injured by tear gas. Police arrested 19 marchers, 11 of whom were juveniles.

Elsewhere in the nation:

Selma, Ala.: About 600 Negroes held a rally Monday night to protest the arrest on truancy charges of 24 Negro children who participated in demonstrations last week.

Oxford, Miss.: The University of Mississippi Student Judicial Council meets at 5 p.m., EDT, today to consider a charge of carrying a concealed weapon against Cleve McDowell, the school's only Negro student. The charge possibly could bring expulsion.

Rome, Ga.: A scheduled concert by the U.S. Air Force Band here Oct. 20 was canceled by a civic group after it was learned a military directive prohibiting segregated seating would be enforced.

Salisbury, N.C.: Dr. Clinton M. Jones, a Negro dentist, has come closer than any other member of his race towards achieving membership in the North Carolina Dental Society. Jones said he was disappointed at the 50-30 vote denying him membership, but that he "wasn't too surprised" at the outcome.

McLennan, John Parks Leonard, A. Runkle, Mrs. S. N. Stanley, Monsignor Thomas J. Tobin, and Allen P. Wheeler.

Members from other communities include Paul G. Ackerman, Canby; Philip N. Bladine, McMinnville; George Dewey, Salem; Howard E. Hunt, North Bend; Glenn L. Jackson, Medford; Freeman Schultz, Bend; Charles E. Smith, Springfield; Fred Sohn, Roseburg; R. L. Sundstrom, St. Helens; Howard Vollum, Beaverton; and Dr. Donald A. Watson and Joe L. Williams, Eugene.

Willner said the advisory council is composed of leaders from all parts of Oregon's economic life, including industry, labor, agriculture, education and the general public.

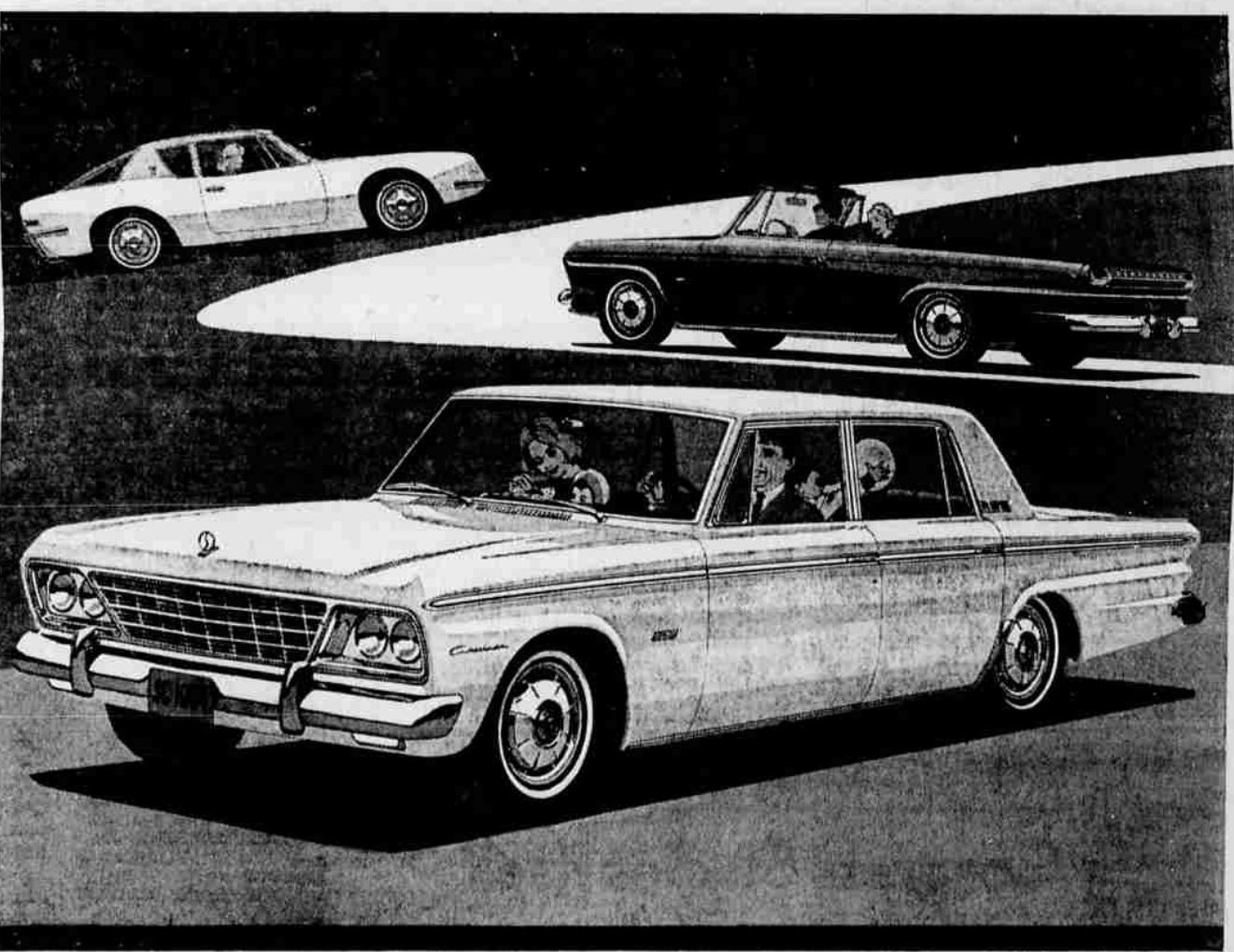
