Cinch Beats Good Play

North's four heart bid was the transfer bid to spades at the four level because the two level transfer is not used after second hand doubles the opening no-trump or bids over it.

This time it worked to perfection. South went to four spades and West opened the eight of hearts. The nine was played from dummy and East's queen lost to South's ace. A spade lead put West in with the ace and he led a second heart. South won in dummy and entered his hand with the queen of trumps. Then he led the queen of clubs.

West thought awhile. Or at least stopped to count points. He held 15 high card points himself. Dummy had started with seven and East had shown the queen of hearts. This left 16 points unaccounted for and the odds were that South held them. It also was certain that East could not hold more than one point. South was using the 15-17 no-trump as is customary today.

Thus, there was no hope of beating the hand. West hopped up with the ace of clubs and promptly cashed his ace of diamonds to hold South to his contract.

North might well have made four spades had he been declarer. East would have to find the diamond lead to beat him, but a sure thing is better than a good chance. With South declarer, four spades was a sure thing.

Solon Raps U.S. Policy In SE Asia

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI)—Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., Sunday night lashed out at U.S. foreign and military policy in South Viet Nam calling it "a historic disgrace."

The senator said, "there we are supporting perhaps the most tyrannical, dictatorial and atrocious regime on the face of the earth outside of the Communist world. I don't believe that we cannot do otherwise or South Viet Nam will go Communist."

"I'm for calling the dare of Mrs. (Ngo Dinh) Nhu when she said we dare not stop our aid." He cited his support of a statement by 21 senators who withdrew backing of aid to Viet Nam until there was a change in the policy of the Diem government.

Morse spoke at a Bonds for Israel dinner attended by about 250 persons.

He said the most effective weapon against the spread of communism was economic freedom. "You cannot export a political ideology. You can export economic freedom," Morse commented.

Morse praised the state of Israel as a symbol of the spread of economic freedom in what he called the feudal areas of the Middle East, and also cited the efforts of the Israeli Youth Corps in spreading technical knowledge in Africa.

He said America was doing the best job of "squaring its actions with its proficiencies in Latin America under the Alliance for Progress." But he warned that the Alliance is a quarter-century undertaking and would not be completed in a mere 10 years. He lauded American businessmen who, he said, were doing a better job than the U.S. government in spreading economic freedom south of the border.

Lumbermen Request Law Extension Permitting Use Of Foreign Ships

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Pacific Coast lumbermen asked today to be allowed to continue shipping lumber to Puerto Rico on foreign vessels despite an argument that the practice had been a "complete failure."

Spokesmen for the lumber industry told the Senate Merchant Marine subcommittee that permission to use lower-cost foreign ships had helped them recapture part of the Puerto Rican market from Canada.

But John N. Thurman, vice president of the Pacific American Steamship Association, said U.S. West Coast lumbermen had not even shipped "two full shiploads" to Puerto Rico during the past year.

The lumbermen and Thurman testified on legislation offered by Sens. Warren G. Magnuson and Henry M. Jackson, both Washington Democrats, to make permanent an exemption from maritime laws requiring use of American flag ships between U.S. ports. The exemption—amendment to the Jones act—will expire Oct. 23 if not extended.
