

Lakeview High School News Notes

LAKEVIEW — Following voting by club members, 17 new names have been added to the roster of the Lakeview High School Vikings. They are Bob Brown, George Brown, Jerry Cook, Patty Cory, Lynn Duncan, Diana Gerber, Greg Gilbert, Suzanne Merchant, Kathryn North, Jim Porter, Arlene Robnett, Bonnie Simpson, Greg Smith, Sharon Smith, Marvin Wells, Larry Wilson and Tony Yates.

The Vikings are a public service group at the high school. Members sell tickets at home games, park cars, and work in the concession booths. Their officers are Jean Snider, president; Willard Edwards, vice president; and Susan Hotchkiss, secretary.

With the introduction of team teaching in the high school, the sophomore class has been divided into groups, with about half the class being taught by Mrs. Roberta Bleakney and the other half by Leon Ralston. The students are sometimes in the cafeteria for what is called large group instruction, and part of the time they are divided into four groups to be taught to use the library and also for instruction in public speaking.

The general business class has begun a program of interviews of administrative personnel in various businesses in town. Greg Tracy and Greg Gilbert have visited the First National Bank, and Dean Todaro and Gary Tidwell the U.S. National Bank, with the purpose of learning something concerning the banks and their services. The students then report to the class. The interviews will continue in other places of business. The class is instructed by Mrs. Todd Shelton.

The publications class of the high school, composed of juniors and seniors, started the first week of school learning how to handle the press releases of the school. This class is composed of two main groups, the Sagebrush Echo group and the Honker Herald staff. The former is the high school year book and the latter is the high school paper. Both groups are instructed by Mrs. Bleakney and Mrs. Sharon Faulkner, working as a team.

The Sagebrush Echo is edited by Susan Hotchkiss, by rights of seniority and experience. Helping her last week was Betty Orr, a student at Oregon State University, who is a member of the OSU Beaver staff. Robert Meyer of Master Engravers was in Lakeview to help plan the yearbook.

The Honker Herald is temporarily edited by Dallas Engle. This group plans to produce a paper about every two weeks. They will also release news for local and outside newspapers. Another branch of the class is the radio broadcast group which presents news of the school and interviews weekly. This program is produced by Marvin Wells.

The library bulletin is produced by another section of the class. Ida Wheelock and Laura Bowers are the beginning editors. Last spring Walter Leeemann Jr. shot a mother bobcat on his cattle range and brought home her five tiny offspring which he turned over to the biology class at the high school. By the close of school two of the animals had died, one each was given to Ken Bell and Rosemarie Lentz, and another to the Oregon State Game Commission. Ken's baby bobcat is now almost 10 inches high, weighing about 10 pounds, and loves to fight, even to the point of chasing the dogs. Time will tell the experiment's results.

This year Lakeview High School welcomes seven new teachers to the faculty in various fields of

English, science, athletics, shop, and history. Mrs. Robert Faulkner, English and journalism teacher, is originally from Lakeview, a graduate here and from Southern Oregon College at Ashland. This is her first year of teaching.

Also teaching for the first time is Edward Lindell in American problems and world history. His home town is Roseburg and he is a graduate of Hastings College in Nebraska.

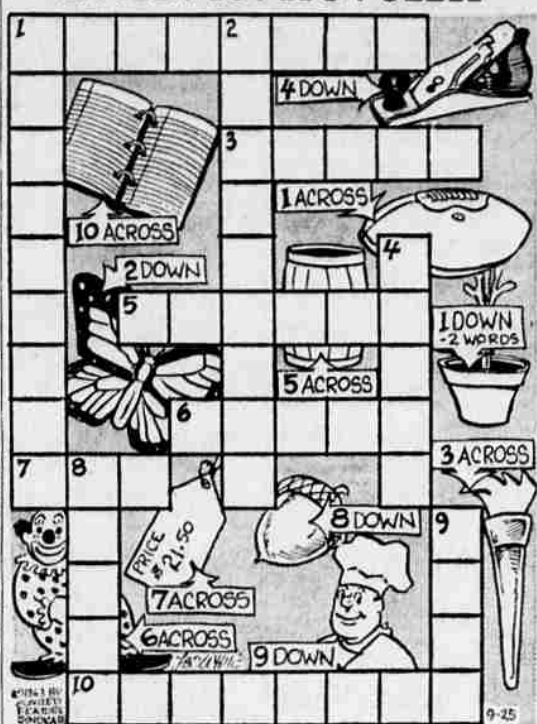
Latrette Smoot is from Waterville, where he has taught for the past five years. He is a graduate of Iowa State College and received his masters degree at Colorado State University.
