The New York Yankees trotted out all their regulars for the first time in more than three months and they overwhelmed Los Angeles, but the Dodgers could be a lot tougher than the Angels.

The American League champs celebrated their private "get-together" Tuesday night by shelling Bo Belinsky for four runs in the first inning, and then went on to beat the Angels, 8-1, behind Whitey Ford and Ralph Terry.

Ford pitched seven scoreless innings but Terry, who will be in the bullpen during the World Series, gave up a ninth-inning home run to Leon Wagner to lose the shutout. It was Wagner's 28th of the season.

The last time the Yankee regulars were together in the starting lineup was back on June 1. Since then, injuries or various illnesses have sidelined everyone except catcher Elston Howard.

PCL May Expand To 12-Team League

SEATTLE (UPI)—Chances look good for the expansion of the Pacific Coast League to 12 teams next year.

League President Dewey Soriano announced Tuesday that baseball Commissioner Ford Frick had been notified that the loop wished to expand to 12 teams during the coming season.

If an okay comes through on the request, the main topic at Saturday's league meeting in San Diego will be probably cities to be included next year.

It had been announced earlier by Frick that there will be a Triple A league of eight teams and one of 12 next year. The International League has indicated it would prefer to return to eight teams instead of the 10 it now has. The PCL operated with 10 teams during the 1963 season.

First team on the list of invitees will probably be Vancouver, B.C., which received an honorary franchise after dropping out of the league last year.

But Soriano said Vancouver would have to wipe out all obligations before being considered.

Belinsky Given Credit For Better Attendance

SEATTLE, Wash. (UPI)—Pacific Coast League president Dewey Soriano today gave partial credit to colorful pitcher Bo Belinsky for the 30 per cent increase in league attendance this year over 1962.

According to figures released by league officials the total attendance for 1963, including the championship playoff series between Oklahoma City and Spokane, was 1,538,701. These figures are for a 10-team league. Last year the eight-club loop had 1,055,745 through the turnstiles, a difference of 482,956.

"Much of the attendance increase can be attributed to the two divisions," said Soriano. "I'd also like to give credit to Bo Belinsky (of Hawaii), a spectacular and colorful pitcher who drew huge crowds wherever he pitched."

"We had a very competitive race in the Southern Division right to the end. If Spokane hadn't run away with the Northern Division championship, I estimate we would have run up another 200,000."

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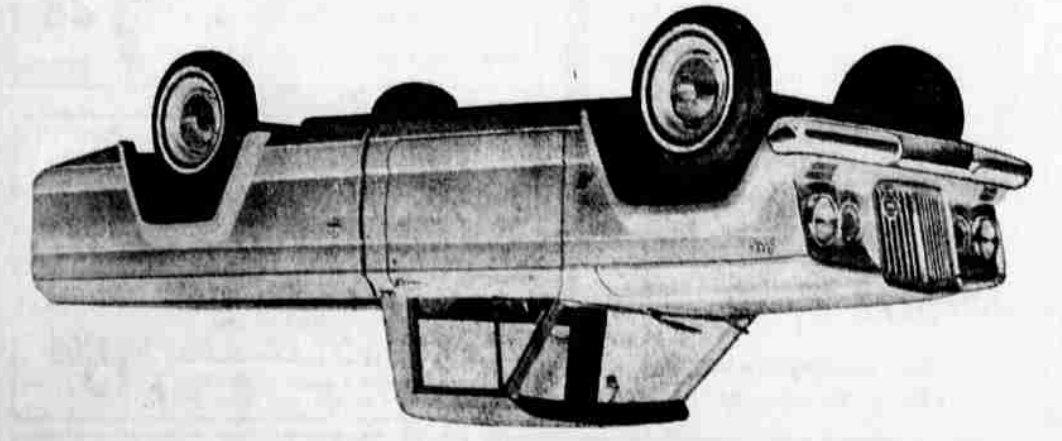
