

Former Star Cleared By NFL Commissioner

NEW YORK (UPI) — National Football League Commissioner Pete Rozelle issued a 609-word statement Tuesday night absolving Charley Conerly of any wrongdoing in his financial transactions with an accused Memphis gambler.

The last 13 words carried the most weight.

"Conerly is, and always has been, a credit to the National Football League," Rozelle concluded.

And with that the NFL chief removed a cloud of suspicion that had hovered over Conerly since last Friday when the Memphis Press-Scimitar reported the former New York Giants quarterback had received five checks, totaling \$9,575, from Maurice Lewis, a Memphis businessman under indictment for operating a gambling establishment.

Rozelle said an investigation showed the checks were, as Conerly insisted, repayments for loans Conerly made to Lewis and had no connection with gambling.

The NFL's investigation, conducted by Jim Hamilton, a former captain in the intelligence division of the Los Angeles Police Department, revealed that Lewis still owes Conerly \$1,925.

Conerly, who retired in 1961 after playing 14 seasons with the Giants, has said that Lewis will repay him eventually, adding "He (Lewis) was a friend of mine and still is."

Conerly's insistence that he knew Lewis only as "a sports fan with business interest in real estate and asphalt paving" was

Guglielmi Mulls Refusal To Move

NEW YORK (UPI) — Although the West Coast has been a stimulant to Americans since the Gold Rush days of 1849, for Ralph Guglielmi a trip to San Francisco may well signify the end of a professional football career.

Guglielmi, 29-year-old former All-America quarterback from Notre Dame, was traded Tuesday by the New York Giants to the San Francisco Forty Niners for defensive back Eddie Dove and a future draft choice.

But Guglielmi may not report to the Forty Niners, after shuttling around the National Football League for six years as a high-salaried reserve, he is entertaining serious thoughts of retirement.

Guglielmi is the vice president of an insurance company in Washington where he broke into pro ball with the Redskins, and "being all the way on the other end of the coast from my insurance business for four months may not be worth it," he said Tuesday night.

However, Jack Mira, president of the Giants, said, "As far as I know Ralph is on his way to the coast, but he may have changed his mind."

After four years with the Redskins, Guglielmi moved on to the St. Louis Cardinals, who subsequently peddled him to the Gi-

ants in a trade for halfback Bill Triplett. Although Guglielmi was with the New York team last year, he saw little action.

San Francisco, which has lost its first two NFL contests after losing all five of its exhibition games, needed a back-up quarterback for John Brodie. Sam Etcheverry, the old pro who was signed two weeks ago, couldn't do the job and was released by the Forty Niners earlier Tuesday along with halfback Bob Gaiters, a former Giant.

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Hearings Set On Mule Deer Herd

Deer population trends and range conditions involving the interstate mule deer heard will be the principal subject of a joint meeting of the Oregon Legislative Interim Committee on Wildlife and the California Assembly Com-

mittee on Fish and Game, 9 a.m. Friday, Oct. 4, at the Winema Motor Hotel.

The meeting will follow a similar session slated for the previous evening at Yreka, Representative W. O. Kelsay, Roseburg, chairman of the Oregon group, has announced.

Mira Halted By Pressure

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI) — All through the off-season Florida State's football coaches concentrated on ways to stop Miami quarterback George Mira in the 1963 opener.

Bill Peterson, the head coach, admitted it was one of the toughest jobs he ever faced but felt he had the answer in directing his defense to pressure Mira on every play.

It was a gamble but his Seminoles did exactly what he told them last Friday night and the result was a stunning 24-0 upset which earned Peterson one of the most satisfying wins of his career and designated as United Press International's "Coach of the Week."

Peterson said he decided to concentrate on rushing Mira when he learned Miami would have two sophomores in the backfield — one at a halfback post and the other at fullback. He said the inexperience was bound to hurt Miami and put that much extra pressure on Mira.

Invited to assist the committee in making evaluations of deer count methods and the various interstate problems of this herd are technicians from state and federal agencies including Avon Denham, range supervisor of the U.S. Forest Service, Frank Stanton of the Bureau of Land Management; Dwight Phipps, Oregon State forester; Dillard Gates, Oregon State University range expert, and biologists from the Game Commission and the Fish and Game Research branch of the university.

Persons or sports organizations who wish to be heard are asked to notify the secretary of the committee, Cecil L. Edwards, 300 Capitol Building, Salem.

A controversy that began because of the taking of antlerless deer in the interstate deer herd led to the creation of this study committee, Kelsay pointed out. He said this herd has fluctuated sharply in numbers during past years, with low counts recorded in 1948, 1952 and 1962.

The population of the herd was generally estimated to run from a low of 15,000 to a high of about 28,000 animals. This was determined by estimations of deer track counts which reflected a

new low in 1962, Kelsay explained.

Kelsay predicted a large turnout due to the great interest in this subject, and added that

members of the public and of sports organizations will receive an opportunity to testify.

Members of the committee in addition to the chairman are Sen. Andrew Naterlin, Newport, vice-chairman; Sens. Glenn Huston, Lebanon, and Lynn Newberry, Ashland; and Reps. Russell Bone-steel, Salem; Kessler Cannon, Bend; and Don McKinnis, Summerville.

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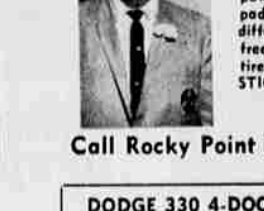
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
